Thayer Central board members place two bond issues on ballot

Proposition B contingent on passage of Proposition A

Thayer Central School board members will put an \$11.1 million bond issue on the ballot this November after passing the resolution in a special meeting last week. The issue is for "paying the costs of consolidating grades PreK-12 within the District's existing Intermediate School and Jr./Sr. High school buildings," according to Proposition A.

Throughout the summer months, Thayer Central board members and administration staff have introduced the plan to the public in three town-hall style meetings. In the latest overview last week, a few changes to the floor plan were introduced, but did not change the overall costs.

A second bond issue (Proposition B) will address planned construction of a \$4.7 million fine arts facility. Proposition B will only be eligible for consideration if Proposition A passes at the polls.

Thayer Central Superintendent Drew Harris also presented cost projections for facility improvements should the bond issue fail. Totalling approximately \$4.5 million, the primary, intermediate and high school buildings will need work to comply with safety standards through 2013-14.

Some tagged improvements include an approximate \$300,000 gymnasium renovation in the primary building as the current gym does not meet state fire codes. Should Proposition A pass, the primary building and the surrounding yard would be vacated and sold. Other large ticket items at the primary school include a replacement building for the existing annex trailer, structural improvements to classrooms, mechanical

and electrical work and restroom renovations. In total, an estimated \$1.07 million is earmarked for the primary building alone.

For the intermediate building, restroom, locker, and weight room renovations add up to approximately \$300,000 while finishes to the gymnasium and classrooms could run as high as \$478,000. New ceilings, fire protection, floor coverings and paint and mechanical and electrical work add up to an approximate \$1.07 million in repairs and renovations as well.

The lion's share of renovation needs goes to the high school building where gymnasium and classroom finishes as well as mechanical and electrical work will run about \$1 million. Other improvements such as locker and restroom renovations, hallway and stair floor coverings and paint, new ceilings and fire protection will cost an additional \$565,000.

Harris also said that cost savings each year should Proposition A pass would run approximately \$103,500 each year. "Basically closing the primary school would save the district that much each year," he said. "We would save \$19,800 from utilities like heating and electricity; add \$9,700 to that if you include the church annex for our junior pre-kindergarten classes." In Proposition A, use of the church annex would not be necessary as the youngsters would also be moved to the main campus. Staff duplication would save another \$38,500, he said and added transportation to lunch and other activities would no longer be

necessary and would save \$10,750. Other savings would come from the elimination of annual maintenance of the buildings and grounds (\$14,000), meals to the preschool (\$5,800), and extra site licenses (\$4,500).

Thayer Central will hold its annual budget hearing Wednesday, Sept. 12. Administration staff and school board members welcome comments and questions about the two proposals. The general election is Tuesday, Nov. 6.

Carleton set to celebrate 140 years

Miss Nebraska 2012 to appear at Milo Queen Pageant

The Community Club of Carleton will sponsor its 61st annual Milo Days festival on Saturday, Sept. 8, with the theme of "140 and Going for Gold," in recognition of the 140th anniversary of the founding of the Village of Carleton.

Events will include long-standing traditions such as milo pancakes, a parade, milo baking contest, Milo Queen contest, and horse show. Former Deshler man faces felony sexual assault

Local law enforcement officials arrested Davis Weideman, 21, formerly of Deshler, and charged him with three counts of felony sexual assault of a minor earlier this month. Weideman is in the Air Force and currently stationed at Tinker Air Force Base in Midwest City, Okla.

He is alleged to have had sex with a 14-year old girl on three different occasions between March 31, 2011 and Dec. 31, 2011. He was 19 and 20 years old at the time. The victim's mother, whose name is being withheld to protect the identity of her daughter, reported the incidents.

According to the arrest affidavit, Weideman told arresting officers the contact was consensual.

In the state of Nebraska, sex with anyone under the age of 17 is illegal. Those who are 17 years old and above may give consent. There are no close-in-age exemptions or "Romeo and Juliet laws" to Nebraska's age of consent. This means anyone who engages in sexual activity with someone under the age of consent in Nebraska is liable for prosecution, including people only a few years older than their sexual partner and even individuals who are both under the age of consent.

Weideman is currently released on a \$50,000 personal recognizance bond and scheduled for a preliminary hearing on Sept. 24 in Thayer County court.

Drought can create conservation compliance issues

Farmers affected by drought should visit NRCS about plan requirements

As one of the worst droughts in over 30 years continues to grip Nebraska, the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) reminds producers to work with the local NRCS office to remain in compliance with their current conservation plan on highly erodible land.

Drought conditions affect yield, which can in turn, affect the amount of cover left on a field following harvest. Producers who have a conservation plan on their highly erodible cropland need to maintain a certain level of crop residue to remain in compliance with their conservation plan. The drought could make meeting that requirement difficult for some producers.

According to State Conservationist Craig Derickson, NRCS is providing some flexibility in its program requirements to assist producers affected by drought. Producers unable to meet residue requirements due to drought conditions may be eligible for what NRCS calls a "conservation compliance variance."

"NRCS understands that yields are down all across the state. For this reason, no-till producers who continue to do no tillage prior to planting a row crop next spring on highly erodible fields will not be found out of compliance due to a lack of crop residue. Producers who use conventional tillage operations will also be eligible for this variance if they agree to plant a cover crop following the fall or spring tillage operation," Derickson said.

According to Derickson, highly erodible fields that have been grazed or baled in 2012 would also be eligible for this variance, however the variance would not apply to irrigated fields that had sufficient water available to produce near normal yields.

