## TCHS acquires Thayer County Ambulance

Thayer County Health Services paramedic Michael White is busy organizing the scheduling and maintenance of the county ambulance service. The additional responsibility comes to him after county commissioners and the ambulance and hospital boards declared Thayer County Ambulance dissolved. The service will now be governed by the hospital.

"This is a transport ambulance only and will not be used for emergency calls," White said following the hospital board meeting a couple of weeks ago. "The unit will be purchased by the hospital, but the department will stand on its own merit." The new name for the new department will be Thayer County Critical Care Transport, he added.

Almost to the date of its dissolution, Thayer County Ambulance was established 30 years ago, in August 1971, when funeral directors discon-

tinued ambulance service to the local area. At the time of its establishment, a county ambulance board consisting

of Rev. Paul Whitfield, H.E. Bice and LaVern Poppe was appointed by the commissioners to oversee the setting up, training and maintenance of the county-wide service.

*Hebron Journal-Register - September 1, 1971: The need for the purchase of an ambulance and the establishment of a volunteer ambulance service precipitated when local funeral directors discontinued ambulance service in Thayer County July 1 of this year. Since then there has been a serious gap in the emergency medical service of Thayer County.*

*Very fine rescue units manned by volunteer fireman are operating at Alexandria, Bruning, Byron, Carleton, Chester, Davenport, Deshler and Hebron. But there is no provision made either for long distance trips, such as taking patients to Lincoln, nor*

## City Council looks at nuisance properties, emergency sirens, Hebron dam, Complex sign

The Hebron City Council looked at several issues during the Sept. 12 meeting, held a week later than the traditional first Monday of the month due to the Labor Day holiday.

Turning immediately to nuisance properties following the budget hearing reported in this newspaper two weeks ago, the council reviewed the property at 340 S. 6th St., and determined that the owner, James Dwerlkotte, had been cleaning, painting, mowing and fixing the property as asked by the city.

The council then declared the property at 210 S. 6th St., a nuisance. The owner Christy Harrison, will receive a letter from the city. According to the city's nuisance ordinance, anybody possessing a nuisance property will

be served notice and have five days to request a hearing or take care of the situation. If there is no action taken, the city can enforce a \$100 per hour clean-up fee.

Councilman Kurk Wiedel said the City would have to inspect for asbestos before cleanup can be done should the City move in to do the job. The price tag to clean up the asbestos should some be found could run as high as \$5,750 and would be assessed to the owner, he said.

HVFD fire chief B.J. Linton updated council members about the new warning sirens expected later this year. The project has been ongoing for three years. The department secured an \$80,000 grant from SENDD about a year ago for the purchase of five new rotating sirens. In February of this year, Linton said the equipment would run approximately \$61,000, while installation would be approximately \$33,000. The City is responsible for a 25 percent match, or about \$23,500 which will come from sales tax.

The sirens will be located at the fire hall; at the city Quonset on Jefferson Ave., by the intersection of Second St. and Duffield Ave., near the water tower, and at the airport. Installation is expected to begin in December or January.

Council members then voted to enter into an interlocal agreement between the City of Hebron, Thayer County, and the Little Blue NRD for payment of a new Hebron Dam flood inundation and evacuation.

Earlier this summer, Thayer County Emergency Manager Bill McPherson told the council that the Department of Natural Resources required the city to update its emergency evacuation plan due to the dam's high risk nature for its proximity to the city.

Although flooding of Hebron has not been a major concern since the dam was built, the spillway poses a particular "weak spot" in the structure, enough so that an evacuation plan is necessary.

The new plan will cost \$6,850; half will be paid by the County who is, in fact, the owners of the dam, while Little Blue NRD and Hebron will pay 25 percent each.

And finally, the city was made aware that a new Hebron Sports Complex and parks sign that will replace the old one located at 6th St. and Lincoln Ave., blocks traffic on Lincoln Ave., and installation will have to be postponed until either a new site is located or the sign is fixed to accommodate the vision issues.

The next City Council meeting will be held Monday, Oct. 3.

## Heritage Fall Festival to feature barn dedication

Thayer County Historical Society members are busy getting ready for the annual Heritage Fall Festival in Belvidere. The festival is used to showcase the local museum and grounds offering a variety of entertainment, historical displays and food. The festival is scheduled to take place Sunday, October 2.

