## Scary days ahead — no shortage on Halloween activities

Halloween comes a little early at Alexandria State Recreation Area for about 200 trick-or-treaters as they make the journey from one haunted trailer to the next.

The trick-or-treaters might see a skeleton coming out of the ground or green glowing lights. They might even see a witch handing out potions.

At Kevin Orvis's campground spot Oct. 19, trick-or-treaters were invited to walk through a haunted tunnel. Inside, they saw glow paint, a skeleton lying in a coffin and a body hanging upside down.

Tobby Voss and his brother Carter, and cousins, Jacob and Owen Beavers, played Halloween characters in the tunnel for extra effect.

Orvis recruits wife, Sue, to help each year.

"We do it as a family and we've come for many years. We like to do it," Orvis said.

The park is usually packed for the event, which is held on a Friday and Saturday evening.

"We averaged 100 trick-or-treaters per night last year," David Beasley of Fairbury said. Beasley and wife, Becky, are the campground hosts.

Beasley said trick-or-treating at the lake began five years ago.

"The first year, we had 10 to 15 trailers. The next year, we were completely full. We had to turn people

away," Beasley said as Becky prepared to grab a big bowl of candy for a couple witches, dalmation, cheerleader and a Power Ranger. "We encourage people to come."

Halloween activities around the county include Chester, Deshler and Hebron as All Hallows' Eve draws closer.

At the Chester Odditorium Oct. 26-27 "Two Nights of Terror," will feature a haunted house in the basement, which will open both nights at 7:30 p.m.

"Carnival of Souls" will be shown in the Odditorium Theatre on the first night.

On Oct. 27, a meal will be served from 5 to 7 p.m., and a children's costume parade will be held following the meal. The terror begins at 8 p.m., with a showing of "Night of the Living Dead" in the Odditorium.

Everyone is invited to bring carved pumpkins for the Pumpkin Contest and candy for the costume parade.

Also on Oct. 27, is the SpookTacular event at the Thayer County Event Center in Deshler. The night will be sponsored by the Deshler Chamber of Com-

County offices, Hebron Airport Authority, Deshler City Council, village boards in Alexandria, Byron, Carleton and Gilead, and boards of education in Deshler, Meridian, Davenport and Shickley are uncontested races.

Regarding the village board races, Belvidere, Chester, Davenport and Hubbell are contested with a total of 17 candidates running.

## Glenwood to purchase Diode

In a press release Oct. 22, Glenwood Telecommunications, Inc., based in south-central Nebraska, announced its impending purchase of the cable television network and customer contracts of Diode Telecom's Hebron operations with the official ownership to take place Nov. 1.

"Glenwood looks forward to operating the cable TV and internet system to serve the customers in Hebron with great customer service and technology," Glenwood chief executive officer and general manager, Stanley Rouse, said. "We will be an active member of the Hebron community and will soon upgrade the infrastructure to serve more homes and businesses with faster internet, telephone and video services."

"Diode Telecom would like to thank the City of Hebron and all the cable TV and internet customers for their patronage throughout the past years," Diode general manager, Loren Duerksen, said. "This will only impact the service territory of Hebron."

Existing customers will be contacted by both Glenwood and Diode with information regarding the transition.

In the future, Glenwood will announce its plan to build a fiber infrastructure through-out the entire community of Hebron.

In 2006, Glenwood began building its first fiber community, and currently provides fiber networks in 10 communities. Glenwood provides broadband, telephone, and video solutions to business, residents and governmental entities over fiber networks.



### Buildings on schedule for demolition

The City of Hebron accepted the demolition proposals for two dilapidated buildings on 4th Street with \$1 million for insurance. Stanley Tatro will handle the demolition, which must be allowed to fall from the top down. Tatro, who has been in business for 25 years, said the loose bricks near the common wall between the two buildings will need to be tapped one by one. Most of the buildings are coming down manually, Tatro said. The pillars on the north building will most likely be purchased and windows out of at least one of the buildings were salvaged by The Variety Store. A cement plaque in the south building that reads, "1907. C.C. Fletcher" will be saved in the demolition.

