Hebron city officials heard the annual budget request during a postponed meeting Monday night. The meeting was postponed due to the Labor Day holiday.

City accountant Brian Blobaum told the council that the overall projected cash position for the city is \$6,967,338. "This amount is very preliminary," he said, "since it is based on estimates for the final months of the fiscal year."

The \$6.9 million includes the \$2,527,227 bequest the City received from the Stastny Brinegar Revocable Trust and is up from \$6.8 million a year ago which also included money from the trust.

For expenditures, while the budget allows \$12.1 million, actual expenditures run about \$4.1 million, Blobaum said. "Part of this is due to community building project funds."

The City, by state statute sets the property tax requested for the general fund and the bond fund and sets the maximum allowed expenditures for the city for the 2014-15 fiscal year.

State statutes impose a levy limit of 45 cents for the general fund, plus five cents for interlocal agreements such as the law enforcement contract, he explained. "This levy limit must be allocated between the City and the Airport Authority at your discretion," he said to the council.

State statutes also impose a 'lid bill,' which seeks to limit the growth of budgeted restricted funds revenues, he added. "Restricted funds revenues are budgeted property tax, state pass-through revenues, sales tax and transfers of excess utility

funds. The City is allowed the prior year amount plus an inflation factor growth."

In preparing the budget, Blobaum noted, the property tax was set at \$258,299 in the general fund, which requires a levy rate of 46.7148 cents per \$100 valuation. "Last year, property tax was set at \$254,465 and the levy rate was 46.8172," he said indicating minimal change.

The bond fund property tax is set at \$16,588, which requires a levy rate

of three cents per \$100 valuation. Last year, the tax was set at \$16,305 requiring the same levy rate.

The total net property tax increase in all funds is budgeted at 1.52 percent, compared to last year's 2.16 percent increase. "New property growth will absorb 1.94 percent, leaving a .42 percent decrease on prior existing properties," he said.

In the report, Blobaum also gave a rundown of the keno fund, utility funds and governmental funds.

"The cash balance in the keno fund should be about \$47,138 by the end of the month," he said indicating he estimates a \$3,000 net income on a full year's operation. The city uses the keno fund for potential projects.

The electric, water and sewer funds hold about \$3.5 million of the city's cash reserves.

Other mentioned funds can be found in Blobaum's report where a copy is kept on file at the city office.

Tidbits

Sales Tax...

Thayer County collected \$202,163.88 in sales tax for the month of June 2014 after showing a 6.9 percent decrease in net taxable sales over June 2013. For June 2014, the county had \$3,675,700 in net taxable sales - down from \$3,949,895 in 2013.

According to Hebron Clerk Jean Nagey, the City of Hebron collected \$21,596.32 in motor vehicle and sales taxes on net taxable sales of \$1,652,716 for the month of June. That shows a decrease of 12.3 percent in net taxable sales over June 2013 which was \$1,885,094. The motor vehicle tax (\$1,857.92) goes into the street fund, while the remainder (\$19,738.40) goes into the sales tax fund.

The Department of Revenue releases figures approximately three months later than the actual month being profiled. July 2014 figures will be released in October.

Football Contest...

130 Years Ago

Lyon's shooting gallery is attracting more attention than a dog fight. He has purchased a new target rifle and all the boys must try it, you know.

Hebron needs a first-class restaurant. F.J. Hendershot is building a basement next to the Central Hotel especially adapted to that business, and the prospects are that the proprietor will find it soon.

Mr. Webb, the proprietor of our new general store, has opened up a fine stock of goods, and with his two gentlemanly clerks, Surbaugh and Gossage, will do his best to please those who kindly do him the honor to call.

Daniel Baily of Illinois is building a boot and shoe store next to the post office, Belvidere.

The man captured at Pawnee recently for an attempt to wreck a train near that place, has been identified by several parties as the man who wrecked the "cannon ball" between Chester and Hubbell several months since.

An organization of the German Evangelical Lutheran St. John's congregation, with a communion membership of 24, was effected here by the Rev. C. Buechler. Services will be held regularly every two weeks.

August Wolf is building a dwelling house on his farm in Spring Creek precinct.

1894

120 Years Ago

The Garmire Giants of Hebron defeated the Bruning White Belts on the latter's ground by a score of 16 to 13.

Lloyd McKenzie left on his bicycle for Missouri.

L.H. Boyes of this city has five acres of the J.J. Holcomb 40-acre tract east of town planted to cabbages, there being about 20,000 cabbage plants to the acre or about 100,000 in all. Deeming the crop too valuable to lose without strenuous efforts to save it, and being a man of enterprise, he invoked the assistance of W.B. Hughes. Mr. Hughes took a steam traction engine, a centrifugal pump and a number of lengths of

4-inch pipe and soon had a successful irrigating plant in operation on the river bank. In two days the five acres were thoroughly flooded, the ground being literally soaked. Mr. Boyes will be able by his enterprise to save a \$4,000 or \$5,000 crop.

