Hebron City Council sets levy slightly higher Utility fund eyed for assistance if needed

The Hebron City Council met in a special session Monday, Sept. 10, due to the Labor Day holiday Monday, Sept. 3. At the meeting, the council heard and accepted the 2012-13 city budget.

City accountant Brian Blobaum presented the summary stating council members are required by state statute to set the property tax request for the general fund and bond fund for 2013, then set the maximum allowed expenditures limit for the City as a

whole for the 2012-13 fiscal year.

This year, Blobaum suggested setting the levy rate at 46.8973 cents, up slightly from 46.0524 cents last year, which sets the property tax at \$249,101 in the general fund. Last year the property tax was set at \$241,461.

For the bond fund property tax, \$15,935 was set for 2013 requiring a levy rate of three cents per \$100 valuation, which is the same as last year. "Actual scheduled payments for the coming year on these bonds total \$13,813," Blobaum told the council.

"These bonds may now be prepaid since they have been outstanding over five years, and you probably want to take a look at doing that."

The total net property tax increase of all funds is budgeted at 3.05 percent for this year, compared to last year's 0.8 percent increase, Blobaum explained in his report to the council. New property growth will absorb 1.48 percent leaving 1.57 percent increase on prior existing properties.

Overall, budget expenditures for the City are set at approximately

\$8.5 million for 2012-13 versus an estimated actual expenditure of approximately \$4.45 million for the current fiscal year. "This expenditure limit is set at the maximum amount of funds you have available," the accountant said. "The limit is way over what we would expect you to spend."

Blobaum commented in his report that the overall projected cash position of \$4.23 million appears to have decreased from the beginning-of-the-

Local veterinarian part of emergency response team

Local veterinarian, Dr. Cindy Sasse, has been part of an initiative involving over 180 veterinarians in the state to be prepared in the face of agroterrorism for the last decade. LEDRS (Livestock Emergency Response System) is an organized group of individuals concerned with the potential spread and control of serious disease among animals.

In 2001, foot and mouth disease broke out in the United Kingdom crippling the livestock industry, Dr. Sasse recalls. "I'm sure anyone who owns livestock will vividly remember the news clips showing the burning piles of animals."

At the same time, a pseudorabies virus outbreak in Nebraska caused state officials, including State Veterinarian Dr. Dennis Hughes, to take a second look at how devastating the spread of such diseases could be to the industry. Following on the heels of the outbreaks, the 9/11 tragedy turned those concerned individuals to speculation about agroterrorism. The events of 9/11 brought to the forefront the realities of the potential of a foreign animal disease, or an agroterrorist event, that could endanger the state's number one industry - livestock. Dr. Hughes explained earlier this summer during a livestock emergency disease response system meeting.

Today, after a decade of organization, LEDRS works hand-in-hand with the Nebraska Department of Agriculture and homeland security to coordinate and execute a rapid response to the outbreak (or potential outbreak) of a livestock disease.

"We began to formulate ways in which to control and quickly eradicate an outbreak of disease such as foot and mouth, the fastest spreading and most devastating virus to threaten our livestock," Dr. Sasse said. "We took computer courses to become comfortable working within an ICS (incident command system)

organization and trained with various emergency response groups. Since its organization, we've been fine-tuning our skills in the case of a livestock emergency."

Dr. Sasse said the group has already responded to smaller scale incidences and their training kept disease from spreading very efficiently. "We are ready to answer the call," Dr. Sasse says. "We are now able to react in a matter of hours, not days. We are an educated and trained emergency response team."

Historical Society to ring in season with 39th annual Fall Festival

The Thayer County Historical Society is busy sewing up details for its 39th annual fall festival, Oct. 7, at the Thayer County Museum grounds in Belvidere. The theme for this year's celebration is "A Stitch in Time." Several demonstrations will be on hand featuring old-time sewing techniques such as embroidery, knitting, crochet and quilting.

The day begins with the traditional dinner served at the Belvidere Community Center starting at 11 a.m. As is customary, the dinner features a wide selection of homemade food including pies and cakes.

Also on tap will be crafts, pumpkins, needlework, china painters, a farmers market, and food booths as well as old-time farming demonstrations such as blacksmithing, rope making, horseshoeing and a laundry demonstration by Edna Reinke and Pat Schardt.

Also, featured entertainment includes Blue Grass musician Bob Dawley, plus other musical entertainers.

1882

130 Years Ago

The Masons commenced laying stone on the town hall last Saturday and if the weather is favorable the building will loom up in a short time.

Dr. T.D. Briston will soon go to Kansas City and remain during the winter. Those wanting dental work done this fall had better see to it soon.

