Nebraskans face important local choices

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The Nov. 8 general election is in less than two weeks and Nebraskans will have two pressing choices, minus their presidential picks — the death penalty and the Southeast Community College bond issue.

Southeast Community College
Among their choices, voters will choose whether to approve a \$369 million bond for Southeast Community College and its 15-county area, Thayer included.

Bob Morgan, SCC director for the Beatrice campus, visited a Hebron Chamber of Commerce meeting to explain the roots of the institution's strategic plan that bloomed into a master overview of the college's facilities for its Lincoln, Beatrice and Milford campuses:

- Replacement and renovation of facilities on the Beatrice campus (\$127,054,064);
- Renovation on the Milford campus (\$88,604,757);
- Renovation on the Lincoln campus and new health science and emergency services facilities (\$62,706,798);
- New campus near downtown Lincoln in the Telegraph District at approximately 21st and M Streets, (\$79,479,495);

In addition, the SCC Board of Governors voted to establish six learning centers that surround its 15-county area in Hebron, Falls City, Nebraska City,

Plattsmouth, Wahoo and York.

The centers will serve counties that do not have an SCC campus and assist high school juniors and seniors in obtaining college courses in trade and industry, small business, agricultural business, general education and health sciences.

Morgan said the Hebron Learning Center is not included in the \$11,345,400 bond. He said SCC will pay to rent the building from Thayer Central with a target opening in late March.

Money from the bond would expand the learning center.

Morgan said SCC has never had a bond and currently has no indebtedness.

Justine Petsch, the southeast regional director for Nebraska Farm Bureau membership was also at the chamber meeting. The Nebraska Farm Bureau is opposed to the 25-year bond.

"There is no guarantee on where the money is spent and it is not being used in Thayer County," Petsch said.

According to the Farm Bureau, the bond levy will pad SCC's existing levy with an increase of 51 percent and the total tax increase on agricultural property over 25 years in Thayer County would be \$14,988,379. The annual increase for Thayer County would be \$599,535.

Also against the bond are the Nebraska Cattlemen.

Thayer County Commissioners

Vying for a county commissioner seat are incumbent Chris Frye and Rick Dageforde.

Frye has served as county commissioner for eight years and considers the hiring of Road Superintendent George Gerdes to fill retiring Richard Hinrich's position a solid accomplishment for the county.

He said the largest challenge to date was realizing the county had lost nine bridges and had water over the roads in more than 200 locations during the flood in May of 2015. The county also lost thousands of yards in gravel.

To improve his service to the county, Frye attended numerous Nebraska Association of County Officials classes.

Frye said the commissioners have been conservative with county funds to maintain or reduce the tax levy. He serves on the Trailblazer RC&D Council and Blue Valley Community Action Board of Directors.

As commissioner, he is the board representative for the Thayer County Weed Department and Thayer County Health Services.

When asked about challenges for the county, Frye echoed the sentiments of other county leaders.

"Our biggest challenge in the future that we see is the ability to encourage our

young citizens to return to Thayer County to live and raise their families."

Rick Dageforde has never served in public office, but is running to help county residents with whatever he can.

"I am listening to whoever needs help," he said.

Dageforde wants to ensure county funds are properly spent and federal funds are appropriately used.

He doesn't see a lot of problems facing the county.

Dageforde has lived in Thayer County most of his life, has always been a farmer and holds a welding degree from Southeast Community College.

Thayer Central Board of Education

Deb Craig will vacate her seat after eight years of service.

"It is a huge time commitment and we've done some very good projects," she said.

The district has completed the first phase of major building improvements, which allowed the primary grades to join the junior and high school campus this year.

One of her pride moments was securing a \$25,000 from Thayer County Economic Development Alliance for entrepreneurship and technical education.

She said serving on the board of education is a learning experience and well worth the time.

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Brand X gearing up for official opening

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After a year of uncertainty at times, the Bosco family pinned Nov. 1 as the official opening date for Brand X. Dave, Denise, Matt and Paul Bosco lived apart and worked together, and Matt said several people helped along the way.

It was last October the family expected to reopen Brand X. A suggestion made by Denise's sister, Brenda, to buy the business seemed crazy at first, but the more the family discussed it, the more they liked the idea.

