Hebron city council stands by its decision

Over 20 people filled city hall on Sept. 17 for a special meeting called in response to the city council's decision to turn down a proposed ordinance that would not allow body art establishments in the city of Hebron.

"We should remember that this issue is near and dear to both sides of the argument," said Mayor Shane Day to start off the meeting.

Several of the attendees came to voice their concerns over the council's decision.

"This is not about people with or without tattoos," said Judy Walters who did not support the council's decision. "This is not about a personal attack against a certain type of business. This is about due process."

Walters stated that she felt due process was not followed and wanted the opportunity to state her concerns before the city council.

"We respectfully request that the council take a re-vote based on proper due process and in the future work together as a team with the citizens to

make this community a place we can be proud of and leave to our children," said Walters.

The council responded that notices were posted the Friday before the previous council meeting at the city office, the bank and post office.

Other citizens in attendance also expressed other concerns.

"Why is the city council deciding what type of businesses should be allowed?" said Michele Modlin who owns the Bottle Shop in Hebron. "There is a business that wants to fill up one of our empty store fronts. I prefer to have people come here rather than Omaha or Lincoln to do their business."

"We have so many empty businesses and the idea that you can get a group of people in town together and decide who we will allow in or who we will allow to succeed scares me," said Sam Mills. "We shouldn't have the chosen few say 'we don't want people like you in our town.'"

"We did have a community survey done that we looked specifically at 'what does this community need?' said council member Kurk Wiedel, who voted for the ordinance in the previous meeting. "We talked about restaurants, hotels and additional businesses but not once was a tattoo parlor

ever brought up within that discussion."

For some, the issue brought back memories of the recent school bond issue.

"It tears me apart that we're polarizing our community once again," said Steve Anderson, owner of the Central Market. "I don't want to tear our community apart. We're just now starting to heal after the last battlefield."

The city council used the meeting as an opportunity to remind citizens to get involved in government process.

"This is a good lesson for all of us," said Wiedel. "Our history teachers told us we have to get involved in the processes of our government because they are ultimately defining the rules by which we go."

At the end of the meeting, a motion was made by Wiedel to suspend the rules but the motion was not passed.

The council chose to stand by its original decision to allow body art establishments in the city of Hebron.

"We have to have the credibility once we've decided something not to inverse ourselves," said council member Larry Fangmeier.

Commissioners raise property tax

Last Wednesday, the Thayer County Board of Commissioners held their bi-weekly meeting at the courthouse.

Near the top of the agenda was a resolution to change the property tax request for the next budget year, beginning July 1.

The commissioners resolved to increase the property tax by three percent. The levy went down from 23 to 17.

The next commissioners meeting will occur at 9 a.m. at the courthouse.

Roehr's Machinery is making this application to facilitate a new location for their business.

Decontamination class offered at TCHS

Local health care and emergency service professionals, as well as those from several other professions, came from all over the state came to train at Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) last Wednesday and Thursday. Bill McPherson, the Thayer County emergency preparedness director was among them.

Their focus: hazmat safety and response.

The Hospital First Receiver Course worked with health professionals on how to properly handle situations involving hazardous and toxic materials.

"The most common for them to see around here is farm chemicals," said Barb Dodge, a course instructor and director of hospital preparedness from the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

One class is especially important: the decontamination course.

The course is meant to instruct trainees how to react in the event of a patient(s) showing up with chemicals on them.

According to Dodge, because of the expenses, only three of these

classes are offered a year. It shows the hospital's commitment to preparedness.

"Before [the patients] ever go in the emergency room, they have to be decontaminated or you've just exposed everyone in your emergency room," said Deb Aaron, emergency preparedness director at TCHS.

Trainees suited up from head to toe before the activity began to prevent any skin-to-skin contact with the patients. They wore gas masks and duct taped their gloves and rubber shoes to the rest of their suits.

"We have to keep staff safe first or they can't take care of patients," said Dodge.

"Victims," covered in a dark mystery liquid, approached the suited trainees. Some of the volunteer victims were screaming. Others held child-size blow-up dolls out to the trainees asking them to "save their baby."

The volunteers were given bright yellow bracelets and had to remove all clothing before stepping into nearby tents for the next phase. The volunteers wore swimsuits underneath their clothes.

While in the tents, the victims were immediately rinsed off so all traces of chemicals were removed from their skin and hair.

In the background, Sharon Vandergriff, the decon team leader, shouted instructions and questions from a megaphone.

