### Resource meeting gives leaders tips

From grant programs for the deconstruction of abandoned buildings to growth for swine and dairy to overall economic development in the livestock industry, the resource event last month in Hebron arranged by Thayer County Economic Development Alliance, drew nearly 50 people, including leaders of villages and cities in Thayer.

Southeast Community College Learning Center in Hebron was the location for the Aug. 30 event.

Three to four representatives from mostly ag-related companies, organizations and agencies spent approximately 25 minutes each explaining resource opportunities to audiences that rotated through sessions, and collected literature, contacts and notes.

"I was really pleased half the council was here today," Larry Fangmeier of the Hebron City Council said. "This is a worthwhile meeting. These pieces of information could make all the difference.'

Meanwhile, TCEDA director, Diane Wettstein, said the presenters were excited as well.

"The event was a way to get their programs out to the public," she said. Wettstein organized the two-hour event to create a communicative bridge.

For example, the Alliance for the Future of Agriculture in Nebraska touts its one-on-one assistance with zoning regulations for producers looking to expand, tips on building sound livestock facilities and videos and radio spots promoting livestock.

Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality has one-stop permit meetings for incoming businesses or

livestock facilities. The Nebraska Department of Agriculture developed a livestock siting assessment matrix after being directed by the Nebraska Legislature in 2015, the same year Thayer became a livestock friendly county, along with Fillmore.

The matrix allows county commissioners and zoning boards to assign points to facets of potential projects and review their likelihoods of moving forward.

The Center for Rural Affairs helps with technical assistance in troubleshooting cash flow, budgeting, loan packaging and small business lending through the Rural Enterprise Assistance Project.

And, Norris Public Power District supports development in offering an economic development rate for new or expanding customers.

Norris's communication coordinator, Vicky Jurgens, said there are energy classes for every grade. Norris educates students about electricity, including careers and safety training. Scholarships are available for students of Norris customers.

Hebron City Councilman Kurk Wiedel said he was looking into resources for the Denny's Entertainment building next to city hall that was purchased for \$16,000 by the city.

"I'd like to take this information and start the process with that building," Wiedel said.

The event was also a chance for TCEDA to reiterate the Southeast Nebraska Development District fund for down payment assistance on homes and the USDA revolving loan fund for businesses.

The SENDD organization has four targets - housing, community development, emergency/disaster relief and economic development each have a list of assistance projects such as, owner occupied rehabilitation, community development block grants, floodplain management and GIS mapping.

At TCEDA, there is \$40,000 available for down pay-

### **School tax** request decreases

The Thaver Central Community Schools District decreased its tax request for the 2018-2019 fiscal year by 1.8 cents because projects such as, the heating, ventilation and air conditioning system for the high school that was acquired six years ago and the \$3.2 million elementary school

The district has \$296,000 on the HVAC system and \$690,000 for the addition remaining.

"Everyone appreciates the fact we are bringing down our tax request," Superintendent Drew Harris said. "It's difficult times in agriculture.' Harris is referring to the trade

conflict as President Donald Trump seeks to rebuild a system that would be fair for all countries involved.

Regarding the district's facilities, no meetings are planned for at least the next two months because of the harvest.

"Overall, our facilities are sufficient," Harris said. "Safety-wise, connecting the buildings would be an improvement." Connecting the buildings tops the list of suggested improvements.

"It's the harvest right now. In November, we can start meetings again and see the best way to approach this," he said.

Harris said there were no unexpected expenses over the past fiscal year. The district had funds left over to reallocate to food service and the depreciation account for future projects.

The district will continue to remodel what's left of the high school's 14 classrooms.

Remodeling has taken place in two to three classrooms a year.

The chemistry lab and media center are on the district's radar for improvements, and within two to three years, the district is planning the same for the original classrooms in the elementary building. They were last touched

### City sets budget

The City of Hebron will implement a three percent increase in its budget this fiscal year, as opposed to the 3.64 percent increase last year.

Accountant Brian Blobaum said new property growth will absorb .38 percent, which leaves a 2.62 increase in prior existing properties.

The levy rate last year was .470041 and this year's rate is .485499. By law, the city cannot levy more than .50.

The city's finance committee, Larry Fangmeier, Kurk Wiedel and Tim Pickering, met with departments to forecast expenditures.

'We looked at it pretty closely. We're catching up on maintenance that hasn't been done in several years and we're finding more and more to catch up on," Fangmeier said.

Valuation dropped slightly and aren't showing they will increase dramatically in the future.

"Property taxes are not raising nearly as fast as health insurance and various other expenses," Blobaum said at the city's public hearing for the budget earlier this month.

The city will have to make a transfer from the utility fund to the general fund next year, Blobaum said.

