Kenyon receives award for effort

Loretta Kenyon says things like, "I believe everyone can learn," "You can do that if you try," and "I believe you can do anything you want to do if you want it bad enough."

A paraeducator for Thayer Central since 2004, Kenyon was nominated by special education teacher, Laurie Fischer for the 2018 Nebraska Paraeducator of the Year.

Kenyon will receive her award Oct. 10 at a conference in Kearney. She is one of four paraeducators in the state to win the award. Kenyon has worked as a paraeducator for 25 years.

Fischer said Kenyon, who was also a paraeducator in California and Colorado, is a teacher who cares for students, all students, not just those in Fischer's special education class.

"She comes to school every day. We try and help kids we know are struggling," Fischer said. "She sees what's going on, she sees it and she hears it. She's a fast learner."

And Kenyon can reach the tough kids, the really tough ones.

"There may be different ways we have to learn," Kenyon said.

"She's too humble," Fischer said. "She's honest."

Kenyon said she's seen some rough kids.

"Like some of my schools in California and

Colorado were harder. In California, they couldn't leave the sped room because of their behaviors," she said. "They would come at you with a pair of scissors." Locally, she has seen flying chairs.

The tough Kenyon has a soft heart. She keeps a calendar with positive sayings on her desk.

Tears well up as Kenyon explains she is often asked for the positive sayings.

She knows she's made a difference by the look on a student's face.

"Or, they're really struggling with a test and don't think they'll do well, but come back with a really good grade. I tell them, 'Have faith in yourself,'" she said.

Fischer said she has seen a spike in mental illness. She has taught at the school for 22 years. When she began teaching, students had learning disabilities more than anything else.

"It's changed into mental health issues," Fischer said. "Everyone has anxieties, but the way kids handle it today is extreme."

Social media and online bullying contribute to the problem, Fischer said.

"As a parent, it is overwhelming to keep up with it," she added.

Her class is now taught by award winning teachers. Fischer was presented with the 2018 Marie Peithmann Polished Apple Award in April.

Club joins together for community

The Chester Community Club held its third Chesterfest in June since the festival's revival and added more events this year. The progressive club that was stagnate for decades, but kept alive by Mike Tipton, is moving forward.

"We're now more organized and have more members," Art Whitton told the Hebron Chamber's Wednesday coffee group Aug. 29.

There are registration forms for new members, which the club is hoping to attract. T-shirts will soon be available.

"We're trying to find a few more people to help," he said about Chesterfest. "It's been a real boost to the town. We need to try and make the community the best it can be and keep people there, keep the

momentum going."

The September momentum was Chester's Theater in the Park for a movie. The club purchased projector equipment for community entertainment.

Whitton said members plan events that will encourage the community to come together.

"We all know what happens when nothing happens," Whitton said.

Coming in October is the club's Halloween event Oct. 26-27, the Friday and Saturday prior to Halloween. The haunted house received a good response last year, and will be featured on Friday. Saturday will be the community dinner and haunted house.

Whitton said black and white movies of the macabre might be

part of the October schedule.

The club skipped plans for November because of the firemen's banquet. In December, the Christmas light show returns with a dinner in the auditorium.

"It will be better than last year," Whitton said. "We're maybe looking at house display contests."

He said they were fortunate to have the auditorium for events.

"We can do pretty much anything with it," he said.

Whitton mentioned he is currently working on Brownville's website.

"It's amazing what that town pulls off," he said. Brownville features a concert series, walking trails, tourist stops, flea markets, and it converts old buildings to museums.

Rain lasts for days, warnings issued

A flash flood watch was issued by the National Weather Service Tuesday morning for north central Kansas and into Thayer, Nuckolls, Fillmore, Clay, Adams, Webster and York.

The watch was set until 1 p.m., however, continuous rain was expected to produce another one to three inches and three to five inches in low lying areas, NWS predicted.

Thayer Central and Deshler public schools issued a two-hour late start for Tuesday because of flooding on rural roads. Bruning-Davenport hadn't received flooding reports and followed its regular schedule.

The NWS also issued a hazardous weather outlook for seven days with spotters to report heavy rainfall totals over two inches.