"It seemed less of a crazy idea and more doable," Matt said. "We came to check it out and it grew on us."

Matt has a culinary degree from Pikes Peak Community College. He will be experimenting with a variety of hot sauces.

"We have Italian roots and good recipes from that like meatball subs," Matt said.

"Don't forget the chicken parmesan," Dave threw in.

Denise admitted she has old family recipes.

"We'll do sausage and peppers, and all kinds of things," she said.

Denise was so excited for the restaurant's soft opening Saturday during the Oregon Trail Run, she had a stomachache.

"Dave and Paul are more excited than us," she said, meaning Matt.

Over the past year, the future has

looked more positive for Denise. A week before closing last September, Denise was diagnosed with stage three breast cancer.

"What do we do?" they asked themselves.

"All of the sudden, we didn't know what to do," Denise said.

Matt and Paul went on ahead to Nebraska from their home in Colorado.

"I needed treatments. I needed surgery. Unfortunately, it was not a time to switch doctors and I would have to drive to Lincoln," Denise said.

The family thought she would have a partial mastectomy and radiation, but later found out Denise needed chemotherapy as well.

"It was a day-by-day situation, but we always caught a break and saw it's going to be OK," Dave said.

"It all worked out. We said we can do this as a family and no one is coming late into the game. We're starting the game together," Denise said.

They thought, "What do they have to lose?"

"It was proof we needed to proceed on this family venture," Denise

said.

Matt and his friend worked odd jobs, and toiled away inside Brand X. Landing a job in construction helped Matt pay the bills.

Denise said Matt and his friend were on the scaffolding for weeks painting the ceiling and figuring out the color scheme for the walls — the blue and gray contrast with the barnwood and the white ceiling gives it a clean look, Denise said.

"Pretty much every wall, ceiling and floor, except for the carpet, has been replaced," Matt said.

Brand X features 3,000 square feet of the sports bar atmosphere with free pool at first. The entire restaurant is 6,000 square feet. A second bar in the dining area will most likely be used for private parties. The Boscos are taking on weddings and other events.

"It's whatever the community needs," Dave said.

A basic Americana menu will kick off Brand X's service. Specialties, and earlier hours to accommodate the lunch crowd will come later. Brand X will also be hiring employees.

Denise isn't the only one anxious to get the restaurant rolling.

"We've painted outside for the last couple of weeks and that's all we hear, 'When are you opening?'" Denise said.

Support from the community has poured in. Matt said Merle Hartley, one of his first friends, made sure Matt had the chance to meet good people.

"He is my eyes and ears," Matt said.

And Jeff Friesen of Hebron Bible Church donated a fire door. The Hebron Chamber of Commerce has shown its support as well.

"It was so much appreciated — all the community helping to paint, our families, relatives, Merle and the school district embracing Paul," Denise said.

T. C. Marshall, of Belvidere, was at the county seat on Monday in the interest of the B&M right-of-way through Belvidere.

Thayer County has 78 organized school districts.

George Voll has received two carloads of wood from the Missouri River for his brick burning operations.

1896

120 Years Ago

Died, Oct. 6, Mrs. McLeod, of Bright's disease, aged 74 years, 10 months and 6 days.

C. J. Rhodes brought a stalk of broom corn to this office measuring 12 feet. He asserts that this stalk hoed and cultivated itself and is purely a product of Nebraska soil.

Re. S. Cooke went to Meridian, Jefferson County, this week, and addressed a missionary meeting at the German Presbyterian Church of that place.

While Gail Bros. were boring a well in the southwest part of town last week, at the depth of 29 feet, the augur struck an oak log. They were compelled to bore through the log, and pieces were taken out. Part of the wood had been burned into charcoal. The wood was not petrified, and, considering the depth at which it was found, would afford an interesting field for investigation.

J. S. Goshorn has made an artificial pond on his farm which is probably the largest in this section of the country, and is quite a resort for boating in summer and skating in winter.

Mrs. Olive Randall of Fairfield, and her son, I. M. Boyd of Chicago, are visiting Mrs. Randall's parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Huse. It has been eight years since "Ike" was in Hebron and the years have added height, dignity and good looks to another one of Hebron's boys.

