Little Blue NRD stay on wells expires in Dec. 13

The Little Blue Natural Resources District Board of Directors took action in June of 2017 to impose a temporary stay on the construction of new high-capacity wells in the district. The stay's purpose was to give the directors time to prepare new rules and regulations dealing with irrigation development and groundwater management.

The stay expires Dec. 13. In order to address new high capacity wells (pumping over 50 gallons per minute) as the stay is lifted, the NRD is recommending changes in Chapter 2 of the groundwater management rules and regulations.

A public hearing to receive testimony on the rule change is Nov. 14, 7 p.m., at the Little Blue NRD office in Davenport.

Airport installs new tank

A 5,000-gallon split fuel tank with Jet A (1,000 gallons) and 100LL (4,000 gallons low lead) has been installed at the Hebron Airport and accepts credit cards.

Bill Linton, president of the Hebron Airport Authority, said Jet A will service agricultural aircraft turbine engines and medivac aircraft. The airport is home to three ag operations — Jerry's Low Level Spraying, Inc., Aurora Cooperative and Rotorwings Aviation.

The new tank will be accessible for fueling Nov. 3. Construction began Oct. 1 with Acterra Group out of Marion, Iowa, securing the bid.

It will place Hebron ahead of other airports, especially with the split tank, Linton said.

"Some airports have an add-on credit card system. They added on

Chinn one of 55 artists in book

"People don't think it's a pencil. They are in disbelief," artist Cindy Chinn said about her intricate carvings that have sold worldwide with one of them in a Florida Ripley's Believe It or Not! museum.

She is quoted in "Creative Extremes," a German-English coffee table book that highlights 55 of the most extreme artists in the world.

Chinn explained the artists, herself included, work on extremely small, big or colorful pieces and while she has been published in a variety of magazines around the world, she is honored to be in the book.

"It's a huge honor," she said.

Chinn is one of three top pencil carvers around the globe. She and the other two from Russia and Brazil will showcase their work at

an Arizona museum in February.

Pencil carving is like working with dust, Chinn said.

"It is a very slow process," she said about carving the graphite of carpenter pencils. "Graphite is not dense. You can breathe on it and break it."

She makes her own tools for carving.

"If you look at them, they look like a needle, but under a microscope, they have a flat edge, chiseled edge or hook," she said.

Chinn uses a 90x diopter mi-

croscope to see the detail as she carves.

The legs on her carved elephants are as thin as a sewing needle.

Local artist from Chester, Cindy Chinn, is one of 55 artists from around the world featured in a German-English coffee table book.

Her pieces tell a story and Chinn has carved herself a niche in trains.

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In the book, Chinn said she has always been intrigued in miniatures and she is detail-oriented in her work, enough to "push the limits."

"Carving a pencil lead is the perfect medium for that part of my creative mind," she was quoted in the book.

Chinn became interested in pencil carving a couple of years ago and she is into repurposing items for her art, hence, the discarded carpenter pencils for carving.

"Most of my work is recycled," she said. Around the studio, a cut snow shovel shows a winter scene, stained glass that lights up sits in a carved church pew and a coffee table made from a barrel ring, farming equipment disc, old wrenches and trowels, tells time.

"I added lights to it and used license plates for the numbers," she said. "I wanted to make a clock coffee table."

Outside the studio, another studio has shelves of rusty supplies for her repurposed artwork, and is the spot where Chinn does her sandblasting and polishing.

Currently, she is gearing up for the cut, decorative saws she will need completed for the Christmas season. Back to the disbelief in carving miniatures out of graphite, Chinn said people want to be convinced she carved something so small with her own hands.

It is the way she sees art changing the world — like a pet portrait pencil carved from carpenter pencil lead can do, for example.

"They are able to see differently in a way they may have never imagined. You will never see a pencil again without thinking about what it could be."

She said the trains are popular — she has sold about 30. In her animal collection is a chocolate bunny flanked by the actual foil from a chocolate Easter egg.

