Council plans for 2018 ballot

The Hebron City Council discussed tacking LB840 to the ballot for the May 15 primary election during its Sept. 6 meeting.

It's still referred to as Legislative Bill 840, but the Local Option Municipal Economic Development Act has impacted numerous communities. The measure allows municipalities to use a percentage of sales tax for economic development.

"It will allow us to do what we've wanted to for a long time," Councilman Kurk Wiedel said.

If LB840 is on the primary ballot, voters would decide if the city should use one percent of its sales tax for economic development, which includes business retention.

In the past, the council briefly discussed holding a special election for the option Act, but Wiedel said placing it on the primary ballot will save the city money.

The council was clear: LB840 will not raise taxes, nor will any funds come from city property tax and the sales tax fund will remain unchanged if LB840 doesn't pass.

In other business, the city is preparing for its new fiscal year with the same levy rate as last year — the rate was 44.0057 per \$100 valuation and is set for 44.0056 for the new year.

According to the city's accountant, Brian Blobaum, the net property tax increase is 3.64, compared to last year's 5.77 increase. New property growth will absorb .73 percent, leaving a 2.91 percent increase on prior existing properties.

Expenditures for 2017-2018 are set at \$9,793,641. The estimated figure for last year's actual expenditures is \$5,410,376.

City Administrator Chris Fangmeier said he felt the council went through each department by line more this year, zoomed in on each department and determined how to improve the city's economic outlook.

Councilman Larry Fangmeier said the city expects a better financial outlook because of capital improvements. That won't change this year.

"This year, we'll do what's necessary in capital improvements," Fangmeier said.

The city is also closing in on old bonds, but will take on a new fire truck using the current year levy.

Wiedel gave an update on the walking trail.

"We did finish the piece that gets us to South Street," he said.

Now, the trail committee is planning for another addition — around the baseball field to the CCC camp that would loop to the existing trail. The addition will be completed with grant funding.

Ohioa family to serve sentences

The wife of an Ohioa man and the couple's daughter will now join their husband/dad in the Nebraska Department of Corrections' system.

Shane M. Kues, also known as Shane Marie Buster, 30, of Lincoln and Tamara S. Lee, 54, of Ohioa were sentenced to prison terms late last month in recent action in the Fillmore County District Court.

Library holds more than books

As technology evolves, the Hebron Secrest Library rolls with it, benefiting patrons with convenience and services.

The access alone to the Consumer Health Information Resource Service opens up an entire database that reaches to the National Library of Medicine, where researchers watch videos of procedures and scan articles.

Another service at Secrest is Nebraskard, which gives patrons an arm into checking out materials from other libraries, as long as the libraries participate in the service. Patrons use the libraries just like they do their own, checking out and returning items at the same location.

There is the interlibrary loan for books one year or older. Library director, Terry Olson, recently went through an interlibrary experience worth telling.

She was looking for "Someone is Eating the Sun," a book on the solar eclipse.

"I had it in my private collection and it is no longer there," she said.

Olson posted she was looking for the book on Facebook and didn't receive a response, so she headed for the interlibrary source.

"I didn't think the book would be there," she said because the solar eclipse was being covered by numerous schools and libraries.



Weaving through all the books, the Hebron Secrest Library also offers computers for public use, free wifi, DVDs, online e-books and audio and programs for children and adults.

The paperback book that came out in the 1970s was located at an out-of-state university.

"Indiana, I think," Olson said. "I was really surprised it wasn't reissued and yet, the illustrations are current."

The library held 17 children's programs this past year and provided an additional 20 outreach programs for children and adults.

The adult program, "Celebrating Western Heritage 1846-1897" drew 92 people.

Olson said the library's strategic plan will include some answers to how the library can further serve the public.

"We're looking for feedback on the library," she said.

Technology has made it more convenient for patrons to read or listen to books. Those with a library card may use Overdrive, an online service for e-books and audiobooks.

The library was opened in 1921 as a result of Lewis Secrest's \$15,000 donation. The city had to pass a resolution, allowing for a public library.

In his will, Secrest wanted to reimburse those who "had been good to him."