Clate Wetherald has leased his sheep and has gone to Denver, Colo., to spend the winter. He will probably engage in some kind of business while there, as he is not one of the loafing kind.

It is said that Uncle Billy Sykes has gone to Missouri to get him a wife and some of the young ladies who have been riding in Uncle Billy's spring wagon will have to pedestrainize, or secure another suitor.

Ben Young has commenced the erection of a fine residence on his place near the poor farm. Mr. Young is making the nursery business and farming pay, as is shown by the improvements he is making on his farm.

John R. Morgan and family of McLean County, Ill., friends of H.H. Hersh, have come to this county and will probably make their home here. They brought their stock and household goods with them. At present they are stopping with Mr. Hersh until they can locate.

Last Saturday, John Carhart left at this office a peck of three varieties of potatoes, Michigan Beauty, Peerless and Strawberry, which he raised on the poor farm. They are the finest we have seen. Mr. C. is a practical farmer and no better selection could be made by our commissioners for the position he occupies. Under Mr. C's management, the farm is not only self-supporting, but pays a revenue to the county.

Wm. Griffin came near losing his art gallery and contents by fire yesterday. He had stepped out for a short time leaving his oil stove burning, the stove being new and the wick not being saturated with the oil before lighting, the fire descended into the oil tank. The oil took fire, unsoldering the tank and when discovered by Lee Thompson and Mr. Payne, the room was filled with smoke and flame. By prompt action no serious damage was done but a few minutes more the whole business would have been destroyed.

Last Tuesday, Mr. Cameron's little boy started to the river fishing. He did not return that night, and as he had but a straw hat, pants and shirt on, the parents became alarmed and yesterday morning a search was made along the river, supposing that he had been drowned; but later in the day the little urchin returned home through the rain. He had wandered out in the country too far to get back the same day and concluded to make a two day's trip of it.

"Happy are we all" The long dry weather was ended yesterday morning by a splendid rain, which continued throughout the day and portion of last night, thoroughly drenching and soaking everything that would take water. This morning the sun arose casting its beautiful rays over Mother Earth and "all nature smiles." The atmosphere has been freshened and purified, making it pleasant to breathe, after having inhaled dust for so long a time. Farmers can now do their plowing that they have been prevented from doing on account of the drought.

We visited S. Kingsley's sorghum works the other day, and must say that he has displayed a great deal of enterprise in establishing a manufactory of such magnitude. The eight horse power is in kind of a basement, above which is a three-roller horizontal mill through which the cane is run by the armful; from the mill extends an iron tube, which conduct the can juice into a vat, and from that

to the evaporators. These are several in number and are set on top of a large furnace about thirty feet in length. The fuel (pressed cane stalks) is put in at the south end, and the smoke is emitted through a large pipe, at the north end of the furnace. This fuel, Mr. K. claims is better for the purpose than either coal or wood, as it casts a greater volume of flame much farther than the latter, and of course not expensive. Kingsley is having a vat put up that will hold 1,500 gallons which he will fill with syrup. He has over 80 acres of his own cane to work, besides that which is brought in, for which he exchanges syrup, having a method of determining the quantity of saccharine matter in a given amount of cane by weight. At present they run off about 200 gallons per day, but the works have a capacity of 300 gallons. It will pay any one to visit the works.

J.M. Fitchpatrick received his commission as postmaster of Hebron and the office will be turned over to him Monday, giving Uncle Thompson the rest of mind that he so much needs. Jessie Thompson will remain in the office until the new postmaster becomes acquainted with the business.

T.L. Cadwallader called on us. He has located in Superior and will publish the first issue of the Superior Journal this week.

Mrs. Cutler lectured at the M.E. church. The house was crowded and at the close she called for the ladies opposed to woman suffrage to rise to their feet. Mother Wirt was the only one to arise and show her fair face. From the style of her dress the speaker suspected he, she or it was not genuine and asked the he, she or it to take its seat, and amid tremendous applause he suddenly fell. Of all people in the house, there were 60 for the amendment and ten opposed. C.F. McGrew was elected chairman of the woman suffrage association in this place. Mac will no doubt become a very popular candidate among the ladies.

Carleton

E.O. Wallace has sold his millinery shop and residence to a man from Lincoln. The man intends starting a bank in Carleton.

C.P. Leigh has returned from the east, bringing with him a wife.

About 200 friends of C.P. Leigh assembled on this premises, accompanied by the Carleton cornet band which discoursed some delightful music. The glee club was in attendance and rendered some appropriate songs for the occasion. The grounds were beautifully illustrated by myriads of Chinese lanterns.