Both bodies were brought home for burial... Fred Young writes that he has arrived in France...A letter has just been received from Chas. Beer in France. He is in light artillery, having been in engagement at the front a couple of times and doing some good work... John C. Houser and William L. Sherwood entrained for Camp Funston last Friday... Hubert Roush and Verne Polage have landed safely "over seas"...Ninety-one enlisted men of the marine corps received their commissions as second lieutenants at the graduation exercises of the Marine Corps officers training camp at Quantico, Va. George M. Goodman was among this excellent list of young men who received his commission as second lieutenant.

## 1928

### 90 Years Ago

While the town was without the services of electric current early last Saturday morning sneak thieves entered the Stokes store and looted the establishment to the extent of a small amount of change contained in the cash register and cigarettes, tobacco and edible groceries. The cash register was taken from the store and taken to the Burlington tracks where it was broken open and a very small amount of money was realized.

Modern Romances, and others. He has just completed a book-length novel that will be published by Doubleday.

Harry sold this farm last spring and has now moved into his new home in Hebron, one block south of the M. E. Church. He says that his plans are indefinite--he might fish a little. The other picture is a view of Hebron from the southwest. The pictures were taken by Gene Day from a plane.

The St. John's Lutheran Church in Chester dedicated its new Kilglen pipe organ Sunday morning.

An article asking for support for the new hospital in this issue of the Hebron Journal-Register says that Thayer County needs this hospital--Because--Every three days someone dies in Thayer County; Every day 40 Thayer County people are in a hospital; Every day 80 Thayer County people are ill; Every year 1200 patients go out of the county to spend \$120,000 for hospital and medical services away from home; Every 31 hours a Thayer County mother gives birth to a baby and needs and is entitled to the best modern hospital protection in her hour of travail...Every 25 hours a Thayer County citizen must undergo a major or minor operation.

### 60 Years Ago



# Great opportunities for pheasant hunters

Great hunting opportunities and access await hunters when they go afield for the opener of the Nebraska pheasant, quail and partridge seasons on Oct. 27.

Hunters seeking new places to hunt are encouraged to refer to the 2018-19 Public Access Atlas, which displays nearly a million acres of publicly accessible lands throughout the state. In addition to state and federal lands, hunters will have access to more than 317,000 acres of private land enrolled in the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission's Open Fields and Waters (OFW) Program. For those pursuing upland birds in the Southwest or Panhandle regions, the Stubble Access Guide displays an additional 29,000 acres of tall wheat and milo stubble fields open to public hunting access. Both publications are available at OutdoorNebraska.gov/PublicAccessAtlas.

"This is always an exciting time of the year and upland hunters should have some great opportunities in many regions of the state this fall," said John Laux, Game and Parks' upland habitat and access program manager.

According to the July Rural Mail Carrier Survey, pheasant numbers this fall should be as good, or better, than typical over the last five years in the Panhandle, Southwest and Sandhills regions. Hunters should find the best opportunities in the Southwest and Panhandle regions, where there are good bird numbers and abundant public access.

Quail populations have remained strong throughout many regions of the state and the best opportunities will be found in the Republican, Southeast and East Central regions, where relative abundance was above their five-year averages. The full forecast is available online at OutdoorNebraska.gov/Upland.

A new challenge awaits hunters this year. The Nebraska Upland Slam invites hunters to try to harvest all four upland bird species in Nebraska, including

the ring-necked pheasant, sharp-tailed grouse, greater prairie-chicken and northern bobwhite. Those who complete the Nebraska Upland Slam will receive an official certificate and pin, and will be entered for a chance to win prizes sponsored by Pheasants and Quail Forever. For more information, visit OutdoorNebraska.org/UplandSlam.

An upland game hunt is also a great way to bring a new or novice hunter into the fold. Share the excitement of a hunt and help create lifelong memories for a new hunter. "This is an excellent chance to introduce someone to hunting by showing how to hunt safely and responsibly," Laux said.

Hunters should be mindful of the following firearm safety rules:

- Treat all firearms as if they are loaded.
- Never point a firearm at anything you do not mean to shoot.
- Keep your finger out of the trigger guard until you are ready to shoot.
- Be sure of your target and what lies beyond it.