This year, the Society will dedicate the museum's new barn - a dedication that was to take place last year, but due to construction snarls was put off until this year.

The barn, made possible with funding received from the John A. Murrell Estate, Struve Foundation,

Tom and Zola Griffen and Burdette (Stub) and Virginia Priefert, is 135 feet long by 36 feet wide and houses farm machinery and tools throughout the ages. The structure is handicap accessible, fully plumbed and has electricity. The dedication is scheduled for 4 p.m.

Also on tap for the day is the traditional luncheon in the Belvidere Community Center beginning at 11 a.m., pioneer demonstrations including blacksmithing, rope making, and horseshoeing as well as a farmers market, craft booths and car show. And new to the line-up of activities this year is a model train

demonstration.

As always, musical entertainment will be featured in the afternoon. Returning to the festival, the McClellan sisters of Adams, Ne., Tiffany Kimberly, Jewel, and TaMera, will entertain with southern gospel on the museum's front lawn. Area students from local schools will also perform during the day.

All the museum buildings and displays will be open for viewing. In the last few years, much work has been done to organize, fix, maintain and clean the many treasures and memories of Thayer County.

# My Thoughts Exactly

Eeek! A satellite is crashing to Earth! It's supposed to break up into 26 pieces that will not burn up in the atmosphere and those pieces, as of right now, are projected to hit Earth somewhere between northern Canada and southern South America, or pretty much where we live. The biggest piece is expected to be the size of a bus. It sounds so science fiction like, doesn't it? Debris falling from the sky? Eeek!

Officials at NASA are saying the UARS (Upper Atmosphere Research Satellite) was launched by the space shuttle Discovery in 1991 and was decommissioned in 2005 when it ran out of fuel. This particular satellite, considered unusually large, will break up into pieces as it crashes toward Earth, but not all of them will burn up. The separate components, with a total mass of 1,200 pounds, will spread out over 400 to 500 miles.

The chances of being hit by debris are about one in 21 trillion, NASA officials say, and when you add up the 7 billion people living on the planet, the chances that someone, somewhere could get hit are one in 3,200. And that's a far greater likelihood than say, winning the lottery!

There are hundreds of satellites in space, and eventually, they have to come down. But, today, according to NASA officials, satellites are built with materials less likely to survive re-entry. The UARS scheduled to crash down this week, was built before the "Design for Demise" initiative and NASA says although medium-sized space junk falls to Earth about once a week with no consequences, a piece as large as UARS is a rare occurrence.

The satellite's orbit for the past 20 years has been 57 degrees north and south of the equator, or passing over anyone living south of Juneau, Alaska, or Inverness, Scotland, or anywhere north of Punta Arenas, Chile, or the southern tip of New Zealand. There has never been injuries from falling space junk, NASA officials said and agree that the pieces will most likely fall into the ocean, a desert, or uninhabited area.

NASA officials say they won't know where the satellite will hit until two hours before it enters the Earth's atmosphere at five miles per second. Also unknown is the exact day; expectations are for impact this Thursday or Friday. Here in Nebraska, we are approximately 6,000 miles from Punta Arenas, Chile and about 2,000 miles from the middle of the Northwest Territories in Canada, as the crow flies. There's a lot more land than people in this "bottleneck" of impact area, but wouldn't it be something if a piece did fall into a corn field around here? That right there would be a crop circle worth taking a look at.

In the meantime, keep your eyes to the sky - I'll be tracking it's progress online. We should know when and where the pieces will fall soon enough.

## Repair Summer's Damage to Gardens

Summer is tough on landscapes. High temperatures, high humidity and dry conditions can leave gardens looking ragged by September.

September is a great time to repair summer's damage and get gardens in good condition before winter. Good landscape practices as suggested by Horticulture Extension Educator Sarah Browning for this month include dividing perennials, controlling weeds, fertilizing turfgrass and watering trees and shrubs.

**Dividing Perennials**— Now is a great time to divide perennials that bloom in spring and early summer. Look for plants that have crowded stems, fewer blooms or a dead section in the center of the crown. These symptoms indicate it may be time to divide your plants. Dig up entire plants and tease apart the root systems. Cut away old, bare root sections before placing the plants back into the ground.

**Weed Control**— Fall is a good time to control perennial weeds such as dandelions, ground ivy and wild violets. In fall, plants begin moving carbohydrates produced by photosynthesis to the roots for winter storage. Herbicides applied at this time are transported more readily to the roots, killing the entire plant instead of just the parts above the soil surface.