"Most of these are people's pets," she said about the pet portrait series of dogs.

1887

130 Years Ago

James Murrell, Jan. 1, 1887, had five milk cows, three horses, about 100 chickens, 15 hogs and 16 pigs. He sold four spring calves for \$20; sold one cow for \$32.50; sold butter and eggs for \$162.25 and sold hogs for \$120.85 for a total of \$335.60. He now has on hand 200 chickens, 100 to sell; 24 hogs, 12 to sell; four cows and three horses, 25 acres of good corn and 25 acres oats. Mr. Murrell believes in farming just what he can handle and no more. Came to Thayer County with about \$800. Has now 80 acres of land well improved with dwelling house, granary, milk house, stable, hog pens, cribs, wind mill, pump, etc., valued at \$3000. No mortgage and other chattels, notes, accounts to the amount of \$1725, and don't owe any man one dollar. Farmers, again I tell you, farm less land, raise more stock and buy less farm machinery.

J. M. King has received his patent for the pruning hook he invented. We expect to soon write his useful invention an extensive notice.

A child of Steve Bethscheider, aged 2 1/2 years, died Saturday and was buried on Sunday.

John Lyons counted 300 teams crossing the Blue returning from the fair grounds on the last day of the fair, between the hours of 5 and 7 p.m.

1897

120 Years Ago

Bruning: J. R. Hendrickson, lately of Furnas County, has bought out the J. F. Grone meat market and took possession Monday morning. He will live in the Edwards' house. There are 10 in the family, which will be quite an addition to our little town... Frank S. Wells has rented the whole of the post office from the farm. Having bought out H. A. Schulte's stock he will fill up and keep on hand a full line of goods... Mrs. J. A. Mall has moved into her new hotel on Main Street. She has thoroughly renovated the old Bruning house and given it the name of Commercial Hotel, where she will be better prepared than ever to entertain her many friends among the traveling public... The story has been current here for a few days past that Schuster had gone off to get married but he came back Wednesday morning having bought a large stock of shoes in St. Joe which will be on display in a few days to verify his part of the story... The instruments for the new German band came Saturday morning. They are all nice new horns manufactured by Hilliard of London. There will be some 14 in the band when complete. Dr. Schneller Jr. will lead the band and be their teacher. The 2nd Regimental Band will now have to look to their laurels.

Gilead: Our Mr. Dr. Ammeerman has left us and gone to Harbine where we hope he will be satisfied and settle down to business... The school in this city is now in progress under the able direction of Mr. Brittenham of Davenport... The farmers are making hay while the sun shines. Their wives are making "sauce and sech."

1907

110 Years Ago

The handsome door in the front of Fletcher's new building is the work of our townsman, Lew Secrest.

Mrs. Nora Bethscheider returned Saturday from Burlington, Iowa, to pack up her household goods, preparatory to moving to that place.

The Southern Nebraska Osteopathic Association is meeting in Hebron at the office of Dr. Morris with about 15 delegates in attendance.

Fred Johnson was seriously crushed between a threshing engine and a separator on H. A. Hendershot's farm Monday.

Charles A. Northrup of Chester was among those recently receiving a pension of \$12.

Ed Gates on Tuesday accompanied his mother as far as Fairbury on her way to New York City to visit her son Charley, who is in the Navy. Charley is on the USS Missouri, which will soon leave to join the Pacific Squadron.

The water main on Canal Street has been exposed on account of the dirt being washed away, and during Monday night the main broke, emptying the water from the standpipe. In consequence of which many citizens depending on that source of supply discovered that "you never miss the water till the well runs dry." The damage has since been repaired.

Chester: Julius Glasman, wife and daughter, left for their old home in Germany Friday, after an extended visit with Mrs. G's brother, Adolph Pischke... Judson Swaney had succeeded in housing 500 bushels of corn last Monday and has started another man to husking. Jud says his poorest corn is making 30 bushels per acre while his best is making about 40. This is pretty good average for this year.