"It teaches them the importance of recognizing chemicals before it gets in," said Dodge, who also provided support and instruction from the sidelines. "That's the goal."

Other courses offered during those two days included hazmat, hazmat response, and identification and hazard assessment.

"An important part of health care is being prepared for disasters," said Aaron.

B.S. Ferris who was the first president of the First National Bank of this place, died in Denver, Colo.

McCloskey reports the sale of ten full suits of clothing last Saturday.

Attorney M.H. Weiss has ornamented his residence with a handsome piazza.

Conductor Patch requests us to say that "the game of the young lady who beat her way to Chester and back on the excursion train, asserting that she had lost her ticket, is known."

The team of Harvey Lemon of Kiowa precinct ran away and his little daughter was seriously hurt, the report we heard stating she was not expected to live.

Chester Today is a big day for Chester. A horse race and a circus are the attractions.

Alexandria News School commenced in District 30. Miss Mary Willard teacher.

The Carletonian A drove of Texas ponies from Kansas were in town.

Prof. Holmes, musical author and teacher from Hubbell, organized a class in vocal music here.

An effort is being made to get a license for a saloon here, but the opinion prevails that it will fail.

The new Presbyterian church of Hubbell was dedicated. The building cost \$1,929.50.

1894

120 Years Ago

Miss Flora Lamont and Charles H. Merriam of Detroit, Mich., were married at the home of the bride's parents, two miles north of Hebron.

Belvidere R.B. Upton and his father have built a large reservoir on their land northeast of the city. It is about 10 feet deep and 150 in diameter and will be filled with water to be used in irrigating the land. The water will be furnished by two wells nearby to which a windmill is attached.

There was a meeting called by the citizens of Belvidere precinct and held at Douglas Bros. hall for the purpose of discussion the best means of taking care of those who are liable to become destitute during the coming winter. It was decided by a vote of those

present that J.W. Crawford should appoint a committee of six persons whose duty is to look after those who are needy, and have the power to call meetings at any time to procure means for their support.

W.J. Long has traded a western farm to Nedrow & Newman for their steam thrasher.

Mr. Newsham fell and the hind wheel of H.J. Miller's hearse ran over him. Fortunately he sustained no serious injury. The hearse weighs 1,200 pounds and was on a downgrade.

Thayer County offers \$50 for the same, and Mr. Harrold offers a reward of \$40, making in all a reward of \$390 for the arrest and conviction of the thief and return of the property.

1914

100 Years Ago

While killing a beef, Adolph Peggee, the butcher at Deshler, accidentally shot Will Oehling, the porter of Uphoff's saloon, at the slaughter yard, a mile east of town. They had got a beef inside the slaughterhouse when Peggee told Oehling to shut the door and get away. He was just on top of the fence when the shot was fired inside the slaughterhouse. The beef fell and Will yelled, "Peggee, I'm shot." The cartridge from the 25-20 rifle passed through the steer's head and through the 2x4, and a board of the wall and on into Will's right leg. Had he been on the ground instead of on the fence, the shot provably would have been fatal.



September is Suicide Prevention Month

Each year, over 30,000 people die by suicide in the United States. This is nearly twice the number of deaths by homicide. Suicide is the 11th leading cause of death, with one suicide occurring on average every 16 minutes. Even more alarming, suicide is the third leading cause of death among 15- to 24-year olds.

Ninety percent of people who die by suicide have a diagnosable mental illness. A suicidal person may not ask for help, but that doesn't mean help isn

National Preparedness Month

Department of Homeland Security has set September as National Preparedness Month. Take a little time from your busy schedule to take simple steps to prepare for emergencies for your home.

Make a family emergency plan so you will know how to communicate with your loved ones in case there is a disaster. For example, how would you reach your children at school or spouse at work if there was an accident? Thinking this through ahead of time will make a big difference.

Have an emergency supply kit in both your home and in your vehicle. Include in it water, food and first aid supplies that can help you survive if you lose power or get stranded in your car. Go to <http://ready.gov> to find a list of suggested supplies.

Be sure every member of your family knows your home and/or cell phone number to call in case of emergency. If you have a cell phone, program into it an "ICE" (In Case of Emergency) as your contact in case you are in an accident.

Emergency personnel will often check your ICE listings in order to get hold of someone you know. Make sure to tell your family and friends you have listed them as ICE.