A flood warning was still in effect until 9 p.m., Tuesday. The NWS stated Thayer County Emergency Manager, Colt Farringer, had reported the Little Blue River was out of its bank north of Deshler on the west side of Highway 5.

In addition, the Big Sandy Creek was full to its banks with further rises likely toward Alexandria over the next 24 hours.

Locations that could experience flooding are Hebron, Deshler, Davenport, Bruning, Alexandria, Carleton, Belvidere and Gilead. Other areas outside of Thayer County are Ruskin, Oak, Ong, Shickley, Ohio, Strang, Nora and Milligan.

Farringer is regularly reporting to NWS and said Highway 4 just west of Carleton had 75 to 100 yards of water across it before it receded.

"The storm just sat there for a few minutes," Farringer said.

The weather service is calling the system a "train" because it hovers to rain on the same area over and over.

Farringer said the river is also elevated near Dewese.

"We're worried about the rain. They're expecting another two to four inches on average over the next 12 to 24 hours. Most of the

Helpline available for reports

Recent police reports involving suspect vehicles and people on rural roads in Seward and Jefferson counties with at least one incident in Milford that centered on a child walking her dog and being approached by a stranger, were addressed by Nebraska State Patrol Trooper Tim Pickering.

Pickering said residents who think they are being followed and aren't sure whom to contact can call *55, which is the state patrol's helpline and a non-emergency number. From there, callers will be routed to someone for assistance.

The state patrol recommends *55 to report a motorist in need of assistance, a reckless or impaired driver or a traffic violation.

Cellular phones also have specific features for making emergency calls to 911.

Another program for drivers is the Nebraska State Patrol Motor-

1888 130 Years Ago

Alexandria Herald: Capt. Henry, of Fairmont, was here today and organized A. W. Howard G.A.R. Post No. 162 with officers elected as follows: G. L. Archer, P.C.; J. E. McClellan Sr., V.C.; R. L. Jackson Jr., V.C.; J. H. Enslow, Q.M.; S. Morrow, Surg.; J. C. Pluss, O.D.; E. H. Plowman, O.G.; E. W. Enslow, Sentinel; I. Selleg, Adjutant.

The sad news was received Monday of the drowning of a boy named Roy Wheeler, about 12 years old, in the Little Blue, near Leland's Mill, nine miles east of Hebron. The report of the occurrence is very meager, and no one with whom we have conversed on the subject appears to know much about the details of the accident.

1898 120 Years Ago

H. W. Bever of Pawnee City, has leased the Gallant store room formerly occupied by the Leach Clothing Company, and will put in an entirely new stock of men's clothing and furnishing goods by the first of September.

Miss Ivy Correll entertained about 60 young people last evening at a hammock party, in honor of Misses Evelyn and Eleanor Hendershot of Ogden, Utah. Under the Chinese lanterns the crowd witnessed flag draped shadow pictures, until the approach of a threatening shower at a late hour.

A novel sight was that of a steam thresher running in full blast threshing oats in Hebron Monday on Fourth Street.

They say it rains every day in Uncle Sam's newly acquired territory. This would not suit Nebraskans as they must have their regular rations of sunshine.

L. O. Secrest has opened a news stand at the Central House, where he will supply all the late magazines and periodicals. Give him a call.

Mrs. Meban, a black teacher in the school for Freed-Women at Monticello, Ark., will give an address in the Presbyterian Church next Wednesday evening. All interested in the work among the black people of the south are invited to come and hear her. A collection will be taken for the work.

Carleton: E. E. Lichty raised \$36.75 for Mrs. Quackenbush who was so unfortunate as to lose her milk cow by lightning a few days ago. This will enable her to purchase another cow, and it shows that people are willing to come to the rescue when one is unfortunate... The Board of Trustees have ordered a dozen street lamps which will be up as soon as they are received... The infant child born to Mr. and Mrs. John Nagel last Tuesday, died on Wednesday, and was buried yesterday... R. D. Kleppinger has secured a job as manager of the Belvidere lumber yards and has moved his family there.

1908 110 Years Ago

Than Estabrook was over from Carleton Monday.

Having sold out his interest in the Leader to his partner, Jas. Bryant. Than will travel for a ladies tailoring establishment.