Ann R. Boylston of Hebron celebrated her 90th birthday.



Smith Encourages Nebraskans To Complete USPS Surveys

Get the Most From Grazing Corn Stalks

Corn harvest is well underway and numerous cows are already out in stalk fields. Grazing corn stalks during winter has many benefits. Most importantly, it can save as much as a dollar a day per cow compared to feeding expensive hay.

The way you manage grazing of stalks by your cattle can have a big effect on its success. For instance, maybe you have a goal of feeding as little protein supplement as possible while winter grazing. Then you must make sure you have enough acres so your stocking level can be light enough so cattle can select just the higher quality plant parts to eat. Whenever the grain and husks are gone, move to a fresh field.

Another strategy might be to stretch winter stalks as far as possible. In that case, restricting animal access to small areas at a time by strip grazing until nearly all the grazable stalks are gone might be best. Or, maybe you use stalks just as a filler to keep cows from bellowing while you limit feed corn, distiller's grains, or other more nutrient dense feeds. Then high stocking levels and unrestricted access might be best.

Whatever your strategy, consider carefully what kind of nutrition animals are getting from the stalk pasture so you neither underfeed nor overfeed expensive supplements. Be sure to provide salt, calcium, phosphorus, and vitamin A free choice at all times. Once all the grain is gone, cows need about half a pound per day of an all natural protein to meet nutrient needs.

Stalk season is here. Make wise decisions to use them best.

Soybean Stubble for Cows

As soybeans are combined, cows sometimes are put out on the residues to graze. Some bean residues are even baled. But how good is this feed?

We're all familiar with the usefulness of grazing corn

stalks, but you see more and more soybean fields grazed every year. Cows seem to like licking up what's left behind after combining. Some folks may think their cows are getting more from those bean residues than what truly is there. The problem is a matter of perception.

When most of us think of soybeans, we think high protein. So we expect bean residues will be a high protein feed, too. Unfortunately, the opposite often is true; soybean residue often is very low in protein.

Soybean stems and pods contain only about 4 to 6 percent crude protein, well below the 7 to 8 percent needed for minimum support of a dry beef cow. Even though leaves can be up to 12 percent protein, it's only around one-third digestible, so that's not much help. In fact, protein digestibility is low in all bean residues. Energy is even worse. TDN averages between 35 and 45 percent for leaves, stems, and pods. This is even lower than wheat straw. So unless cows fed soybean residues also find and eat quite a few beans, cows fed only bean residue can lose weight and condition very quickly.

Now, this doesn't mean soybean residues are worthless for grazing or even baled. They can be a good extender of much higher quality hay or silage. But, cattle must be fed quite a bit of higher energy and protein feeds to make up for these deficiencies in soybean residues.

Don't be misled into thinking bean residues are as good or better than corn stalks. Otherwise, you and your cows will suffer the consequences.

year amount of \$4.34 million and \$4.47 million from two years ago. He cautioned the council that the \$4.23 million amount is very preliminary and is based on estimates for the final months of the fiscal year.

He said that although growth is trending lower, the City's cash position was strong, but that funds would possibly need to be transferred from the electric utility to meet expenses. Historically, the City uses the electric, water and sewer funds to meet the needs of the budget when necessary. Currently the city-owned utilities fund holds about \$3.4 million of the City's cash reserves. The board agreed to transfer \$250,000, if needed, from the utility to the General fund to assist in paying bills. The last such transfer was in September 2009 for \$176,411.

Blobaum said state statutes impose a "lid bill," which seeks to limit the growth of budgeted restricted funds revenues. Restricted funds

revenues come from property tax, state pass-through revenues, sales tax and transfers of excess utility funds monies. The City is allowed the prior year amount plus an inflation factor growth and the limitation is excepted for amounts to repay bonds and capital outlays relating to real estate which are paid for from these restricted revenues. "This limitation has eased primarily due to lack of growth of property tax and sales tax revenues in recent years," he said.

A detailed financial report as well as fund breakdown for 2013 is kept on file at the City Office.

Mammography Technologists On Staff At TCHS

The real value of digital mammography lies in its ability to detect cancer in the breast when it is often too small to be felt or detected in any other way. The current guidelines from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the American Cancer Society, the American Medical Association and the American College of Radiology recommends a mammography screening every year for women, beginning at age 40.

For over two years, Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) has been providing digital mammography to patients. Digital mammography is different from conventional mammography in how the image is acquired and, more importantly, viewed. Radiologist looking at the images can magnify them, increase or decrease the contrast and invert the black and white values to get a clearer image. These features allow the radiologist to better evaluate microcalcifications and focus more closely on areas of concern.

