Village of Alexandria considers ordinance

Village board passes first of three readings

The village board in Alexandria is looking into passing a new ordinance which would restrict where registered sexual offenders could live in the village.

The village board received a letter from the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) of Nebraska stating issues that they saw with the current proposed ordinance on Monday, September 9. Although the village can pass a restriction that states where registered sex offenders can live, there are parts of the current ordinance that are considered unconstitutional. The letter stated that the restriction as presented goes beyond what is permitted by state law and what has been preempted by existing statutes. The letter continues to say that because of this the ordinance would violate several sections of both the Nebraska State Constitution and the

United States Constitution.

The ACLU cited three different areas where the ordinance must be changed in order to stay within the constitutional law.

The first issue stated was that state law includes the locations requested for restriction. State law allows the restriction to be applied to schools and licensed day cares, but would not permit for this to include playgrounds, parks and bus stops as stated in the current ordinance.

Alexandria doesn't have a school or licensed day care at the current time.

The second issue is the date of the grandfather clause. The current ordinance includes the passing of the state law as the date. Instead the date of the passing of the ordinance must be included.

Part of the ordinance also seeks to punish landlords that rent their property to registered sex offenders. The letter from the ACLU says that this would be the creation of

a new crime and is not permitted by state law.

At the village board meeting on September 11, the board voted on the ordinance. Over twenty village residents attended the meeting. Many of those attending stated opposition during the public comment portion of the meeting. One village board member was absent, but all four other board members present voted in favor of the ordinance as presented.

Changing certain parts of the ordinance would hinder what the board was hoping to achieve, said chairman of the village board Stephen Deger.

The vote to accept the reading of the ordinance is only the first. The village board must pass three separate readings of the ordinance before it can be established as a village ordinance. The next votes will come before the board in October and November. During these readings, the ordinance can still be amended.

County Treasurer retires after 26 years

It has been over 26 years since Eileen Asche was elected as Thayer County Treasurer and many things have changed since then.

"We used to have to use manual typewriters," she said. "So just the changes in technology have been something."

She actually began working in the county treasurer's office in a different position in 1962. At that time she began as full time, but eventually went to part time. Later on, she came back to work full time in the office.

It wasn't until 1986 when she decided she wanted to run for the county treasurer's position.

"The treasurer at that time was retiring and I wanted to try it out," she said.

Then began a 26 and a half year position as Thayer County treasurer.

Asche will retire on September 30. She is looking forward to enjoying her retirement. She doesn't have any big plans for retirement at the moment but is looking forward to a little slower pace.

Although she is looking forward to retirement, Asche says she is going to miss working with the people of Thayer County and handling the tax money which were two of her favorite parts of the job as treasurer.

There will be a retirement reception held for Asche on September 25, at 2-4 p.m., in the courthouse clubroom in Hebron.

1943 Deshler football team honored...

Some members of the 1943 Deshler football team were honored at halftime on September 13. The team reunited earlier in the day to catch up and reminisce about the 1943 season. The team that year was made up of 31 members. Twelve of them are still living and eight of them came for the Deshler football game against Nebraska Lutheran last Friday. Members who came back for the recognition were Oscar Mussman, Franklin Schultz, Lloyd Loetterle, Don Mohrmann, Art Hillman, Ken Schroeder, Don Reinboth and Willis Fintel. This team holds a special record. The team had seven wins and no losses during its season. Not only did they have an undefeated season, the team didn't let anyone score against them in their seven wins. Throughout the 1943 season, the team had 144 total points unanswered against its opponents.

TCEDA continues initiative

Thayer County Economic Development Alliance started a new program last March. The Classroom to Commerce Initiative is aimed at showing students the career opportunities that they may not be aware of in Thayer County.

When it first began, the program focused mainly on showcasing the industries available in Thayer County. Business tours were given for 23 industries ranging from dentistry to body shops in the area.

"It started out as a way to introduce students to different opportunities in the county," said Thayer County Economic Development Alliance director Jeremy Voss. "But now it has grown into something new."

The alliance hopes to shift the focus to helping students look into different career paths and secondary education options.

TCEDA has recently hired a director to head this initiative. Jeannine Voss will take over this position sometime this fall. She will work with the school counselors and help students to find their career path whether it would involve a technical school or even a four year degree.