Mr. Funkhouser of Chester moved to Milbrook, Kan., the town destroyed by a cyclone, the week before its destruction. He bought a livery stable. The building was wrecked. Moral: Never move out of Thayer County.

The Strang Record is another of the many newspapers about to succumb to lack of support.

F. Kinglsey has placed a supply of temperance literature in the post office.

The family named Hoens near Kiowa is in a critical condition with typhoid fever. The wife died last Sunday and all of the rest of the family are sick. The neighbors being afraid of the disease leave them with no aid, and they are reported by Dr. Sutherland to be in a dreadful condition.

Farmers, don't sacrifice your crops this year for poor prices. Don't sell an ear of corn nor a peck of small grain for less than it is worth. Let buyers pay good prices or go without.

120 Years Ago

The exhibit will be shown at as many fairs as they can attend, going as far east as Buffalo, N.Y.

Davenport: C. C. McLeese and family left Wednesday for a pleasure trip of several weeks. They went in a prairie schooner and expect to travel in the morning and evening but camp during the heat of the day. They started west.

Editor Casad of Hubbell has been appointed postmaster at that place. Once or twice in a while an editor receives recognition for political services.

Miss Dewald returned this week from a visit with her brother, A. J. Dewald, who recently located at Friend, and is reported doing a fine business as a photographer.

The fusionists held a pow-wow at the courthouse Tuesday night.

H. P. Harding will have about a ton and a half of fine grapes from his vineyard which are now ready for the market.

Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Townsend of Hubbell, are bereaved over the death of Alberta E. one of their infant twin daughters, who were born Jan. 1. The funeral will occur next Saturday, upon the arrival of the grandparents from Illinois.

A musical club has been organized by the pupils of Miss Correll's class to hold monthly meetings. The object is to take up a systematic study of the lives and works of the composers of classical music.

John W. Hayes and Mabel Huck, both of Thayer

County, were married at the Methodist parsonage, on Sept. 1st.

Miss Lydia Phelps returned Wednesday from St. Louis and Kansas City where she purchased a large stock of fall and winter millinery.

The outlook for Ireland the coming winter is indeed gloomy. A complete failure of the potato, hay and corn crops in most of the districts has brought on a crisis from which hunger and hardship will result.

110 Years Ago

Chester Herald: Mrs. O. J. Parker received the sad news last Saturday of the death of an aunt. This makes three deaths in the family in three weeks. And which is a little strange, they all died on Friday... Men are busy this week lowering H. S. Weary's store building. It will have to come down close to two feet to bring it down to grade. It will be much better for Mr. Weary and help the looks of the street 100 percent.

100 Years Ago

The alarm was given on Sunday morning at 3 o'clock that Mrs. E. Wilhelms' barn was on fire, two and a half miles south of Bruning. The fire was discovered by Garrett Casper. All the neighbors in the surrounding community and the town people responded to the call for help and in 20 minutes the place was lined with autos. The fire had made so much headway in such a short time that friends were unable to offer very much assistance, and in a very short time the barn and cattle shed were nothing but cinders. The loss is estimated at \$1,000 with \$500 insurance. Mrs. Wilhelms and family were in Clarks, S.D., on a pleasure trip.

There were 86 ladies registered in Bruning precinct, Wednesday, the 12th, six of whom resided in Fillmore County. There should have been many more.

A large number met at the A.O.U.W. hall last Friday evening to organize a company of Home Guards. Mayor Tom Carter and attorney Joe Baldwin of Hebron were present and gave talks. It was decided that men and boys who resided in Jefferson Co. could join Alexandria company of Home Guards.

Samuel Elia Summers was born in Storm county, Iowa, Aug. 13, 1857. When but a boy he came with his parents to Lincoln county, Kansas, where his boyhood days were spent, afterwards moving to Pawnee county, Nebr., where on Oct. 6, 1885, he was married to Miss Elizabeth M. Marshall. Their journey together was brief and she passed to her reward on Feb. 4, 1894. To this union three sons were born: William, Walter and Davis, all reside near Alexandria. Mr. Summer's health has been poor for some time, but the final summons came suddenly and with an illness of only a few hours he passed away Aug. 22, 1917, aged 60 years and 9 days.