Make sure each of your family members know how to text message (also known as SMS or Short Message Service). Text messages can often get around network disruptions when a phone call might not be able to get through the network.

Subscribe to alert services provided to learn about potential severe weather in your local area. Often times, other emergency messages are sent in case of danger in your local area. To subscribe, check with your local law enforcement or county emergency manager.

Good family communication is important at all times, but especially important during disasters. Start preparing an emergency plan for your family before an emergency happens.

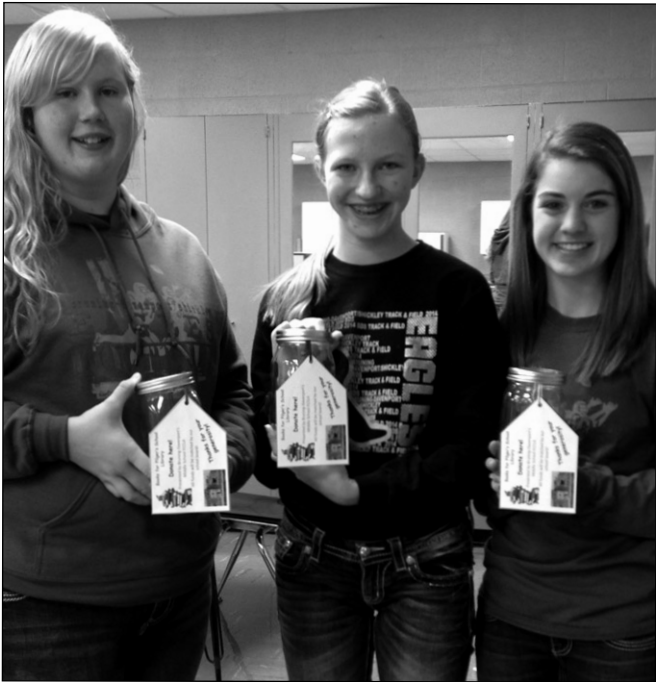

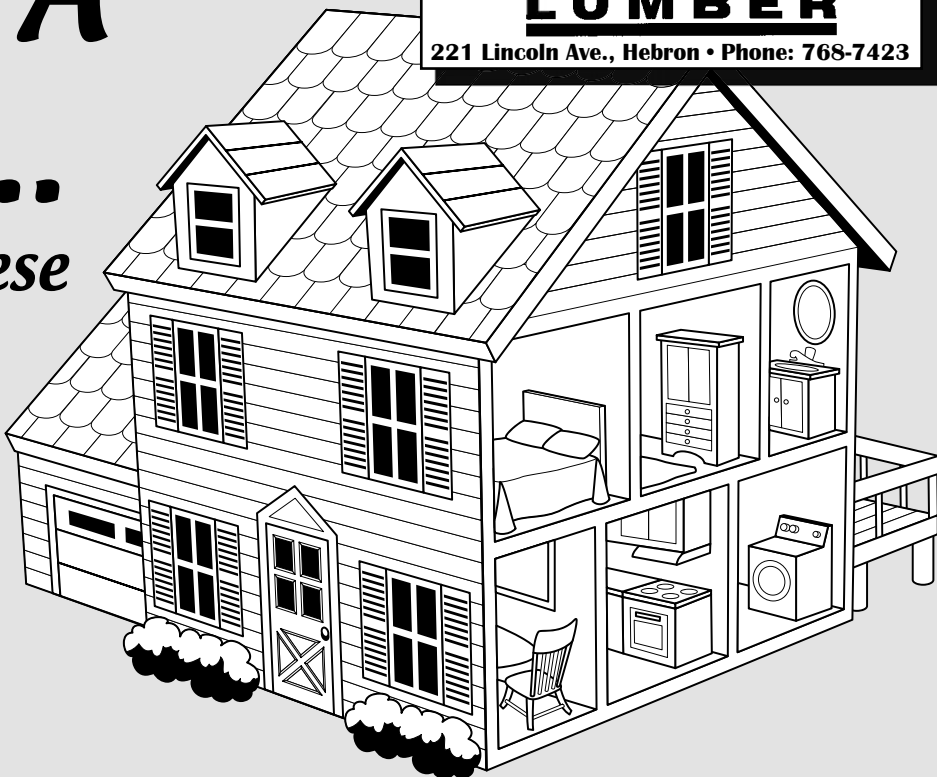

Now, therefore, be it resolved, by the Board of Commissioners of Thayer County, Nebraska as follows:

The Board of Trustees of the Village of Chester, Thayer County, Nebraska, met at 7:30 p.m. at the Village Hall on September 10, 2014, for their regular monthly meeting. Board members present were: Chairman: Carboneau and Trustees: Wassom, Pacht, Heinrichs and Roop.

