Father Hupp Wildlife Area...

Father Hupp Wildlife Management Area in Thayer County will close temporarily for a wetland renovation and development project, effective immediately. The area will close for all public activity, including hunting, and appropriate signs will be installed.

The area is tentatively scheduled to reopen on October 21, depending on the progress of construction activities. The enhancement of this wetland area will greatly increase its use by migratory waterfowl and provide more hunting opportunities.

The 2013 Water Jamboree Committee will hold the 23rd annual Water Jamboree to be held September 25-26 at the LBNRD Recreational Area Liberty Cove outside of Lawrence.

Nearly 700 fifth and sixth graders throughout Adams, Clay, Fillmore, Thayer, Nuckolls and Webster counties will attend this two-day event. They will participate in various hands on activities geared towards the importance of preserving our natural resources. They will examine the drought conditions, irrigation methods, life in and outside the lake, a Skeeter's life, Edible Aquifer, the Power of Water and Migration Headache.

This festival is free to the participating schools and costs are off-set by the Little Blue and Upper Big Blue NRDs. Presenters are from the University of Nebraska Extension, Natural Resources Conservation Service, NRDs, South Heartland District Health Department and volunteers.

Davenport Community Foundation dedicates new park

Foundation hopes this is first of many projects

New park benches, picnic tables, an American flag, newly planted grass and flowers greeted community members as they walked into the new Davenport Foundation Park.

Construction for the new park was completed in just a few short months and it is ready to be used. The first event held there was the dedication.

Many community members gathered on the newly placed pathway to watch as the Davenport Community Foundation members presented the Davenport Foundation Park.

"Downtown Davenport looks like something you'd see in a postcard," said village board chairman Justin Trapp during the dedication.

The Davenport Community Foundation hoped to create a space that everyone could use while adding something to the downtown area in Davenport. In order to do that, the foundation decided a new park would be perfect.

"The idea began about two years ago," said Foundation vice president and treasurer Whitney Miller. "But we didn't start putting it into action until this spring."

In just a few months, the pathway and bricks were laid, everything was planted and the park was completed.

The completion of this park was

made possible by many donations and grant funds. The Davenport Community Foundation received a park grant from the Little Blue Natural Resources District. The grant amount for Davenport ended up being a little less than \$3,000.

The donations included 112

bricks donated, three park benches and one picnic table. Donors' names are printed on the bricks that they donated to the park.

Located on Maple Street in between two storefronts, the park is open for any community event, Miller said.

This project is one of the first projects completed by the Davenport Community Foundation, but the group hopes that it is not the foundation's last.

"Now that this is complete we are looking forward to our next project," Miller said.

Commissioners hear 2013-2014 budget

The Thayer County Board of Commissioners met September 18 to discuss new projects and hear updates about on-going items.

The meeting began with Thayer County road department updates from road superintendent Richard Heinrichs.

The roads department is working on numerous projects at the current time including fixing culverts and road grader inspections. The safety committee met and had some concerns. The concerns were addressed at this meeting.

Next, the commissioners held a hearing for comments concerning the 2013-2014 budget. Brian Blobaum presented the budget and highlighted some areas that have changed from last year. These include a lower levy rate approved by the commissioners at the last

meeting. The levy rate will go from 26 cents last year to 23 cents for the upcoming year. This is due to an increase in valuation.

After hearing these changes, the commissioners moved to accept the new budget.

Since there was a change in property tax requests, these had to be approved as well.

Commissioners also met with Ray Wright to address the new county seal project.

Although many more things still need to be decided, the commissioners hope to hold a contest for new designs for the county seal. It would be open to all ages of residents in Thayer County.

At this time, they hope to have three different divisions and choose division winners and then one overall winner. There is not a time frame set for this contest.

During the last portion of the meeting, commissioners met with

Bill McPherson and Gary Watson to discuss the current state of the Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) located in the courthouse.

The courthouse currently has two, but they both need some improvements. One of them needs to be upgraded while the other needs new pads.

The commissioners decided to look into completing the updates and deciding whether or not both were needed.

In other business, the commissioners:

- authorized the signing of draw down documents for the Housing Study Grant.

- authorized the chairman to sign Annual Audit documents that are required by Nebraska Department of Economic Development in regard to the housing study grant.

Commissioners will meet again on October 2.

Hebron man arrested on three charges

The Thayer County Sheriff's Office arrested John W.K. Coyle, 22, of Hebron on a warrant on September 22. According to Sheriff David Lee, Coyle was arrested on three different charges. The charges include theft by unlawful taking, burglary and criminal mischief.