(The Alexandria Argus) When it comes to raising big corn, John Murrell keeps step in the front ranks. He brought to this office a stalk of corn that measured 8 feet to the first ear of corn. John has just marketed 1055 bushels of corn.

1917

100 Years Ago

E. Rippe, one of the prosperous retired farmers of Bruning, made a genial call at the Journal office Monday, and while renewing subscription, he talked most interestingly of past and present conditions in Thayer County. He came to Thayer County in 1873, at the age of 25 years, homesteading 80 acres on the north county line. Later he bought a nearby quarter section at \$3.50 per acre, on 10 years' time, and at the end of 10 years was more in debt than ever. At the end of three years (with two years left to prove up on his homestead), he bought the additional land. He later sold his homestead for \$275 for the 80 acres.

Conscious of the solemnity of the occasion, but with the desire of a hearty Godspeed to the departing soldiers, a large crowd of friends assembled at the B&M depot yesterday forenoon to bid farewell to the second contingent of 39 men representing 40 percent of the county's quota. At Belvidere, the citizens of that town met the train and treated the soldiers to apples and cigars.

The first five Thayer County men who left on the first contingent were Tillman

Charles Lang, Hebron; Elias Smith, Junction City, Kan.; Chas. Stephen Cane, Alexandria; Chas. William Beers, Alexandria and John Jacob Van Wanning, Hubbell. Mr. Smith is a transient horse trader, who happened to be in Gilead on registration day and was drawn.

1927

90 Years Ago

On Sunday afternoon, W. E. Boyes accompanied Lenhart's orchestra to Lincoln where Mr. Boyes sang at the penitentiary, accompanied by his daughter, Phyllis, and his son, Earl, played piano solos. They also appeared at the reformatory.

Mrs. G. M. Fowler has fine grapes and wonderful peaches on trees planted by seed three years ago. C. C. Fletcher also displays exceptionally fine home grown peaches. Mr. Meyer and Mr. Spelde have luxuriant home grown tobacco--Mr. Spelde's plants being in bloom and over six feet tall. M. D. Warthen's chickens are ripe and delicious--one having found its way into editorial innards. Mr. Fletcher also raised crisp stalks of Chinese Cabbage--with the combined flavor of celery, lettuce and cabbage. The resources of good old Nebraska are unbeatable.

Virgil Heimer's coupe tipped over on its side, north of the Shearer place, Sunday afternoon. Virgil's eye was hurt and Arnold Davenport's leg was bruised. The damage to the car was nominal.

Belvidere Briefs: Burglars in quest of better raiment entered the Earhart store sometime Thursday night. After annexing new sweaters, trousers, underwear, socks and shoes, they left without leaving their address. They deposited their old clothes in the store supposedly as part payment on their new winter wear. Sheriff Geisler and Deputy Baldwin were on the scene early Friday morning to gain what clues possible that would lead to the capture of the culprits.


1937

(The Bruning Banner) Edgar R. Apking, former editor of The Bruning Banner, last week assumed the management of The Curtis Enterprise, leading Frontier County publication.

The obituary of Thomas Lahners appears in this issue of The Banner. He passed away on Aug. 25, 1937, at high noon at the hospital in Geneva, at the age of 76 years, 8 months and 8 days. The deceased took much interest in public affairs and served in this state two terms as representative, two terms as state senator and one term as member of the State Constitution. His demise is keenly felt by his wife, now sick at Decatur, Ill.; his sons, Oltman of Bruning, Dr. Thomas of Decatur, George of Grand Island; his daughter, Mrs. Carrie Hinkle of Geneva; and one brother in Webster, Wis.; eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Little Wendell Casper, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Casper, was saved from drowning in a large cement stock tank filled with water, Sunday, by Miss Gloria Norder. The narrow escape from death occurred when the Caspers were spending the day at the farm home of the heroine's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Norder. While the children were at play, the child slipped away unnoticed by

Reducing the risk factors for patient falls



Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) works closely with all staff members to provide the safest care for patients with a specific focus on reducing the risk of inpatient falls that can be a costly and serious adverse event in hospitals.