Transfers to the general fund from utilities are commonplace for cities. A transfer in 2007 was \$150,000 and that rose to \$250,000 through the years. The city does not transfer funds every

In connection with the recent death of J. R. Prentice of this city, it is of interest to reprint the following account of his medal of honor, which appeared in the Journal. The article is quite long, so it could not all be included in this column, but the paragraph below gives an account of the deed which won the medal of honor for J. R. in the battle at Stone River, Tenn.: "Our brigade was in the battle at Stone River, Tenn., and was cut off from both sides so that we had to retreat. My major was cut down and I returned and picked him up and his sword and carried him about one-half mile. By the time I reached there he was dead. The First Lieutenant noticed what I had done and made a memorandum of it, for promotion. Afterwards he went into recruiting services and I never got it. A few years ago I was reading about Andersonville prison, and reading about these medals of honor, I thought I would see if I couldn't get one. I wrote to the Adjutant General, and he told me that my deed deserved a medal and if I could furnish proof of the fact I could get it. I wrote to Colonel McCook of the 2nd Ohio, and secured affidavits of five other soldiers who had witnessed it, and turned it over to the Adjutant General. Three or four

the medal." Obituary: Michael Dennis Lennon was born in Lafayette, Tippecanoe County, Ind., May 27, 1853. He came to Hebron in October, 1884. and started in the monument business for himself. In Nov., 1885, he married Aloise Sedlacek of Fort Dodge, Iowa. He leaves his widow and five children to mourn his loss. He died on July 22, 1908, at the age of 55 years, 1 month and 25 days.

#### **Nebraska Timeline**

BY THE NEBRASKA STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY Southeast Nebraska's oil boom

In the latter 1930s Rich-

ardson County in Nebraska's southeast corner was the scene of feverish excitement. The Falls City Journal announced November 24, 1938, that oil drilling at three area sites was underway. Potential oil and gas land had been leased by several groups and individuals. The small Pawnee Royalty Company had obtained oil from its Boice well, according to the Journal of November


Imagine the excitement this news generated after years of economic depression. People wondered if Nebraska might become an oil state like Texas or Oklahoma.

The Boice well was the first producing well in southeast Nebraska. There were no oil refineries in Richardson County, and the crude oil produced was trucked to the Searle Refining Company of Omaha. The Pawnee Royalty Company drilled the new Bucholz well and obtained oil similar in quality to that derived from the Boice well. The Bucholz was soon flowing at the rate of 330 barrels per day. It qualified for the cash prize offered by the Nebraska Legislature to the first oil well in the state producing fifty barrels of oil for sixty

consecutive days. A flurry of activity over oil leases followed the successful pumping at the Bucholz as larger companies and more experienced oil men tried to capitalize on the small boom. The Skelly Company sent in a crew of fifty-five. The search for oil expanded throughout Richardson County, to the south into Missouri, and on the north about fifty miles into the area around Peru.

However, the oil boomlet was encountering difficulties, including a lack of local refinery facilities and low demand for the oil produced. By October 5, 1940, the Journal reported that two refineries were operating in Falls City and that a third was being built in Salem. In the fall of 1940 there was an increase in the production of individual wells and in the number of wells drilled-part of the drillers' strategy for heading off nearby competitors who might be draining the same pool of oil that was feeding their wells. In an effort to prolong the life of the oil field, well owners finally restricted production voluntarily.

The last month in 1941 witnessed a decline in Richardson County's oil production, and each month in 1942 saw a continuation of the same trend. The oil fields were being pumped dry. The county's first oil boom had been brief, lasting only three years. However, it did stimulate Nebraska's interest in oil and developed new economic ventures in the area.

When your child transitions to their teenage years, it brings unique challenges, and an increased chance of tragedy. Eight to 14 is the age group most at risk for injury or death in the event of a crash. Tweens can push boundaries, but standing strong and ensuring they buckle up can save their life. You may not always be at their side, but the influence you've had on them is. The habits that children form will follow them throughout their lives, and car seat and seat belt safety is crucial for their well-being.

There are certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians across the country available to do car seat checks. These technicians offer advice and instruction to parents and caregivers that includes information on transitioning tweens from a booster seat to a seat belt if they are big enough.

Technicians can also help educate you on choosing the right seat for their child, the importance of registering that car seat or booster seat with its manufacturer, riding in the back seat where it is

safest and what to expect if the seat is subject to a safety

Lives lost and injuries statistics:

· Car crashes are a leading

cause of death for children. Every 33 seconds in 2016, 1 child under the age of

13 was involved in a crash. From 2012 to 2016, there were 3,268 children under the age of 13 were killed in a car crash. These numbers have been increasing steadily since 2014.

· On average, nearly two children under 13 are killed daily while riding in a vehicle.

· From 2012 to 2016, there were 1,132 "tweens" (8 to 14 years old) killed in passenger

· In 2016, children between the age of 8-12 had the highest number of fatalities (262, or 36 percent) among children. This is an 11 percent increase from 2015. Almost 50 percent killed were unbuckled.

· In 2016, over one-third (35 percent) of children under of the age of 13 killed in car crashes were not restrained in car seats, booster seats, or seat belts.

· Statistically, more crashes occur during "school hours" (Monday through






#### **BVCA** receives \$252,000 grant to continue home rehabilitation program

The State of Nebraska's Department of Economic Development awarded Blue Valley Community Action Partnership a \$252,000 grant to continue the Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation (OOR) program.

OOR provides incomequalified homeowners with up to \$25,000 to rehabilitate their homes to Minimum Rehabilitation Standards established by the State of Nebraska, with a lifespan of 20 years for the residence. Rehabilitation focuses on safety and energy-efficiency.

BVCA Housing Director Kim Clark said, "The Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation program not only benefits the individual homeowner, but also the entire neighborhood through improved property values and curb appeal."

Program participants receive conditional grants,

forgivable loans, or lowinterest loans depending on income. Applicants must be at 100-percent of the median income in their county or less to qualify. Other requirements include but aren't

• The house must be the applicant's primary residence.

• The house must be able to be brought up to Minimum Rehabilitation Standards for \$25,000 or less.

• Successful applicants must agree to remain in the home for 10 years.