In addition to being able to offer women the latest technology in mammography, TCHS now has two board certified mammography technologists on staff, Shelly Pulliam and Amy Gregory. Both mammography techs have more than ten years of experience in the radiology department at Thayer County Health Services. They recently received their mammography technician certification from the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT) after successfully completing all course requirements in classroom instruction, clinical training and written exam.

In the past, TCHS contracted with Southeast Nebraska Mobile Diagnostic Services to provide mammograms for patients. The change to having

this service provided by TCHS staff, will allow TCHS to offer more flexible dates and times for exams and will hopefully increase the number of women that follow the recommended guidelines for screenings.

Another advantage to having mammography techs on staff is that if an exam should show an area of concern, a recall exam can be scheduled throughout the week, with the results available in a matter of hours. Although the exams aren't changing, the timeliness of results should make a difficult wait less stressful.

TCHS recognizes that having the latest technology available for patients is an important step in the fight against breast cancer. Currently breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death among women, exceeded only by lung cancer. Statistics indicate that one in eight women will develop breast cancer sometime in her life.

Digital mammography makes it possible to detect breast cancer in an earlier stage than with conventional mammograms. The stage at which breast cancer is detected can greatly influence a woman's chance of survival. If detected early, the five-year survival rate is 97 percent.

Wearing Hand-Me-Down Gowns

Brides-to-be devote plenty of time to thinking about their wedding gowns, and some women spend months scouring stores for their ideal designs. But what if the perfect gown is already tucked away in a family member's closet?

Some brides view a hand-me-down gown with a degree of skepticism. After all, people may poke fun at dresses passed on by well-meaning friends and family that feature styling that is out-of-date (think 1980s shoulder pads). * What is the size? It's much easier to take fabric away from a gown than to match it and add fabric to the gown. Therefore, try on the gown and see if alterations will be possible. Do not plan on crash dieting to fit in the gown. You may not reach your goal, and then you may be stuck with an ill-fitting dress. How well a gown fits goes a long way toward the bride's appearance.

* What is the condition? Many dry cleaners offer wedding gown preservation packages, and brides have been taking advantage of this service. The gown is cleaned and boxed so it will not discolor. If you are receiving a gown that has undergone this treatment, there is a greater likelihood it will look much like it did when it was first worn. However, some former brides do not store their gowns properly, and they may be stained, torn or discolored. While it is possible to do some cleaning, you may not end up with a gown that meets your approval.

* Is the shape flattering? If a gown has good "bones" to it, there's a chance that a talented tailor can turn it into something that will enhance your frame and body type. If the gown is of a style that you never would have considered, such as a mermaid cut or princess style, then it may be much more difficult and costly to transform it into something workable.

* Are you settling? Every bride wants to feel romantic in her wedding gown, which is why shopping for a gown is often akin to searching for lost treasure. If the hand-me-down gown doesn't give you goosebumps when you put it on and you're settling simply because of the price, then it may put a damper on your entire wedding.

* What's your budget? Even though hand-me-down wedding dresses may be no cost initially, you may accumulate a sum depending on the extent of the alterations needed. Get an estimate from a seamstress and find out if it will be financially smart to go with the used gown or purchase something new.

Wearing a hand-me-down gown is something many brides consider, especially if the dress has sentimental meaning or is a family heirloom. Certain questions should be answered before finalizing the decision to go with something vintage.





Youth Learn Agriculture At 15th Annual AgVenture Day

Animals were on site so youth could see and learn basic livestock facts. Crystal Fangmeier, UNL Extension shared basic information about swine to youth who were able to experience two-week old piglets.

As each generation becomes more distant from production agriculture, it is essential to teach youth the importance of agriculture and how their food is produced. Livestock Ag-Venture is a program that promotes the agricultural and more specifically the beef industry by teaching youth the importance of the industry and educating them on agricultural issues.

This educational program is hosted by the South Central Cattle Women in partnership with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension. This is the 15th year of this program which was held at the Fillmore County Fairgrounds in Geneva on September 10.

This year was the largest in attendance as 170 fourth graders participated from Fillmore Central, Shickley, Bruning-Davenport, Exeter-Milligan, Superior, Thayer Central, Deshler Public and Deshler Lutheran Schools.

During this event, participants learned the purpose and

Youth also participated in a barnyard tour where they learned about different species of animals.

Fillmore Central and Shickley FFA members also contributed to the event by serving as group leaders and helping in setting up for the event. Lunch was provided for all participants.

It was an enjoyable experience for all involved and provided everyone the opportunity to learn about the beef industry, agriculture and its importance in Nebraska.
