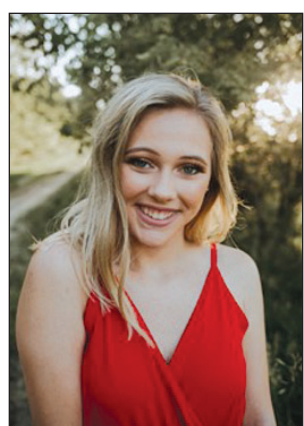

ist Assist Program in three locations across the state in Omaha, Lincoln and the third covering Grand Island and Kearney.

Program volunteers have been deemed, "Highway Angels" for servicing vehicles with fluids and fuel, changing flat tires, jump starting, welfare checks and giving rides along the interstate.

"They're all volunteers. A lot of them are retired," Pickering said.

He didn't seem too concerned about the incidents reported in Seward and Jefferson, but advised if drivers see something suspicious on a rural road, they should just drive on by.

"You're going to get a feeling, I think," he said. "Don't think you're rude for driving by. Say you'll call the sheriff for them. If they're not legitimate, they will leave."

Pickering said he's seen

people on the side of the road taking a restroom break.

"You can be friendly and helpful calling in," he said. "It's hard not to stop and help a neighbor, but it's better to call in and have it checked out than to have it be something."

He said last year, a van was reported stopping on different rural roads.

"He was looking for wifi," Pickering said. "It got called in and it was checked."

Incidents such as people pretending to be officers reoccur, he said.

Pickering wonders why some people sometimes post their experiences on social media before they call the police.

"That doesn't make any sense to me," he said. "Again, if no one calls, we won't be there."

In addition, officers appreciate incidents reported immediately instead of days later.

## Powers sentenced for escape

Lance Powers, 29, of Hebron, entered a guilty plea Aug. 14 for his dramatic escape out the sheriff's office front door May 7.

Powers ran through downtown Hebron during his escapade. He was tracked down by residents and the sheriff's office.

On Aug. 30, Thayer County District Court Judge Vicky Johnson found Powers guilty of escape, a Class IV felony and sentenced him to 180 days jail with nine months of post-release supervision.

Powers received 115 days

of time served. He was ordered to pay court costs of \$155, plus additional transportation costs.

At the time of his escape, Powers was incarcerated for nonpayment of child support, failure to appear and driving under suspension.

Jefferson County also had a warrant on Powers for delivery of a controlled substance.

Johnson found Powers could not effectively and safely enter probation at the time of sentencing because he has pending felony charges.

## Planting corn the old way...

A lister builds a furrow and drops the seed into the lower ditch. A planter just plants, doesn't make rows. The seed planted by the lister has a better chance to grab moisture from rain. NOTE: Henry always plants seed in an area by the Big Red Barn so he can grow some corn for the children to pick and then they have the opportunity to use a hand grinder to remove the corn from the cob. One can see Henry's corn crop for this year in the background. It will be ready for the Fall Harvest Days, the last Sunday in September.