One man was killed and hardly a person in the coach in which Mr. McMurphy was riding escaped injury. All cars except the Pullman left the rails, and the coach in which he was riding was overturned and dragged from some distance along the ground.

80 Years Ago

Capt. Swanson, who has been in charge of Camp Thayer at Hebron, has been promoted to the position of district inspector for the Southern District in Nebraska, which includes 11 CCC camps. He will continue to reside in Hebron. Camp Thayer will be in charge of Capt. Charles Hansen, who moved here from Davenport, Iowa, in March. Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Mr. and Mrs. John Brumbaugh received word Friday afternoon that their son-in-law, Leonard Rossmiller, age 26, had been fatally burned in a tractor accident.

Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the Rock Island Depot at Hebron early Saturday morning, including also the household goods and clothing of Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Savris, agent, who made their home in the depot. Mr. Sarvis was very badly burned and was taken to the hospital at Fairbury where he died about noon on Saturday as a result of his burns and secondary shock. A strong south wind was dangerous to the entire town, but hard work by the Hebron Volunteer Fire Department under Chief Wulfekoetter, kept the flames from spreading to other areas.

Many inquiries are received in regard to the Thayer County Memorial Hospital. They are justified, but it is difficult to get many facts. However, all interested can be assured that progress is being made as rapidly as possible. The fire marshal passed on the fitness of the building during his trip here the first of the week. The building also meets all state regulations in regard to hospital buildings.

Hudson participates in Elite Showman Competition

Agriculture and livestock competitions are always fan favorites at the Nebraska State Fair. The grandest competition of all took place over Labor Day weekend as 4-H and FFA champions from all over the state participated in the annual Nebraska Elite Showman Competition. This was the 12th year for the event which is coordinated by the Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA) and the Nebraska Rural Radio Association in cooperation with the Nebraska State Fair.

"Participating in the Nebraska Elite Showman Competition is a great honor for 4-H and FFA members to demonstrate their showmanship, interview and leadership skills," said NDA Director Greg Ibach. "I'm pleased that NDA and our partners are able to coordinate and sponsor events like these to recognize the hard work, dedication and passion that young Nebraskans have for agriculture."

Elite Showmen competitors must be between 14-18 years of age and enrolled in 4-H or FFA. Counties are able to select only one 4-H or FFA member to represent them to compete at the State Fair. Agricultural business and organizations generously contribute to the contest in order for the winners to receive monetary prizes along with their statewide recognition.

"Programs such as the Elite Showman Competition encourage youth in our state to grow and learn about agriculture from judges and other showmen," Ibach said. "That spirit of competition is important in agriculture as it is in life to make people stronger and drive them to achieve their goals."

In this year's Nebraska Elite Showman Competition, 37 counties were represented.

Competitors are scored on beef, swine and sheep showmanship, as well as interview skills and knowledge via a written test. Along with first, second and third place overall winners, winners are selected for each division. The top overall Elite Showman receives \$2,000, the second place finisher receives \$1,000 and the third place overall winner receives \$500. Division winners are awarded \$300 each. All other competitors receive a \$50 prize.

- Swine Showmanship: Lindsy Loos from Sherman County; Sheep Showmanship: Fina Choat from Boone County; Beef Showmanship: Megan Muller from Dixon County; Written Test: Fina Choat from Boone County; Interview: Felicia Knoerzer from Gosper County.
- Tara Lee Hudson of Thayer County was among the other participants in the show.

National Preparedness Month

September is National Preparedness Month. With all the recent natural disasters in the news, this is a great reminder for us to take the time to be prepared and focus on having an action plan. Your plan should address how to stay safe and communicate during any disaster that may affect our region.

Being prepared goes beyond awareness and makes sure you have a set plan to implement, if needed. Everyone should know their role and responsibilities during any emergency.

Being prepared includes having an emergency supply kit, making a family emergency plan, and staying informed about different types of emergencies. After preparing ourselves and our families, we need to take the next step and get involved in helping our community be prepared.