Judge Skinner has shaved off his moustache and is not nearly so handsome as before. The Judge says the last time a frost removed his hirsute appendage was in July '64, when his best girl had a spasm of grief because his lip looked so swollen.

Hedwig Huber was born at Memmingen, Bavaria, Jan. 11, 1872; the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Huber, her mother having died 10 years ago. She married Joseph A. Willy of Hebron, Oct. 27, 1891, moved to Hebron in August, 1901, where she lived at the time of her death which occurred Aug. 22, 1908. She leaves a husband and five children, Josephine, 16 years old, and the baby, 4 years old, also her father, John Huber and five brothers.

1918 100 Years Ago

Miss Myrtle Orth, the unmarried twin daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Orth, was united in marriage to Mr. Charles Williams of Crete on Sept. 4, at Lincoln, to which place they were accompanied by the bride's twin sister, Mrs. Milton Graul and husband, of Belvidere. The groom is just recently of age and with war prospects looming ahead, the war romance culminated as stated above.

Yankee Robinson's put up a good show to a large crowd, yesterday. The shortage of man-power due to the draft was apparent in the lack of tumblers, acrobats and trapeze performers. The lack of teamsters and general help was doubtless also the reason why no parade was given, tho the lateness of arrival was ascribed as the cause. Most of the larger shows touring the county have had to dispense with street parades for similar reasons. The exhibits of trained animals, including lions, leopards, seals, and special features were clever. The monkey that threw off his coat to lift up the tipped-over wagon, emphasized the Darwinian theory---although the antics of some politicians usually are accepted as sufficient confirmation of the belief in man's descent from monkeys.

1928 90 Years Ago

Whittaker received a letter from his brother, Floyd, from California last week that their oldest daughter, who was 12 years old, was drowned on the 22nd of May when she went swimming with some neighbors... The Nagey merry-go-round is packed preparing to move to Staplehurst. It has been here since July 4... A Hastings firm installed a Frigidaire at the drug store Monday... The largest yield of wheat reported was an average of 48 bu. machine weight threshed by the Priefert machine, raised by Pat Huber of Belvidere on 14 acres of ground at the Geo. Sinn farm southwest of Alexandria.

All of the threshing crews have been holding picnics the past week.

1938 80 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner) Oil fumes from the crank case of a diesel engine were blamed by navy officials Tuesday for an explosion aboard the submarine Nautilus which sent one officer and six enlisted men to the Pearl Harbor hospital. Among those injured was Machinist's Mate Ernest C. Arbogast of Carleton.

A destructive fire, believed to have started by spontaneous combustion, burned the barn and a straw stack to the ground at the Thomas Hawks Sr. farm home Monday morning.

1948 70 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner) W. O. (Orville) Baldwin of Hebron last week announced his candidacy for Nebraska democratic national committeeman. He hopes to restore the party's harmony as top officer.

1958 60 Years Ago

Chester-Hubbell Schools opened with an enrollment of 226. High school superintendent/principal was Robert Horner. Hubbell grade school enrollment totaled 44. The Davenport Community School opened with an enrollment of 236 students. The Belvidere school opened with Melvin Hellbusch as principal and lunch price at 30 cents.

More than 100 farmers participated in the Thayer County Livestock Feeders Association Irrigation Tour. The tour visited the farms of Ben Wiedel, Lawrence Kirchhoff and Harvey Hoops.

A Speed Queen electric dryer was selling for \$159.95 at Ace Hardware.

1978 40 Years Ago

The first air ambulance arrived transporting a patient to Thayer County Memorial Hospital. The aircraft was met at the Hebron Airport by the Thayer County Ambulance crew of Paul Uphoff and LaVern Poppe.

Hebron High School band twirlers were Terri Mittan, Valerie Forrest, Leah Burnette, Jannel Wiedel and Kim Bacon.

William Mook of Carleton, one of the first custom combine operators, brought the first milo seed to Carleton from Texas in the mid-thirties when farmers saw the need for a new farm crop. He gave the bags of milo seed to farmers in the Carleton area. This brought about the Carleton Community Club promoting the use of milo not only as a livestock feed but for human consumption as well.

Thayer County had a total of 191 center pivot irrigation systems in 1978.