Chairman Carboneau called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. The minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed. Wassom moved and Pacht seconded a motion to approve the minutes of the August meeting. Roll call votes: Ayes: Wassom, Pacht, Heinrichs, Roop and Carboneau. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Treasurers Report was then given. Having excess funds in the general fund, Heinrichs moved and Roop seconded a motion to transfer \$10,000.00 to the Fire Department Fund, \$1,000.00 to the Park Fund, \$10,000.00 to the Auditorium Fund, and \$1,000.00 to the Senior Center Fund, and to approve the treasurer's report. Roll call votes: Ayes: Wassom, Pacht, Heinrichs, Roop and Carboneau. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Chairman Carboneau opened the Budget Hearing at 7:40 p.m., leaving the hearing open during the duration of the regular meeting for public input.

Geneie Andrews/Larm Ins, Bart Brinkman, Walter Ins, and Jeff Clymer, Ball Insurance/Continental Western Ins, were present at the meeting to discuss our current insurance rates versus changing to LARM Ins, an insurance pool. Mr. Brinkman represents both companies. Ms. Andrews gave her presentation, for LARM, at the August meeting. She again pointed out differences between LARM and other insurance companies during this meeting, also video taping the session. Mr. Clymer, representing the village's current insurance company, Continental Western, gave his presentation , to the Board, also pointing out several differences between the companies. Since our new policy was just renewed August 1, Mr. Clymer suggested putting the insurance out for formal bids in May. No action taken.

Dallen George, Reuben Schleifer & Mike and Tom Tipton were present to discuss, with the Board, concerns that they and others have, about the future of Chester. They have had a couple of community meetings with good attendance. They want to start a nonprofit organization to help with the cleanup of properties, removal of dilapidated houses and buildings to help make the village's appearance as such that would attract people and businesses that maybe would move here. They asked the Board for their approval and assistance and will keep the Board informed of their actions. They are having a community cleanup day on October 11. The Board agreed to provide a dumpster for the project and assist with the cleanup. Heinrichs moved and Roop seconded a motion that the village will pay the cost of asbestos inspections on dilapidated houses before demolition. Roll call votes: Ayes: Wassom, Pacht, Heinrichs, Roop and Carboneau. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Everett Roop, representing the Village of Chester, Board of Health, stated that they met on August 13, 2014, and inspected the dilapidated houses and property belonging to Jeffery Pingel at 321 Croop Street and 315 Kelly Street,

within the Village of Chester, NE. Notice was sent to Jeffery Pingel by certified mail and it was confirmed that he received it. He was to request a hearing within five days of receipt of this notice and has not done so. Mr. Roop presented, to the Village Board of Trustees, a notice of the conditions found on these properties and the Board of Health has determined them public nuisances as described in #91.20 of the Chester Municipal Code. The Board of Health, of the Village of Chester, NE, recommends that abatement procedures proceed for these properties. The Village Board of Trustees will have a hearing with Jeffery Pingel on October 8, 2014, at the regular board meeting to hear any objections to the evidence submitted by the Board of Health.

Chairman Carboneau and Ray Wit recently attended a meeting in York, NE, given by the Nebraska Department of Roads, concerning the speed limits on Highway 81 around Chester. The speed limit is currently 55 mph and the Department of Roads wants to raise the speed limit to 65 mph. They want Chairman Carboneau to concur with their findings. Because of the many vehicle accidents that have occurred on the corner of Highways 8 and 81, Chairman Carboneau, and the Village Board, do not concur with their findings and has sent them a letter in reference to this matter.

Recently, there have been a couple of requests from tree removal companies to bring trees to our tree dump from outside of the village. It was allowed twice for a fee. After discussion the Board decided that they will not allow trees or other debris to be brought into the village from outside of the village limits.

Zito Media, the current cable television provider in the Village of Chester, was discussed. The Village no longer has a current franchise agreement with them, and the condition of their system is in need of many repairs. Zito representative, Joe Dixon, stated in the spring that Zito would be doing upgrades to the system. Nothing has been done and most residents now have satellite dishes. Inquiries were sent to village residents with no favorable comments. Pacht moved and Roop seconded a motion to have Zito Media remove their cable television system from the Village of Chester. Roll call votes: Ayes: Wassom, Pacht, Heinrichs, Roop and Carboneau. Nays: None. Motion carried.