When preparing for a possible emergency situation, it's best to think first about the basics of survival: fresh water, food, clean air and warmth. Recommended items to include in a basic emergency supply kit are:

- Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days
- Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered radio and a NOAA Weather - Radio with tone alert
- Flashlight, batteries
- Back-up power source for cell phones
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust masks, to help filter contaminated air

- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist wipes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- Hygiene items

This list is just the basics. You will need to add items if you have a baby, pet, or take medications. Other ideas are to take photos of valuables and important papers. Also put in a safe place important documents, extra cash, cold weather items, matches, fire extinguisher, activities for children, writing material, bleach for disinfecting and extra clothes. If possible, store items in water proof containers.

During an emergency, your family may not be together. Therefore, it is important to plan how you will contact one another; how you will get back together; and what you will do in different situations.

The staff at Thayer County Health Services works closely with Thayer County Emergency Management and other local agencies on developing plans to be prepared for any medical emergency.


Recycling Center Open September 16



Born in Hebron, raised
on a farm near Carleton,
graduate of Belvidere High
School, Barbara Joan Deepe
was a successful, big-city
businesswoman, adventure-
some world traveler and
prolific needlecraft.

She died Sept. 2, 2017,
peacefully in her historic
house in San Francisco.
Often called by her middle
name of Joan, she was 80
years old.

The younger daughter
born to Martin and Doris
Widler Deepe, Joan began
her education in the Coon
Ridge country school that

graduating in 1954.

She was gifted with ex-

and soon anti-war protestors.
She studied to be a steno-
graphic court reporter and
worked in that field.

Soon the independent-
minded young woman with
a free spirit and a pixie smile
launched Joan's Secretarial
Service in the heart of the
competitive financial district
of San Francisco. From her
one-person office during this
pre-computer era the sounds
of her fast-flying fingers typ-
ing legal briefs or statistical
tables could be heard down
the hallway.

She did well enough that
she vacationed at far-flung
places. She took a bus trip
through parts of the Middle
East and visited Afghanistan
long before U.S. combat
troops arrived—and are still
there. She took river cruises
down the Volga in the So-
viet Union and the Rhine
through Germany. She flew
to Australia and adored the
koala bears that were living
reminders of her beloved
teddies she had played with
as a kid.

She recalled recently that
just 40 years ago she could
buy and move into her trea-
sured Victorian-styled home
on the edge of the lush Holly
Park in the Bernal Heights
section of San Francisco.
In the evenings there, her
never-idle fingers turned to
needlework. She embroi-
dered dozens of samplers for
her mother and sister and two
queen-sized quilts, one for
her sister and one as the 50th
wedding anniversary present
in 1984 for her parents. She
made none for herself.

She is survived by her
mother, Doris; sister, Bev-
erly and her husband, Chuck
Keever; aunts, Audrey Else
and Marilyn Widler; and
numerous cousins.

p.m., September 15, at the





During the second and third sets, however, the Eagles seemed too comfortable, Alfs said.


"We didn't continue to execute our game plan. The girls need to learn to play consistent from start to finish," Alfs said.





Lyle S. Lee, 55, of Ohiowa received a sentence of 5-7 years Aug. 15 for drug sale activities in Fillmore County.

According to court records, Kues sold methamphetamine to a R.A.P. Confidential Informant last

year in the parking lot of Corner Stop in Geneva. Habitual criminal charges were dropped in the plea agreement. A DNA sample was also ordered.

Also on Aug. 25, Lee was sentenced by Johnson to not less than three years nor more than five years with the Nebraska Department of Corrections for the class 2 felony charges of unlawful distribution of an exceptionally hazardous drug.

Both sentences were ordered to run concurrent. Lee was given credit for six days served. The defendant was also ordered to pay \$209.55 in court costs, plus any additional transportation costs, a \$10 offender assessment and was to provide a DNA sample.

Prior to sentencing, Johnson determined Lee was not a fit candidate for probation.

A third class 2 felony count was dismissed as a result of an earlier plea agreement.

According to court documents, Lee sold a gram of methamphetamine Jan. 22, 2016, to a R.A.P. confidential informant in the parking lot of Corner Stop in Geneva.

On Feb. 8, 2016, Lee sold a gram of heroin to a R.A.P. confidential informant at the same parking lot.

Court records indicate Lee told the C.I. she had sold 10 eight balls of heroin in the past week.