County assessors attend workshop

Karla Joe, Thayer County Assessor and Amy Peterson, Deputy County Assessor completed a three day workshop August 20 thru August 23 for Nebraska county assessors.

The workshop, attended by approximately 150 county officials and staff, is part of continuing education and leadership development training sponsored by the Nebraska Association of County Officials.

The workshop included insights on recent changes in state laws as well as presentations on a variety of relevant assessment topics offered by the Property Assessment Division of the Nebraska Department of Revenue, Tax Equalization and Review Commission, IAAO Instructor Rick Stuart and Vanguard Appraisal. The seminars focused on the areas of Assessment Office Management, Assessment of Grain Facilities and General Assessment Practices.

Suicide Prevention

In 2016, there were nearly 45,000 suicide deaths in the United States. The number of suicides in the last seventeen years has shown a 28 percent increase. Suicide is now the tenth leading cause of death in the United States. On average there are 123 suicides a day. The suicide rate among men remains nearly four times higher than with females.

Ninety percent of people who die by suicide have a diagnosable mental illness and/or substance abuse disorder. A suicidal person may not ask for help, but that doesn't mean help isn't wanted. Most people who commit suicide don't want to die—they just want to stop hurting.

Most suicidal individuals give warning signs or signals of their intentions. The best way to prevent suicide is to recognize these warning signs and know how to respond if you spot them. If you believe a friend or family member is suicidal, you can play a role in suicide prevention by pointing out the alternatives, showing that you care, and getting a doctor or psychologist involved.

Major warning signs for suicide include talking about killing or harming oneself, talking or writing a lot about death or dying, and seeking out things that could be used in a suicide attempt, such as weapons and drugs. These signals are even more dangerous if the person has a mood disorder such as depression or bipolar disorder, suffers from alcohol dependence, has previously attempted suicide, or has a family history of suicide.

Take any suicidal talk or behavior seriously. It's not just a warning when someone is thinking about suicide—it's a cry for help. A more subtle warning sign of suicide is hopelessness. Studies have found hopelessness is a strong predictor of suicide. If someone is feeling hopeless, they may talk about "unbearable" feelings, predict a bleak future, state that they have nothing to look forward to, state feelings of self-dislike, or express a sudden sense of calm after

sadness.

Other warning signs that point to a possible suicide include dramatic mood swings or sudden personality changes, such as going from outgoing to withdrawn or well-behaved to rebellious. A suicidal person may also lose interest in day-to-day activities, neglect his or her appearance, and show big changes in eating or sleeping habits.

They might even have a mood change for the "better." They act as if nothing is wrong and life is perfect. They may laugh a lot, smile, joke, etc., because they know their pain is about to end. If this is seen after someone has been severely depressed or feeling hopeless, chances are they are ready to take action. At this point intervention is necessary to prevent them from carrying out their plan.

Many suicides might be prevented if we recognize the warning signs and know how to access help. If you or someone you know suffers from depression, substance abuse, or has ongoing thoughts of death or suicide, we urge you to seek help. Talking openly about suicidal thoughts and feelings can save a life.

Thayer County Health Services has behavioral health services available to help. To learn more about the services available, contact your health care provider.

There are also crisis centers located all across the country that are committed to suicide prevention. Anyone can call anytime, from anywhere and speak to someone who will listen and assist them in getting the help they need.

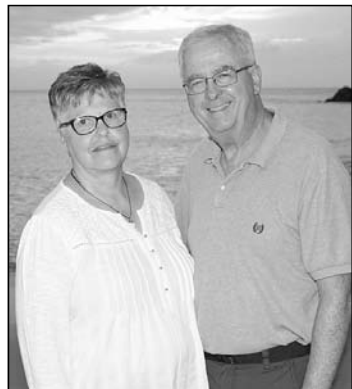

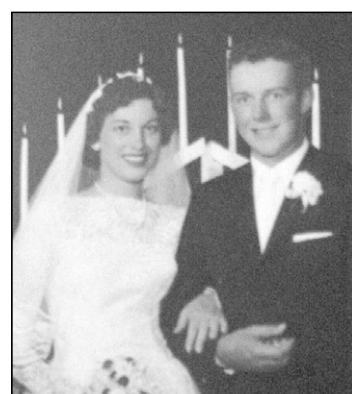