When only a few weeds are present, they can often be pulled or dug up by hand. Herbicide spot treatment, or spraying individual weeds, can save money on chemicals when only a few weeds are scattered throughout the lawn. Ready-to-use liquid products provide better coverage for spot spraying.

For more severe weed problems, apply herbicide to larger areas. Many products are available for broadleaf weed control, including formulations of 2,4-D, quinclorac or triclopyr. These products can be used in turf areas and won't

damage underlying grass, but use caution around landscape beds since accidental spraying or spray drift can damage shrubs and ornamental plants. Quinclorac is particularly effective at controlling wild violets.

Granular post-emergent herbicides may be applied with your fertilizer applications twice in the fall, once in the early part of the season and once before the last mowing. Apply granular herbicides to damp grass to ensure the herbicide will stick to dandelion leaves and become absorbed. It's best to apply after irrigation or in early morning. As with all chemical applications, be sure to read and follow all directions on labels and use personal protective equipment.

**Fertilization**— Early September is the time for the first fall lawn fertilization, providing nutrients turfgrasses need to grow actively again after summer's heat and replace leaf blades damaged or killed by insect or disease activity.

However, keep fertilizer away from trees and shrubs because nutrients will encourage new growth. These tender new shoots or roots may not have time to harden up for the winter and could be damaged by early cold conditions.

**Watering**— Finally, watering plants in fall is an essential practice to rehydrate them before winter's dry, cold conditions arrive. Typically landscapes require one inch of water per week, if there is not a similar amount of rain. When watering trees and shrubs, apply that inch in one day so that you moisten the deeper layers of the soil.

Adjust sprinkler systems for fall conditions. In the summer, irrigation systems run more frequently and for longer periods because the weather is hot and dry. But in the fall, temperatures are cooler, so watering should be reduced.

of saturated fat or dairy fat and prostate cancer.

- Obese men are 33 percent more likely to die from prostate cancer. Some studies suggest a relationship between obesity and higher risk, but it is difficult to prove a direct link.

- People exposed to certain chemicals such as pesticides and herbicides may have higher than average rates of prostate cancer. One pesticide, methyl bromide, has shown a clear link to increased prostate cancer among exposed farm workers.

- Studies suggest a link between high cholesterol and prostate cancer.

- Exercise may contribute to lowering the risk of prostate cancer because of its impact on metabolism and weight loss.

- Smoking may contribute to the growth of prostate cancer tumors. Studies also show nicotine may also interfere with the effectiveness of chemotherapy.

Prostate cancer usually exists without symptoms!!! Some patients may have symptoms of having to urinate frequently or slowly, or have urinary burning or blockage or bleeding. These symptoms usually come from other conditions such as infection or inflammation or overgrowth, but may be associated with prostate cancer. When these symptoms occur the patient should seek urologic evaluation.

## Prostrate Cancer Prevention Month

Prostate Cancer is the most common cancer in men in the US. The disease is rare before age 40; however, every man has some level of risk for getting prostate cancer. Prostate Cancer is more common in developed countries. The exact reasons are unknown but are probably related to lifestyle and dietary factors.

Knowing your level of risk can help you develop your plan of attack. In general, men should begin testing for prostate cancer at age 45. If you have one ore more of the risk factors, you should begin annual prostate cancer testing at age 40. Below are the primary risk factors for prostate cancer:

- Age is the strongest risk factor. One in every six men gets prostate cancer at some point. The probability of prostate cancer varies greatly by age. By age 80, 70+% of men will have prostate cancer, although the aggressiveness of the disease decreases too with age.

- Race plays a key role. In the U.S., the rate is 60% higher for African-American men, and their mortality rate is two-and-a-half times that of Caucasian and Hispanic men. Asian men are lower than average. Studies are being done on potential differences in physiology, diet and access to care.

- Compared with men with no family history, men with a father or brother diagnosed have more than twice the risk. Men with two or more relatives have about five times the risk. Men with three or more relatives are almost guaranteed to get prostate cancer.