The hunting seasons for pheasant, quail and partridge, as well as grouse, run through Jan. 31, 2019.

According to the American Medical Colleges, physician shortages may reach between 46,000 and 90,000 by 2025. Within that shortfall, it is projected that between 12,500 and 31,100 will be in primary care. To help combat the expected physician shortage, family nurse practitioners and physician assistants will have an increased role in providing primary care to patients.

In some areas of the country, particularly in rural and urban areas where physician shortages are more prevalent, FNPs are often the primary healthcare provider to their patients. Their education in health diagnosis and assessment, physiology and pharmacology is what allows them to serve in a primary care role.

Skydiving, climbing Mount Everest, white water rafting. I'd assume that very few people reading this plan to do any of these activities anytime soon. I'd also think I could add running a marathon to that list. But what about running 198 of them?

Thomas Korn, a 72-year-old gentleman from Louisville, Nebraska, finished his 198th marathon this past Saturday at the Oregon Trail Run. I had the opportunity to walk and talk with Thomas for miles 23 and 24 of the race and hear about his life and his goal of doing 200 marathons in his lifetime.

A: I run in the Midwest, wherever I can drive to. I like this one (Oregon Trail Run) and the Run for Troops in Iowa. I mostly run rural ones now.

Q: What would be your advice to someone who has big ambitions like yourself?

A: Determination will always take you farther than talent. It's what's inside that

matters.

After meeting Thomas I could definitely tell he had a lot of determination. Aside from being in the Marine Corps, he also was a neurophysiologist for 20 years, beat cancer twice, and continues to compete with other health problems like diabetes. His other hobbies include hunting, reading, and gardening. He has ran in the Oregon Trail Run all 3 years.

# Bruning receives top ag banking award

The American Bankers Association today announced the recipients of both the Bruning and Blanchfield Awards, the association's premier awards presented for contributions to agricultural banking. ABA will honor Fred Bruning, CEO of Bruning State Bank, Bruning, with the Bruning Award, and Purdue University ag economics Professor Emeritus Freddie Barnard with the Blanchfield Award at the ABA National Agricultural Bankers Conference, Nov. 11-14 in Omaha.

Named after Nebraska banker Frank Bruning—Fred Bruning's father and the first recipient 21 years ago—the Bruning Award recognizes the lifetime achievement of individuals for their leadership and outstanding dedication to providing credit and financial guidance to farmers, ranchers and businesses in rural America.

"When Frank, my dad, received this award years ago, it was very special for him, our family and the bank, especially because it was named after him," said Bruning. "I am humbled that I get to follow in his footsteps and honored to be part of the group of bankers who have received the Bruning Award."

Bruning is a fourth-generation banker serving at his family-owned, ag-focused bank for the past 27 years, but his contributions to agricultural banking reach far beyond serving the communities around Bruning, Neb.

One of his most notable accomplishments, the creation of the ag banking and finance major at the University of Nebraska Lincoln, has resulted in more young people getting into ag banking.

In addition to the major, Bruning worked with his staff, the university and the Nebraska Bankers Association to create a scholarship fund and internship program.

"Sixty-five percent of the kids who have gone through that program have returned to work at a rural bank in Nebraska," said Bruning. "There is an enormous opportunity for young people to get into banking right now, and we're finding ways to make that happen."

Bruning's career is filled with noteworthy accom-

plishments at both the local and national level. He was a founding member of the Farmers & Ranchers College, an annual education program supported by the University of Nebraska Lincoln Cooperative Extension. He has been a Nebraska LEAD fellow, a member of the USDA Task Force on Ag Policy and Rural Development, and a board member of the Nebraska Community Foundation. Currently, he is president of the Bruning Community Foundation, which fostered the development of a new library, fitness center, fire hall and several main street businesses.

Bruning earned a bachelor's degree in ag economics and animal science from the University of Nebraska Lincoln. Before becoming a banker, he worked on the family farm near Bruning, Neb. He and his wife, Penni, have three children and two grandchildren.

Krupicka was 93rd in 23:37.1; Johnson, 98th in 23:51.6; and Linton, 131st in 25:58.2.







It was tough to match their offense.


"If we didn't have a couple of drops, the score might have been much closer," Jones said.