National gas price average hits highest pump price of the year

At \$2.45 a gallon, today's national gas price average is the highest recorded price for unleaded gasoline so far this year. The near-term combinations of numerous refinery and pipeline shut downs, tightened access to supply levels in the Gulf and anticipated high gasoline demand surrounding Labor Day weekend, means motorists may not have seen the full impact of Harvey at the pump.

"Consumers will see a short-term spike in the coming weeks with gas prices on the national level likely topping \$2.50/gal, but quickly dropping by mid to late September," said Jeanette Casselano, AAA spokesperson. "AAA does not expect refineries to be offline for months, as early reports indicate minimal to no significant damage to Corpus Christi and Houston refineries."

The coming days, with Corpus Christi refineries working to come back online and Houston/Galveston beginning to dry out, will offer more insight into how long total recovery and restoration efforts may take.

Harvey has set a record for the greatest amount of single-storm rainfall for the continental U.S. Through Friday, the storm continues to threaten heavy rain to parts of Louisiana and eastern Texas (3 to 6 inches), and even move into western Kentucky (10 inches). In the Houston/Galveston area, flooding, not rain, is now the concern.

"The storm has had a devastating effect on the lives of so many," said Marshall Doney, President and CEO, AAA. "Our regional AAA are working around the clock in Texas and in other affected areas to help our members in need, and our thoughts are with all of those impacted

by this storm."

Gulf Coast Refinery and Pipeline Status

As of Wednesday evening, the Department of Energy (DOE) is reporting that 10 Gulf Coast refineries remain shut down. Six refineries have begun the process of assessing damage and restarting, which may take several days. Two refineries in the Gulf Coast region are operating at reduced rates. Refineries in Lake Charles, La., could shut or reduce rates as Harvey moves east. Additionally, DOE released 500,000 barrels of oil from the U.S. Strategic Petroleum Reserve - the nation's reserve of crude oil. The oil will be delivered via pipeline to the Phillips 66 refinery in Westlake, LA. According to DOE, it will continue to review incoming requests for oil in the reserve, meaning that it could release more if deemed necessary.

In addition to refinery shut downs, several major pipelines continue to operate at reduced rates, have shut down, or plan to shut down due to lack of supply. The Colonial Pipeline announced Wednesday evening it expects to temporarily suspend its gasoline, diesel and jet fuel pipelines. With its supplying refineries closed in the area, the pipeline operator cited reduced output as the reason for suspending its transportation operations. The Pipeline originates in Houston and supplies the East Coast.

"The shut downs do not indicate a shortage of gasoline supplies in the Gulf Coast region or across the country," added Casselano. "These are preventative measures. Overall stocks in the Gulf are above average levels and will be available to drivers once power is restored and area roads are cleared."

Refinery, pipeline and

logistical problems on the Gulf Coast are expected to squeeze fuel supply delivery volumes to the Southeast, Midwest and Mid-Atlantic.

"Northeast refiners are stepping in and barging supplies to the U.S. Southeast, the Caribbean, Mexico and South America to offset the lack of supply from Gulf Coast refineries and pipelines shut down due to Harvey," added Casselano.

To help alleviate concerns about fuel supply shortages as a result of the refinery and logistics issues in the Gulf Coast, on Wednesday the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued a waiver requirement for low volatility conventional gasoline and Reformulated Gasoline (RFG) in 12 states: Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Texas, Louisiana and the District of Columbia. With the waiver, retailers in the aforementioned states are allowed to sell "winter blend" gasoline early.

Gas Prices

The states with the largest increases since Friday, when Harvey came ashore in Texas, include:

- + 19 cents - South Carolina \$2.63
- + 18 cents - Washington, D.C. \$2.65
- + 17 cents - Kentucky \$2.42
- + 16 cents - Georgia \$2.39, Missouri \$2.30 and North Carolina \$2.36
- + 14 cents - Maryland \$2.43
- + 13 cents - Alabama \$2.22 and Kansas \$2.34
- + 12 cents - Mississippi \$2.21, Oklahoma \$2.24, Tennessee \$2.26 and West Virginia \$2.47
- + 11 cents - Arkansas \$2.21, Iowa \$2.40, Michigan \$2.59, Texas \$2.26 and Virginia \$2.24

The last time the national gas price average was \$2.50 was two years ago in August of 2015.