Producers who have conservation contracts may not be able to implement contracted practices or conservation enhancements in accordance with their current conservation contract schedule. Producers are urged to visit with their local NRCS

Alexandria


J.E. West returned from Cheyenne county. He had been to look after land he owns in the west.

Future Employees

Imagine it's just a couple of years down the road – to 2014. The recession of 2010 is a memory, and your Boomer employees are retiring and suddenly you're severely short-handed.

Amy Lynch, award-winning author and speaker tells employers how to better prepare for employees of the future. Amy says that by 2014 millennials will make up 33 percent of the workforce. Looking into the future, Amy suggests that you plan for the day when employee numbers are short.

staff as soon as possible if they find themselves in this situation.

Also as a result of the drought, landowners, tenants, and contractors should check with NRCS prior to constructing any soil conservation practices such as terraces or dams. Extremely dry soil conditions are making it nearly impossible to properly compact the soil using conventional methods of construction. NRCS will need to make a site-specific evaluation of these projects to see if construction should continue or be postponed until conditions are more favorable.

Additionally, the drought has provided an opportunity for producers to access land that has historically been too saturated with water to reach with a truck, tractor, four wheeler, etc. Producers should check with their local NRCS office before starting any drainage activities in historically wet areas to avoid wetland compliance issues.

Derickson said, "Producers should visit with their local NRCS office before deviating from their current conservation plan or proceeding with any drainage or construction of conservation practices. The drought has created a lot of unique situations that NRCS can help producers navigate through to stay in compliance with their current conservation plan."

Health Risks from High Nitrate in Drinking Water

Many Nebraskans have questions about the impact of nitrate in their drinking water. Water quality monitoring shows that nitrate is present in groundwater throughout much of Nebraska and concentrations are increasing in some areas.

Nitrogen is essential for all living things because it is an essential component of protein. Nitrogen exists in the environment in many forms and changes forms as it moves through the nitrogen cycle. However, excessive concentrations of nitrate-nitrogen in drinking water can be hazardous to one's health, especially in infants and for pregnant women.

Nitrogen is the nutrient used in lawn and garden care and crop production to increase productivity. Feedlots, animal yards, septic systems, and other waste treatment systems are additional sources of nitrogen that is carried in waste. Nitrogen occurs naturally in the soil in organic forms from decaying plants and animal residues. Bacteria in the soil convert various forms of nitrogen to nitrate, a nitrogen/oxygen ion. This is desirable since the majority of the nitrogen used by plants is absorbed in the nitrate form. However, nitrate is highly soluble and readily moves with water through the soil profile. If there is excessive rainfall or over-irrigation, nitrate will drain below the plant's root zone and may eventually reach groundwater.

Without testing, nitrate in water is undetectable: it is also colorless, odorless, and tasteless. The EPA Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for nitrate-nitrogen in a public water supply is 10 milligrams per liter (mg/L). An acute health hazard associated with drinking water with higher levels of nitrate occurs when bacteria in the digestive system transform nitrate to nitrite. The nitrite reacts with iron in the hemoglobin of red blood cells to form methemoglobin. Methemoglobin in infant blood cannot change back to hemoglobin, which normally

occurs in adults. Methemoglobinemia, often referred to as "blue baby syndrome"; is a condition where the blood lacks the ability to carry sufficient oxygen to an individual body cells. Infants are more susceptible because their stomach acids are not as strong as in older children or adults. This is why it is important to not let infants drink water that exceeds 10 mg/1NO3-N. This includes water used in formula preparation. Severe methemoglobinemia can result in brain damage and death.

Pregnant women, adults with reduced stomach acidity, and people deficient in the enzyme that changes methemoglobin back to normal hemoglobin are all susceptible to nitrite-induced methemoglobinemia. The most obvious symptom of methemoglobinemia is a bluish color of the skin, particularly around the eyes and mouth. Other symptoms include headache, dizziness, weakness or difficulty in breathing. Take babies with the above symptoms to the hospital emergency room immediately. If recognized in time, it can be treated with an injection of methylene blue.

Healthy adults can consume fairly large amounts of nitrate with few known health effects. In fact, most of the nitrate we consume comes from raw or cooked vegetables. This nitrate is readily absorbed and excreted in the urine. However, prolonged intake of high levels of nitrate are linked to gastric problems due to the formations of nitrosamines. Nitrosamine compounds have been shown to cause cancer in test animals. However, studies of people exposed to high levels of nitrate or nitrite have not provided convincing evidence of an increased risk of cancer.

Prepare for Goat Breeding Season

Mid-August to early September is the time to prepare for the goat breeding season. Begin by having a breeding soundness exam performed on the bucks you plan to use in your breeding program. Have a veterinarian evaluate the bucks' fertility and other reproductive characteristics to make sure they can breed in October and November. In 30 days re-evaluate the bucks that failed the breeding exam. Sell those that do not pass; they should not be used for breeding.

Bucks should be in good general health. Their feet and legs must be sound so they can find and mate with does, so examine and trim their hooves if needed. Bucks should have sound teeth and be able to eat easily so they can maintain their body weight during the breeding season.

Mid-August to September is also a good time to evaluate does. They should not be too thin or too fat, or they will have problems breeding or kidding. Feed thin does about a half

pound of concentrate or grain per day to increase their body condition and increase the likelihood of twinning. Does in good body condition do not need supplemental feed.

Check hooves and legs for soundness, and trim hooves if necessary. If you have not already done so, now is a good time to cull the doe herd to eliminate those that are not sound or have not met production goals.

By the end of September, two to three weeks before the beginning of your breeding season, check the FAMACHA scores of your goats (a tool for identifying anemic animals), and de-worm and vaccinate for Clostridium C&D and tetanus. Then all that's left is to turn the bucks in with the does.