T. McGovern of Spring Creek brought in samples of German millet seven feet high. He has several acres of millet that will average four feet in height.

Editors have been numerous in Hebron this week. Besides the local contingent, there have been Messrs. Casad of the Hubbell Times, Redline of the Chester Herald, Ross of the Belvidere News, Matson of the Carleton Leader and Calkins of the Bruning Bulletin, all wealthy and good looking men.

According to announcement, Hebron Council No. 140 of the Knights and Ladies of Security was duly organized in I.O.O.F. hall by M.E. Ellenwood, deputy national president. The young society commences its career with a charter membership for 37 well known and highly respected residents of our city.

Several days trial with the new waterworks appears to have settled the question of water supply for this city until its population materially increases.

Rainmaker Melbourne recently committed suicide at Denver. He never communicated his secret and it perished with him. He was considered the most successful of the rain makers and achieved a number of marvelous successes.

J.L. Neville of Belvidere has a full force of hands working on his yard. He will burn two more kilns of brick before closing down for the winter.

An excursion train of seven Pullman palace cars, in which were 167 railroad conductors, passed through Hubbell going west.

The Deshler village fathers were out looking up a park site. The one most in favor is a block east of the schoolhouse. This is a beautiful tract and slopes in all directions from the center. It is proposed to put a well and windmill at the highest point, so that all portions can be easily reached with water, then plant trees and sow to blue grass.

Dr. Boyes, assisted by Dr. Ames of Ruskin, successfully removed a large tumor from the abdomen of a young son of George Wagner of Deshler.

John Culp, Alexandria, threshed his wheat last week. Off of 90 acres he got 1,547 bushels, making an average of over 17 bushels to the acre.

Dr. Dempster made some fine "shots" with his Kodak at the late encampment of the Nebraska guards. He is as clever an artist as he is a physician and surgeon.

1904

110 Years Ago

J.S. Goshorn of Stoddard precinct was a pleasant caller. He reports the completion of a new schoolhouse in District

No. 73. It is said to be one of the finest in the county.

Hon. T.M. Casad withdrew his candidacy for re-election as member of the legislature, owing to the ruling of the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General, that a postmaster can not hold any other office.

Fred Brandt and Clarence Ferguson started on a tandem bicycle for Portsmouth, Ohio, where they expect to secure employment.

Davenport

Henry Koinzen and family arrived here overland from Ball, Okla., Henry says he has had enough of Oklahoma and has come back to Nebraska to live.

Carleton

Just as we go to press the sad news comes to this office of the death of John Albert Stellmarch. Mr. Stellmarch was plowing on the Tailor farm, between Carleton and Bruning, and it seems as though he lit his pipe when on his way home from the field, setting fire in some hay that was in the bottom of the wagon, by which he was burned to death. He was a stepfather of G.H. Dirks. Belvidere

The business men along the west side of main street are undecided yet as to whether they will put down a brick or cement sidewalk. It does not matter which they use just so we get this valuable improvement to our little city.

Dan Cowdin had one of his legs broken by being thrown from a wagon.

Chester

The oldest son of John Hanson, living near Stoddard, caught his hand in a corn sheller tearing the thumb loose from the hand.

1914

100 Years Ago

Henry Pinn sold his farm north of town to Mr. Gull of Seattle, Wash., for \$20,000.

At the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Ahlschwede, occurred the marriage of Benjamin G. Velte and Miss Bertha Ahlschwede.

Thos. Hawks of Bruning precinct returned from Mason County, Ill., where he was summoned by the fatal illness of his mother, who died before he reached there. Her husband died 12 years before. They raised a family of ten children, all of whom are living except one. Illinois is very dry and the corn will make only about half a crop.

Another band of dirty gypsies struck town and were busy begging from our citizens. In a number of instances they have been detected pilfering articles from the stores.

Harry landed in North Africa a year ago this month and with his division followed the first wave of landings at Salerno, Italy, where he has seen much action since that time especially on the Cassino sector.

Connecting to Food Resources

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension Educators and Specialists work hard to get food, nutrition, and food safety information out to the public. Most people are "connected" to the World Wide Web by using their computers, tablets and cell phones. Good nutrition and food safety information is right at your fingertips.

As you browse the internet, be sure the information is reliable – look at the web address to see if there is an .edu, .gov or .org at the end. Edu normally is information from a college or university.

<http://food.unl.edu/> is a great starting point and has a large amount and variety of food related information. At your fingertips are food online newsletters, blogs, and a microwave zmag (interactive magazine) to help you find information about microwaving meals.