According to Lee, Coyle is also a suspect in the theft of a vehicle from Fairbury that was recovered in Hebron. Information regarding the case has been forwarded to Jefferson County.

Coyle is currently being held at the Thayer County Jail.

Annual Fall Festival slated for October 6

Final preparations are being made for the annual Heritage Fall Festival held at the Thayer County Museum in Belvidere. It will take place on October 6 from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. This year marks the fortieth year of the festival.

This year will feature a special display of wedding dresses. According to Jackie Williamson, curator of the museum, there have been over 30 donated for display. The earliest dresses come from the 1890s with present day dresses being displayed as well.

Once again this year will also feature special music. Bob Dawley and other musicians will visit the festival once again to play Bluegrass music. Laurie Martinez, a member of the band Broad Appeal, will be singing music of the 1950s. Jeff Hammer and his daughter will also play music on their accordion and drums during the meal.

The meal will begin at 11 a.m., and will be served at the Belvidere Community Center which is located next to the museum complex grounds.

Many pioneer demonstrations will take place throughout the day including spinning, black smithing, rope making and horse shoeing.

In the old country school, school will be in session with the school-marm.

Vendors will also be at the festival with crafts, pumpkins and china painters along with a farmers market and food booths. There will also be a car show with classic cars on the museum grounds.

In conjunction with the fortieth year of the fall festival, the Hebron Chapter of the Eastern Star will also be celebrating its 125th year of the organization in the Lodge Room in the three story brick building of the museum.

1883

130 Years Ago

The sorghum works are in busy operation.

Anti-monopoly County Convention in Hebron next Saturday.

The demand for residences continues unabated.

It is said that Mr. Burgess of York will build an elevator at this place.

A number of divorce cases were granted during this term of court.

Republican County Convention is Hebron on October 6.

Land in this county has advanced in price during the past year about 50 percent.

Fayette Kingsley's engine and boiler for his sorghum mill have arrived and are in position.

The ten new dwelling houses being built for John G. Deshler have all been spoken for already.

Mr. and Mrs. H.B. Davis of Chester met with a sad loss in the death of their little son.

Henry Leland of Gilead precinct, has negotiated a sale of his farm and expects to change his location.

A.J. Barlow just arrived in Belvidere from Coles, Ill., brought a number of full-blooded Poland China hogs for sale.

Wm. Griffin, the photographer, has been taking a number of views of public and private buildings in Hebron.

J.J. Kern, proprietor of the Friedensau Stock Farm, received from Corning, Iowa, a valuable shorthorn animal.

Mrs. H.J. Mahaffey of Carleton has engaged in the millinery and dressmaking business.

J. Topping of Gilead precinct, is selling new corn planted after May 26. This is the first corn brought to Hebron this fall.

Married at the residence of the bride's sister in Carleton by the Rev. J. McDonald, N.B. Stickel and Miss Phebe Piercy.

Noah Brittenham of Davenport reports the sale of 2,000 acres of land in his vicinity, recently to actual residents, and he says all the purchasers are republicans.

The fire proof vaults in the county clerk's and county treasurer's offices, costing about \$850, will afford safe and sufficient room for county records for a number of years to come.

In some gymnastic performances about two weeks since, H. Johnson of Hubbell precinct, broke one of his legs.

Joseph Walker, one of the very first settlers in this county, living near Meridian, has a number of apple trees loaded with fruit. The crop on one tree he estimates at 20 bushels.

Geo. W. Loeber of Chester informs us that about three-fourths of a mile of the new railroad is graded, and that two carloads of horses and mules to work on the grade arrived today.

The new advertisement of Stokes & Burgner, proprietors of the Blue Valley Mill appears in this issue. These gentlemen have recently made extensive and expensive improvements in their mill, formerly known as Leland's Mill.

Postmaster J.L. Fitchpatrick is among the fortunate ones. About two years ago he made an application for pension and was much gratified last week by receiving notice that the claim had been allowed and his name placed on the pension rolls at the rate of six dollars a month. The pension was granted for injuries to his health as the result of seven months confinement in Andersonville.

J.H. Bartels of Friedensau lost a horse valued at \$125 by an accident on the Friedensau bridge. The bridge for some time has been in a dangerous condition, but during the day had become much worse. In crossing, his horse's feet went through the hole in the bridge, and its body fell on the floor with such force as to burst some internal organs, from the effects of which it died in about six hours. Mr. Bartels informs us he shall lay a claim for damage before the county commissioners, and in case they refuse to pay it, he will prosecute his claim by appeal.