- Diets high in fat, meat and sugar and low in fruits, vegetables and fiber, may be one of the greatest factors contributing to prostate cancer. Studies suggest a strong relationship between consumption





On the other hand, if someone is convinced that God does not exist, counseling the doubtful may simply involve telling them that God cares about them nonetheless, and that His love for them is not conditioned upon their belief in Him. Sometimes a person's doubts are of a more personal nature; many of us suffer from low self-esteem and a lack of confidence in our own abilities. Counseling these people may simply involve telling them to trust themselves. Self-doubt can be crippling, and a reassuring pat on the back and some words of encouragement from a trusted friend or family member may often be all that is needed to melt away any lingering doubts. As always, we should counsel others with tact and discretion, remembering that our advice, especially if unsolicited, may not always be welcomed. Therefore, we should carefully reflect on how we might counsel the doubtful, in order to best restore their faith and confidence.

## Stierlen Presents Program At Chester Senior Center

R.N. Karen Stierlen, from the nursing home in Deshler, spoke at the Chester Senior Center last week on heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

Karen said that heat exhaustion is a condition which often occurs when people exercise (work or play) in a hot, humid place and body fluids are lost through sweating, causing dehydration and overheating of the body. The person's temperature may be elevated, but not above 104 F (40 C).

People most at risk are the young, the elderly and those with health conditions. Heat stroke, also referred to as sun stroke, is a life-threatening medical condition. The person's cooling system, which is controlled by the brain, stops working and the internal body temperature rises to the point at which brain damage or damage to other internal organs may result (temperature may reach 105 F or greater (40.5 C or greater)).

Nearly 700 people die each year due to heat-related illness, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Avoid heat exhaustion by not engaging in strenuous activity in hot, humid environments, and stay hydrated as prevention is the key.

The Dragons, currently 3-5 on the season, will take Homecoming week off before heading to Scandia Tuesday, Sept. 27.


## Thayer Central cross country places eighth


For the girls, Bailey Linton finished sixth overall with a time of 15:44 while Jasmine Kovacs finished in 21:51.5.



## Little Blue NRD Adopts New Groundwater Rules

The Little Blue NRD Board of Directors approved revisions to regulations for administering the Groundwater Management and Protection Act at their Sept. 13 board meeting. An informational meeting was held prior to the hearing to inform the public about the grounds for the new regulations.

A public hearing was held with several questions about the revisions from producers and consultants. The changes were approved by the full board at the regular monthly later in the evening. The adopted revised rules will take effect on Oct. 12, 2011.

Some of the new and revised regulations will apply equally across the district

- The current Nov. 1 anhydrous fertilizer date will continue as in the past as no change was made to this application. However, farmers who wish to apply liquid or dry per-plant nitrogen fertilizers, in which nitrogen is the greatest percent of the compound, or when the application results in a rate of over 20 pounds per acre of nitrogen over the field, may only do so after March 1, except under the following conditions:

A "fertilizer permit" will be required by the LBNRD prior to fertilizer applications.

A nitrogen inhibitor will be required if applying over 20 pounds of active nitrogen/acre.

An annual report will be required by March 15 of each year if the "fertilizer permit" was obtained.

- Another change is to lessen the limitations for irrigation water transfers by removing the need for a permit if the transfer is to be within the same section of land. Under the new rules, transfers across section lines still would require a permit, and the water could be moved no farther than to the quarter-section immediately adjacent or cater-corner to the section from which it is being pumped. (Transfers however, will not be allowed if the ground to which the water is to be pumped has no aquifer beneath it, or if the aquifer there would be insufficient to support the irrigation system on its own with no more than two wells.

- One key change to the rules and regulations would apply only to certain areas

based on hydrogeologic (aquifer) conditions. Specifically, no more than two irrigation wells would be allowed per quarter-section within "very high risk" areas identified on a map generated through a recently completed hydrogeologic study of the district. These areas generally lie along the fringes of the district's principal aquifer. Any wells already drilled and in use by the rule's adoption date will be considered "grandfathered" and can continue use, even in those "very high risk" areas.

- Additional district-wide changes include modification of an existing rule requiring that new irrigation wells be outfitted with a straight section of pipe equal to 10 times the diameter of the pipe, allowing room for future installation of a flow meter, if necessary. That requirement would be extended to existing wells in which the discharge piping was being repaired, modified or replaced "to the extent that such free space could be installed."

- Another major change is that all new well permit applications will be subject to a resource evaluation, looking at both the aquifer characteristics and the irrigation suitability of the soils at that location. If the resulting evaluation score for the site falls below the board's minimum standard score with respect to either water availability or soil erodibility, conditions could be applied to the permit requiring best management practices necessary to protect the land and water resources of the site.