A splendid Republican Rally was held in Hebron last Saturday with much enthusiasm and many converts to republicanism. The parade was fine and the speeches splendid.

republican demonstration, and the Landon League of Women Votes will have charge of the affair, supported by the Republican Volunteers and the Young Republican Group. Following the petticoat parade, republicans will revert to old-fashioned campaign activities and hold a horse and buggy torch light parade at 7:30 o'clock. The Women's Sunflower Bonnet Chorus of Lincoln will be next on the program. Speaking will follow, with Congressman William P. Holoday of Illinois as the main speaker. Climaxing the entire day's festivities will be the Thayer County masked Halloween ball, to be held at the Legion Hall in Hebron at 9:15 o'clock.

70 Years Ago

Fire was discovered in the bleaching room of the Deshler Broom Factory about 5 o'clock Tuesday morning by W. M. Degner. He called the Deshler Fire Department and they then called the Hebron Department, when it was seen they could not control it. It was thought the fire was under control about 6:45, but it broke out again and drove the firemen outside the building. All there was left to do now was protect the exposures. The companies did a good job of saving the balance of the building. Departments from Belleville, Bruning, Ruskin and Byron were also called in for this work. Five pumper trucks were used, two from Deshler and one from Belleville, Bruning and Hebron. The storage rooms on the east end were destroyed at an estimated loss of \$50,000. Their contents, approximately 40 carloads of broom corn and five carloads of handles, made an estimated loss of \$200,000. This loss was partially covered by insurance. It was erected in 1927. On July 31, 1943, lightning struck the factory and burned out the interior of all buildings on the west end.


1956

- Be sure older children TAKE FRIENDS and younger children are accompanied by a TRUSTED ADULT.
- Accompany younger children to the door of every home.
- NEVER enter a home.
- NEVER approach a vehicle, occupied or not.
- Children should wear reflective clothing and carry a

glow stick or flashlight.
• Make sure children are able to see and breathe properly when wearing a mask.
• Costumes and masks should be flame resistant.
• Teach children to stay alert. If a situation doesn't feel right, tell an adult about it.

• Consider organizing or attending parties in a home, schools or churches.

Rules for Parents:

- Know what route your children are taking for the evening.
- Have set check in times or curfews.

Halloween safety - Don't clown around on Halloween

Halloween is one of the most exciting holidays for children. The nurses at the Nebraska Regional Poison Center would like to remind parents and caregivers to take some simple precautions to make sure that all children have a safe and happy Halloween.

Last year over 300 calls to the Nebraska Regional Poison Center involved glow sticks--the plastic tubes that are filled with a glowing liquid. Glow sticks can cause immediate stinging and a burning sensation if the liquid comes in contact with the mouth or the eyes. Be careful when small children put these in their mouths as they are soft to chew on and can be easily broken open.

When children trick-or-treat, treats should be carefully checked by adults. Homemade treats or anything out of its original wrapper should be thrown away unless parents are positive of the identity of the person from which it came.

Marijuana edibles can be found in many shapes and sizes and they resemble traditional candies in their names and packaging. This is another good reason to check all your children's candy when they get home.

Providing children with a full meal before trick-or-treating will reduce the temptation for children to eat treats before they return home.

Costumes should be warm, well-fitting and non-flammable. Masks should allow

adequate vision and should be removed while children are crossing streets. Use inexpensive, nontoxic face paint as an alternative to masks. All makeup and fluorescent hair sprays should be removed before going to bed. Consider using reflective tape on costumes worn after dark.

Make sure children are accompanied by an adult and take a flashlight along if it is dark. All children should stay in their own neighborhood and only go in homes of friends and family.

Give out non-edible treats such as stickers, pencils, erasers or other party favors.

Sponsor a block party as an alternative to wide-range trick-or-treating. Parties at home can substitute for, or at least shorten, trick-or-treat trips.

Serving punch containing dry ice is not considered dangerous as long as the ice is not swallowed in its solid form. Small pieces should not be put in individual glasses. Frostbite can occur if dry ice touches the skin or mouth.

Chocolate is very poisonous to dogs. Store all candy up and out of reach of dogs. While trick-or-treating stay away from barking dogs or stray animals.