"We received a grant to hire someone for two years," Jeremy said. "We are going to gauge the interest in the program during this time and then go from there."

When the program began last year, local business tours were a big part of it. TCEDA worked with all three schools in the county and were able to take 174 students on the tours.

130 Years Ago

There are \$10,000 of old, uncollected back taxes on the county treasurer's books.

He is an experienced brick maker and will in partnership with Mr. Shearer engage extensively in the manufacture of this necessary building material, at this place. He made brick for five years in Denver, Colo. R. Ellison has agreed to furnish 125 cords of wood during the coming winter. Their first kiln will be burned with coal.

County surveyor G.W. Allen of Belvidere was in town making a partial survey of Huse's Addition to Hebron. He went to Chester for the purpose of flourishing young city.

A.G. Collins, cashier of the People's Bank of Beatrice, and his brother, J.F. Collins, cashier of the Cheyenne Bank, purchased the stock of B.S. Ferris in the First National Bank of Hebron. They will take charge soon.

A primary schoolhouse is being built at Belvidere to accommodate increasing attendance. It will cost about \$1,000.

Recent reports indicate that James Bishop, who was shot by one of the Motts is rapidly recovering.

The Hubbell post office now feels the importance of being a money order office.

Elder Lobingier immersed Mrs. Alvin Parmely, Miss Hattie Dean and Miss Emma Soule at Belvidere.

W.M. Barger talks of starting a small machine shop.

A "good one" happened to a Lincoln speculator by the name of Col. W.W. Wilson the other day while in Hebron. He met John G. Deshler, a Columbus, Ohio, banker and wanted to know what amount of money Mr. Deshler would take for his land in Thayer County. Mr D. informed him he did not want to sell, but Mr. W. insisted on a price being named. Finally, Mr. D. made a few calculations, and expressed his mind to the Lincoln speculator, as follows: "Well, sir, I have about 10,000 acres and I will take just \$108,000, and the offer only stands open 15 minutes. 

Roles of the Best Man and Maid of Honor

Being chosen as a best man or a maid of honor is a significant and meaningful honor. Those roles have evolved over the years, but these special participants must still perform some of the traditional duties of the past, including serving as the official witnesses to the ceremony. Wedding day
 On the day of the wedding, the maid of honor and the best man will act as a support system for the bride and groom. The maid of honor will help the bride get dressed and help iron out any mini-emergencies that should crop up. The best man will help ensure all of the ushers are dressed and get the groom to the wedding on time.

During the ceremony, the maid of honor will hold the bride's bouquet while she participates in the wedding. The best man will keep the rings safe until they are needed. William "Stub" Priefert

William Burdette Priefert better known as "Stub," was born on February 27, 1921, on Owl Creek southeast of Belvidere. He was the youngest child of Pearl Howell and William Henry Priefert. He departed this life Thursday, September 12, 2013, at Blue Valley Lutheran Nursing Home in Hebron at the age of 92 years.

At the age of three he moved to the farm house located on the 18 mile ridge of the Oregon Trail on what was known as the Poverty Flats region. He lived there for 70 years until he moved to Hebron.

Stub was always interested in mechanical things and would take the wheels off his kitty car, rotate them and put them back on before he was two years old. He loved to make something from other parts. His greatest work was a tractor which he called "The Stealth" because it was a secret while making it. It was made from two Case combines and a LTD automobile and could articulate and oscillate. Nothing pleased him more than when he could "play" and weld in his shop.

As a boy he spent his Saturday nights standing on a box and watching Bill Beisner do lathe work in his machine shop in Hebron. Bill said he could watch but not say anything and from observing he learned to be an expert lathe machinist making model steam engines in his later life.

He walked two and one-half miles to the one room school District No. 66 for his first eight years of education. As the depression was on he was told by his father they could not afford to send him to high school but Chloe and Fred Morrison had the grocery store in Belvidere and Chloe told him he could live with them, work in their grocery store and be a brother to their son, Walter. Chloe was very influential in his life as a teenager.

Upon graduation from Belvidere High School in the class of 1939, he lived with Venus Pierce on Rose Creek

until former neighbors invited him to come to California and helped him get work in the North American bomber plant riveting the left wing onto the B-25 bombers.

He was drafted into the army in 1943 and trained at Camp Roberts, California, and Camp Butner, North Carolina. He thought he was being sent to the war in Europe but instead was taken by troop train to California where he boarded the Delta Queen paddle boat then put on board the troop transport the USS O'Hara. After 30 days at sea, they landed in Australia but could not get off ship for another week.