The revised rules and regulations as well as the "risk map" have been posted on the Little Blue NRD website.

The Little Blue NRD General Manager Mike Onnen said that changes to the rules and regulations have been discussed for some time, but the district board was waiting for completion of the hydrogeologic mapping and soils irrigation suitability investigations so it would have the best science on which to base its decisions.

The Little Blue NRD encompasses all of Thayer County and parts of Adams, Clay, Fillmore, Jefferson, Nuckolls and Webster counties. The entire district is designated as a Level I Management Area.



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## Jumpstart To College Credits

High school juniors and seniors interested in getting a jumpstart on their college careers are encouraged to consider enrolling in Nebraska Wesleyan University's Honors Academy.

The program allows high school students the opportunity to take upper-level classes at their own school for both high school and college credit. Course credit will transfer to most colleges and universities that accept transfer credit from Nebraska Wesleyan.

Judy Muyskens, Nebraska Wesleyan University Provost, says dual enrollment programs offer a variety of benefits to students. For example, students can enter their first year of college with enough college credit to allow them the time and opportunity to explore additional extracurricular activities or acquire an additional major or minor. Dual enrollment can also give

high school students an edge in the college admissions process.

A 2010 study of Nebraska Wesleyan University students found that those who entered college with Honors Academy credits were more likely to graduate from college, 20 percent of them finishing early. Students who have gone onto college report that they are better prepared for college because of taking Honors Academy courses. Scholarships are available.

Thayer Central is one of the schools that offer Honors Academy classes.

## RHEN Celebrates 20th Anniversary

The Rural Health Education Network (RHEN), which was developed by the University of Nebraska Medical Center and the Nebraska Legislature to provide educational opportunities for health profession students, is celebrating its 20th anniversary.

By creating RHEN and forming partnerships with communities across the state, UNMC was able to develop a network of volunteer faculty to serve as preceptors for its students.

RHEN allows students to receive part of their professional education in sites away from the main UNMC campus.

Almost all UNMC students experience a rural rotation at some point in their education. In 2010, more than 530 UNMC students participated in 854 rural rotations in 74 Nebraska communities.

UNMC College of Medicine alumnus and RHEN director, Patrik Johansson, M.D., M.P.H., spoke glowingly of the RHEN program from his own personal perspective.

"When I was a medical student, my rural rotations in Sidney and Gordon exposed me to the breadth of primary care, and I became acutely aware of rural health professions shortages," he said. "These factors strongly influenced me to pursue a career in public health and in my capacity as RHEN director work toward addressing health professions

workforce shortages in rural Nebraska."

There are currently 95 Nebraska communities and 324 organizations who serve as rural rotation sites (located outside Douglas, Sarpy and Lancaster counties) for UNMC students.

They provide educational training for the following UNMC programs - clinical laboratory science, dentistry, medicine, nursing, pharmacy, physician assistant, physical therapy and radiography.

The preceptor sites in this area include:

Hebron: Priefert Pharmacy; Thayer County Health Services.

What others are saying about RHEN:

"My rural preceptors encouraged me to ask questions, and I was able to start building a network of health care professionals I still contact when I want to share information or bounce ideas off someone. Second, it isn't just the preceptor who influences the students. During the rotation, students experience all aspects of living in rural communities, and it helps them decide whether a town is someplace they would like to work and raise their families."

for non-emergency transfer of patients from their home to the hospital or vice versa. The newly purchased ambulance will be used in these instances as well as cooperating with the presently existing rescue units whenever help is needed.

Turning the service over to the hospital is purely economical said current ambulance board president Dan Fink. "The number of calls didn't warrant the cost of keeping it running. It's just a matter of dollars and cents; we've been exploring different options for about two years."

But with the hospital's acquisition comes new rules for the ambulance, specifically the fact that it will not be used as back up for local volunteer departments since it will not be equipped to answer 911 calls. "The bad thing about this is that the City of Hebron will lose its back up since the ambulance will only be used for transportation purposes," said Hebron Fire Chief B.J. Linton at a recent city council meeting. "It also means our coverage area will expand since we often back up the other departments in the county. It will probably mean more expense to us."

Ironically, the five-member ambulance board consisting of all volunteer firemen will

also be dissolved with the hospital's acquisition.