It was decided to sign a contract with Sargent Well Drilling to do the maintenance on our water wells.

Byron is in need of a temporary water operator and would like Ray to fill in. The Board decided to have Ray Wit be Byron's temporary water operator, through December for \$100.00 per month.

The Board had discussions about upcoming street work, costs of sewer repairs, getting bids on an Ambulance building, and nitrate levels in the old well.

The Budget was again discussed. With the hearing held and no objections to the prepared budget, Wassom moved and Roop seconded a motion to approve the 2014-2015 Budget as prepared by Blobaum and Busboom P.C. Roll call votes: Ayes: Wassom, Pacht, Heinrichs, Roop and Carboneau. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Hebron City Council met in regular session, Monday, September 8, 2014, at 6:30 P.M., at the City Hall. Mayor Shane Day presided and the proceedings were recorded by City Clerk Jean Nagey. BUDGET HEARING-CONSIDERATION OF APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE

SPECIAL BUDGET HEARING-RESOLUTION TO CHANGE PROPERTY TAX REQUEST

The hearing on the 2014-2015 budget was held. Brian Blobaum was present to discuss the budget. All interested parties were heard from.

A special hearing was held to consider a change in the amount of tax request from the prior year. Councilmember Fangmeier introduced the following Resolution and moved its adoption:

RESOLUTION 2014-18

WHEREAS, Nebraska Revised Statute 77-1601.02 provides that the property tax request for the prior year shall be the property tax request for the current year for purposes of the levy set by the County Board of Equalization unless the Governing Body of the City of Hebron passes by a majority vote, a resolution or ordinance setting the tax request at a different amount; and

WHEREAS, a special public

hearing was held as required by law to hear and consider comments concerning the property tax request; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the City of Hebron that the property tax request for the current year be a different amount than the property tax request for the prior year.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Governing Body of the City of Hebron by a majority vote, resolves that:

1. The 2014-2015 property tax request be set at \$258,299.00.

2. The 2014-2015 property tax bond request be set at \$16,588.00.

3. A copy of this resolution be certified and forwarded to the County Clerk prior to October 13, 2014.

Councilmember Bauer seconded the motion for adoption and upon roll call vote, the following Councilmembers voted AYE: Bauer, Koch, Fangmeier, Huber, Dodes, Wiedel. The following voted NAY: None. The Mayor declared said Resolution passed and adopted.

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT THE BUDGET STATEMENT TO BE TERMED THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL; TO APPROPRIATE SUMS FOR NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES; TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE

and moved that the statutory rule requiring reading on three different days be suspended. Councilmember Bauer seconded the motion to suspend the rules and upon roll call vote on the motion, the following Councilmembers voted AYE: Bauer, Koch, Fangmeier, Huber, Wiedel, Dodes. The following voted NAY: None. The motion to suspend the rules was adopted by three-fourths of the Council and the statutory rule was declared suspended for consideration of said Ordinance.

Said Ordinance was then read by title and thereafter Councilmember Fangmeier moved for final passage of the Ordinance, which motion was seconded by Councilmember Bauer. The Mayor then stated the question, "Shall Ordinance No. 849 be passed and adopted?" Upon roll call vote, the following Councilmembers voted AYE: Wiedel, Dodes, Huber, Fangmeier, Koch, Bauer. The following voted NAY: None. The passage and adoption of said Ordinance having been concurred in by a majority of all members of the Council, the Mayor declared the Ordinance adopted and the Mayor in the presence of the Council signed and approved the Ordinance and the Clerk attested the passage approval of the same and affixed her signature thereto. A true, correct, and complete copy of said Ordinance will be preserved and kept in a separate and distinct volume known as "Ordinance Record, City of Hebron, Nebraska."

Motion was then made by Fangmeier and seconded by Koch to approve the budget as published.

Due to the tie vote, it was necessary for the Mayor to vote to break the tie. Mayor Shane Day voted NAY. The passage and adoption of said Ordinance failed.

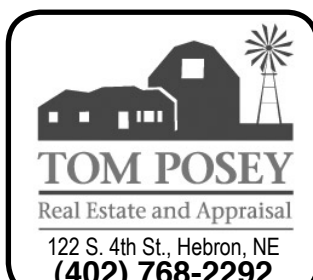