Quinine was used in the treatment of malaria fever and as the Japanese had control of the islands which had quinine trees, Atabrine was being developed for the treatment of malaria. He was ordered to volunteer to be a human guinea pig in testing Atabrine. For this medical experiment they were loaded onto an antique Dutch freighter with an Indonesian crew who wore only loin cloths and knives and taken to New Guinea where they were deliberately exposed to malaria.

One group was given quinine, another tested Atabrine and a third a placebo. Although given Atabrine, he came down with the vivax strain of malaria at the end of the experiment and was taken to the hospital in Toowoomba, Australia. Fifty years later he enjoyed visiting this area of Australia again.

Upon recovery he was placed in the 116th combat Engineers of the 41st Division. As he had typing in high school he was put in headquarters for which he was so thankful. The 41st division was called "The Bloody Butchers" by Tokyo Rose. They made the initial landing at Hollandia which went like a textbook invasion. Next, they were sent to take the island of Biak which was to be very easily captured as the reconnaissance planes said there were but 2,000 Japanese on this island not realizing 13,000 were hidden in well supplied caves.

After 30 days of hand to hand combat, their commander gave up and resigned, leaving them on their own. He was put on a road grader until he became very sick with hepatitis and yellow jaundice which bothered

him the rest of his life.

He was sent to the hospital ship USS Comfort and after recovering he was put in water supply making initial landings at Basila and Zamboango. When the atom bomb was dropped, he and two other men were sent into Hiroshima to find water. They pumped water from the underground water system into large rubber tanks and the Japanese came down from the mountains for water.

While in combat, he swore if he ever got back to the peacefulness of his Nebraska farm, he would never leave.

On February 14, 1951, he married Virginia Griffin at the Presbyterian manse in Alexandria. They lived on his farm until 1999. This union was blessed with the birth of two children, Jack and Leah.

Stub and Virginia were curators at the Thayer County Museum for over 30 years.

He is preceded in death by his parents, wife Virginia, brothers, Dail and Linley and a sister, DeEtta Meyer.

He is survived by son, Jack Priefert and wife Marily; daughter, Leah Lammers and husband Al of Omaha; grandchildren, Brittany Lammers of Omaha, Leslie Dickinson and husband Andy of Woodbine, Iowa; and Katie Wheeler and husband Jon of Omaha; great-grandchildren, Ashton, Marshall, and Berkeley Dickinson and Claire Wheeler, nieces, nephews and friends.

Funeral services were held September 17 at the Belvidere Community Center in Belvidere with Eldon and MaryBeth Nicholson officiating. Pianist was Linda Dudgeon. Soloist was David Rubio, with the special selection, "Calling My Children Home."

Casket bearers were Carol Salerno, Ann Schultz, Tom Priefert, Ron Olson, Bill Hudson, and Craig Priefert.

Honorary casket bearers were Jim Kenner, Russell Priefert, and Ervin Priefert.

Burial was in the Belvidere Cemetery with the military graveside service by the Hebron American Legion Saxton Post No. 180.

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Woman's Club Has Program On World War II Plane Crashes

On September 10, seven members of the Bruning Woman's Club met at the opera house. Program Chairperson Jeri Rippe read the thought for the day, "I am Your Flag" and Red Skeleton's rendition of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Then she introduced Shirley Brunkow from Milligan who is a member of the Milligan library and was very active in finding many relatives of the survivors of the soldiers who lost their lives in three plane crashes near Milligan in the early 1940's.

A committee was formed to help with gathering information about the airmen who were stationed at the Bruning Air Base.

Shirley told us stories of the events of the days the planes crashed and how they found their relatives using letters, phone calls, e-mail, newspaper archives, historical societies, obituaries and school records. She told us in detail how she proceeded to find family members and that it took a year to gather that information. They found relatives of 31 of the 32 airmen that were lost and just recently found information about the last soldier.

They started their search in

August, 2009 and had the celebration on August 10, 2010. They put up three separate markers with the full name and rank of each of the soldiers, which are located just north of Milligan on Highway 41. It was an exciting day filled with sharing memories as many gathered at the Milligan memorial site. Jeri Rippe served a delicious strawberry pretzel dessert.