"Since it will become a hospital department," said TCHS CEO Joyce Beck, "the hospital board will oversee it just as they do all other departments in the hospital." Beck said the hospital's contract with the county for the newly established department is good for five years.

In a budget projection presented to the hospital board last month, Beck said operational and non-operational expenses for the ambulance would run \$101,652 a year while operating revenue would bring in \$110,676 annually for a net income of \$9,024.

White said the current unit, a 2003 Ford with 40,000 miles is equipped with a new cot and ventilator and he would like to see an auto-pulse added. The difference between how the ambulance will now be equipped and how it was equipped determines its status, i.e., in a transportation vehicle, the patient has already been stabilized and less equipment and personnel are needed making the vehicle cheaper to operate.

The commissioners and hospital board agreed to the terms of the contract in August and the hospital will take over the ambulance October 1, 2011.

### Thistle Control During October

Thistles. Everybody seems to have problems with them. What you can do now to reduce thistles in your fields next year?

Timing is everything. That's particularly true with thistle control. October to early November is one of the best times to use herbicides.

Did you have thistles this year? If so, walk out in those infested areas this week. Look close. You'll probably find many thistle seedlings. Most thistle seedlings this fall will be small, in a flat, rosette growth form, and they are very sensitive now to certain herbicides. So spray this fall and thistles will not be a big problem next year.

Several herbicides are effective and recommended for thistle control. Maybe the most effective is a newer herbicide called Milestone, or a combination of Milestone and 2,4-D called Forefront. Two other very effective herbicides are Tordon 22K and Grazon. Be careful with Tordon and Grazon since they also can kill woody plants, including

trees you might want to keep. 2,4-D also works well while it's warm, but you will get better thistle control by using a little less 2,4-D and adding a small amount of Banvel or dicamba to the mix.

Other herbicides also help control thistles in pastures - like Redeem, Cimarron, and Curtail. No matter which weed killer you use, though, be sure to read and follow label instructions, and be sure to spray on time.

Next year, avoid overgrazing your pastures so your grass stands get thicker and compete with any new thistle seedlings.

Give some thought now to thistle control during October and November. Your pastures can be cleaner next spring.







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## FSA Disaster Assistance Deadlines Reported

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Bruce Nelson reminded producers recently about upcoming deadlines for disaster assistance. Nelson emphasized that losses must be the result of a weather event occurring on or before Sept. 30, 2011.

"This year brought a host of extreme weather challenges for America's farmers, ranchers and producers," said Nelson "USDA is committed to use the resources at our disposal to reduce the impact of these conditions and help producers get back on their feet. And this year, especially, it's important for producers to be aware of program deadlines and to have their records in order so that they get the assistance they need.

The 2008 Farm Bill authorizes coverage of disaster losses through these five programs:

- Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE)
- Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP)
- Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honey Bees and Farm-raised Fish (ELAP)
- Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) and
- Tree Assistance Program (TAP)

SURE applications for 2010 crop losses will be accepted later this fall. SURE applications for 2011 crop losses will be accepted in the fall of 2012, when the 2011 farm revenue data required by statute becomes available.

FSA is required to determine that the claimed loss was because of a disaster occurring on or before Sept. 30, 2011. FSA must determine if a qualifying loss meets the established disaster relief criteria

for at least one crop. At the time the SURE application for payment is filed, the producer will be required to identify and certify a crop of economic significance that suffered a qualifying loss of 10 percent or more. At least one such crop with 10 percent losses on or before Sept. 30, 2011, is required by SURE.

"We encourage all producers to read the applicable disaster program fact sheets and visit their local FSA county office. The staff can provide additional information such as the deadline for filing a program application or the initial requirement for filing a notice of loss," Nelson said.

Important dates for the five disaster programs are summarized below.

**SURE:** Deadline to file a notice of loss, no deadline for SURE, but check with your crop insurance or noninsured Crop Disaster Program (NAP) policy; application period, 2009 closed, 2010 begins fall 2011; 2011 begins fall 2012.

**LFP:** Deadline to file a notice of loss, not applicable; application period now through Jan. 30, 2012.

**LIP/ELAP:** Deadline to file a notice of loss, within 30 days of when the loss is apparent, but not later than Dec. 29, 2011; application period now through Jan. 30, 2012.

**TAP:** Deadline to file a notice of loss, not applicable when loss is apparent; application period within 90 days of when loss is apparent.

• Losses must be due to a weather event that occurs on or before Sept. 30, 2011.