Falls have a negative impact on patients' health and quality of life and represent a significant cost to society. As such, decreasing the incidence of patient falls is a priority of the federal government, regulatory agencies, hospital quality improvement and risk management programs, and patient safety research.

In an effort to reduce the number of patients who fall while hospitalized, the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) is conducting a study to compare patient monitoring systems to determine which system is more effective. TCHS is currently taking part in the Ocouvera Fall Research Program, as part of the study being conducted by the UNMC.

TCHS is currently in Phase 1 of the program; the data collection phase. In Phase I, nursing staff identify patients they feel are a high risk for falls. Staff then discusses the program TCHS is participating in with the patient and/or their family members. If the patient gives consent, a camera is set up in their room at the foot of the bed. The system uses a 3D depth camera to record anonymous images. No audio or identifiable images are recorded.

After several months of data collection, TCHS will move into Phase 2 of the program. In this phase, the camera will be able to predict movements of the patient and alert the nursing staff when a patient is potentially getting up out of the bed or chair.

When alerted, a nurse can go into the patient room to assess the patient before he/she gets up unattended.

Although reducing patient fall risks is often viewed as a nursing issue, successful fall risk reduction programs have input from a variety of health care professionals including nursing, physical therapy, pharmacy, medicine, quality improvement/risk management, as well as the support of hospital leadership.

Facts about falls:
- The risk of falling increases with age and is greater for women than for men.

- Two-thirds of those who experience a fall will fall again within six months.

- A decrease in bone density contributes to falls and resultant injuries.

- Failure to exercise regularly results in poor muscle tone, decreased strength, and loss of bone mass and flexibility.

The causes for falls are known as risk factors. Although no single risk factor causes all falls, the greater the number of risk factors to which an individual is exposed, the greater the probability of a fall and the more likely the results of the fall will threaten the person's independence.

Some people believe that falls are a normal part of aging, but they don't have to be. Many risk factors are preventable. By participating in this study, Thayer County Health Services hope to decrease our patients fall risks and provide a safer hospital environment for patients.



Join the Deer Exchange

Nebraskans wanting to donate or receive harvested deer can participate in the Deer Exchange.

This program is designed to accommodate the additional harvest of deer. It brings together hunters who have a surplus of deer with recipients willing to accept the deer meat.

The Deer Exchange, which is available annually from Sept. 1 through March 1, allows hunters and potential venison recipients to join a database and search for other participating parties in their area. Parties will work out the details of the transfer.

While the venison cannot be sold, recipients may pay for the processing or butchering of the meat. Donors and recipients can register online for free.

Recipients will have the choice of accepting whole field dressed deer, skinned and boned deer, wrapped and frozen deer or processed meat. Donors are responsible for properly field dressing and checking deer at a check station before transfer.

When transferring game animals, the hunter must provide the following information on a transfer tag: name, phone number, permit number or seal number, estimated weight of meat (in pounds), species of animal, date taken, signature of donor and name of recipient. A transfer tag is available on page 44 of the 2017 Big Game Guide. Go to Outdoor-nebraska.gov/guides.

A Hebron resident reported the Jaguar stolen Sept. 29. On Oct. 1, a Papillion police officer located the vehicle. Reinke was then arrested.

Reinke was being held in the Clay County jail. His first court date in Thayer County was Oct. 23, where he faced a charge of driving under a suspended license. Bond was set in all four counties.

said the game with Wilcox-Hildreth was back and forth with Deshler scoring late in the fourth quarter.



Peyton Dubbert led the offense with six touchdown passes, three of which Grant Hansen caught.