1893

120 Years Ago

C.M. Gates of this precinct took the first premium on celery at the state fair.

The improvised horse race at the fair was won by W.L. Thompson's horse.

Haffner & Green have completed the veneering to their livery barn.

The rain of last week was worth \$67,353.23 to the winter wheat and other fall sown crops in this county.

A number of cases of typhoid fever have developed.

A fire occurred on the farm of Frank Pracher, west of Stoddard, that destroyed his threshing machine and six stacks of wheat.

At the state fair, Wetherald Brothers of this city received the first premium on flour. That is a distinction our enterprising millers may well feel proud of.

J.M. Fitchpatrick, P.M. (which is Italian for afternoon and French for postmaster—we use the French translation here) is a successful Nimrod. While hunting near Bower the other day he killed nine ducks with one shot. He is abundantly able to prove this statement, and any intimation that there was one feather less than nine ducks will make the intimidator a persona non grata to the shooter. When our postmaster is wrathful he weighs 27.3 ounces to the pound.

W.M. Barger returned from the Cherokee strip. He said, "I was down in that country once before in 1871. I thought then that I wouldn't give a box of matches per acre for 160 acres there and I think so yet."

Died of inflammation of the bowels, Johnnie Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. M.N. Miller of Dry Creek, this county. Johnnie had swallowed a peach seed which produced inflammation. He became rapidly worse and Doctors Sutherland, Easton and Hinchman performed an operation removing the peachstone. It was found that the peach stone had worked a hole through one of the intestines and that the patient was beyond help. He died within an hour.

Roy Sperry is in the State Bank at Belvidere and will learn the banking business under cashier Smith.

Mr. Reeson from Iowa, this week purchased the Otts farm near the Dunkard church; consideration \$5,200.

S.C. Clark of Chester returned from the Cherokee. We understand he took a claim and is willing to sell his equity in it for \$10.

Mary Joe sold her property in Alexandria and will go in company with her daughters to St. Joseph, Mo., to reside.





It is a good idea to plan ahead and keep a record of your healthcare appointments, health tests, lab tests, results, health professionals, insurance companies, condition symptoms, and more all in one place. Having it readily available will help save time, reduce stress, and may even help you obtain better care.

This health information can be put together to develop a "Personal Health Record (PHR)" for yourself or a loved one's health. A PHR is a record of your health or the health of someone you are caring for. It includes contact information, symptoms, medications, diagnosis, appointments, and records describing every incident or visit.

Doctors take down notes and keep vital information about you or your loved one's health at each appointment. You, too, can keep a personal health record and store it in a safe place at home or in your office. Your records may even contain more information than the doctor has, and may contain critical information about day-to-day activities relating to health.

Members of your family see many health professionals; dentist, orthodontist, eye doctor, pediatrician, etc. They may even see specialist such as an allergist, endocrinologist or dermatologist to mention a few. The list of healthcare professionals can be significant even when you are not having a medical issue. Keeping a record of all your current healthcare professionals will help you stay organized.

Other reasons for keeping a PHR:

- Having one place for all information will help you stay informed and save time.
- You will have important contact information when needed.
- You will have an accurate record of what happens with each visit or daily symptoms.
- Better care if you write

down questions before each visit. You can also use your PHR to write down the answers to your questions.

• A great resource in case someone else takes a loved one to an appointment.

• Valuable health information is available during an emergency.

Starting a PHR may be time consuming, but it will save you time when you need it most; doctor appointments, medical emergencies, etc. There are even portable devices available to help you organize your PHR. Hardcopy items can be scanned in to make them more portable and take up less space.

Items you may consider including in a PHR: medical condition information, prescription medications, allergies and known reactions to any medications, family history, surgeries, trauma, inpatient or out-patient care, immunizations, appointments, symptom sheets for health or condition symptoms, notes surrounding doctor visits, a health incident, or anything else you think might be important, section on question or concerns, test results, Doctor's letters, lab tests results, lab test data, copies of insurance claims, healthcare professional business cards, directions to healthcare professional offices, hospitals, clinics, and any other place you and your loved one may visit as part of the healthcare plan.

You can start today with important contact information for your healthcare professionals, medications and any diagnosis. You can start adding to it every time you sit in the waiting room at the doctor's office. Copies of items in your medical records can be made available upon request.




