## Gold Out night planned

The parents of Aiden Mostek, Jennifer and Adam, want to do their part.

"I learned after Aiden was diagnosed with cancer that over a dozen different types of childhood cancers have only four percent of the national budget for cancer research to share," she said.

Aiden is doing well now and will undergo a checkup scan Oct. 3. The fourth grader's hair has grown back after over 54 weeks of chemotherapy and six weeks of radiation from embryonal rhabdomyosarcoma cancer, which he was diagnosed with in January of 2016.

The Mosteks will host "Gold Out Night" to "Tackle Childhood Cancer" Sept. 22 during Thayer Central's home football game against Kenesaw at 7 p.m. They have sold T-shirts and will hold a split the pot raffle. All proceeds will go to Sammy's Superheroes, a foundation in Columbus that raises money for childhood cancer research.

While survival rates have improved for most childhood cancers over recent decades, childhood cancer is the No. 1 cause of death by disease, which begs for further research and advances to produce more effective treatments, the National Cancer Institute states. The institute's 4.93 billion 2015 budget had only \$198 million to apply toward childhood cancer.

"I'm trying to do my part to raise awareness and funding. Another shocking fact is Nebraska is among the top five states with the highest childhood cancer rates and almost nobody knows that," Mostek said. "Without proper funding, we can't get better treatments. In the last 40 years, only three new drugs have been created for kids."

In addition, the Coalition of Childhood Cancer states hundreds of drugs have been created for adults while drugs for children lagged. Pediatric stays in hospitals are for cancer more than any other pediatric condition at a cost of \$40,000 per day.

Funding for prostate cancer in adults stretches further than funding for all childhood cancers combined, plus:

- During 2013, there were 14,728 invasive cancer diagnoses and 1,914 cancer deaths in the United States among children and adolescents (0-19 years), and

- In Nebraska and throughout the United States, cancer is ranked as the second most common cause of death for children and adolescents between one and 19 years of age, exceeded only by accidents.

## Wish delivered to six-year-old

Family members, Make-A-Wish Nebraska, the Thayer Central Elementary community, members of the high school student council, and even Batman rallied for six-year-old Alex Vorderstrasse Sept. 14.

Students stomped their feet to the beat of the student council's cheers in the elementary gymnasium before Batman arrived to present Alex with his dream wish - a Disney cruise.

The assembly cheered Alex on as he continues his journey with hypoplastic left heart syndrome, a condition he has had his entire life.

His parents, Spencer and Ranae, knew about what they call his "broken" heart before he was born. The left side of Alex's heart doesn't work as well the right side.

"He will say he wishes his heart wasn't broken," mom Ranae said before Alex's big day. "Alex is really wishing he will get a new heart someday."

The syndrome can be fatal. Patients are directed to a three-step surgical process - three surgeries, not necessarily in succession. Alex had his first surgery when he was four days old and the second as he turned six months old. His

third surgery was in August of last year.

"He will need a heart transplant eventually," Ranae said.

Doctors had told Spencer and Ranae Alex would be slowed down by the cardiac condition, but Ranae hasn't seen that. Her caring, funny and very loving boy, who is a brother to his four siblings, recently reported to her he made a goal in two-hand touch football, and she said he completed an 800-meter run.

"He is right where he is supposed to be," she said. "We let him do what he feels like he can do," adding contact sports isn't an option.

Her voice was excited as she described Make-A-Wish's mission for Alex.

"They came to interview him at our house and asked him what is your favorite everything," she said the day prior to the assembly.

Alex had let Make-A-Wish know Batman was his favorite hero. Make-A-Wish asked Alex's parents if they minded him taking a ride in Batman's modern day Batmobile.

The night before the assembly, Alex received a note, "I have a message to get to you from Batman."

The morning of, Alex received another, "I have figured out how to get you your message."

Batman must have helped plan the event because he strutted into the elementary gym and amid cheers, found his way to Alex. Together, he and Make-A-Wish told Alex the good news.

"We are so excited for Thayer Central to be part of Alex's wish reveal," Bridgette Young, president and chief executive officer of Make-A-Wish said. "This is something that is so special to the wish process, and for all his friends and family to see his joy is something this community will never forget."

Make-A-Wish has visited the Hebron community before and Batman took note.

"Is Aiden here?" he called out to the elementary audience.

Aiden Mostek, who received his wish earlier this year to meet Youtube star, Stampylongnose, stepped forward.

Before long, Batman asked Alex if he wanted a ride in the coveted Batmobile. The packed gym emptied out as everyone made their way through the new elementary halls to the outside and crowded around the Batmobile for cheering, photos and to hold up those handmade signs of encouragement.

And something Ranae said earlier stood out:

"He doesn't understand how much of a big deal he is."

## 1887

### 130 Years Ago

For the first time in over 30 years, I. W. Evans has taken a lay-off from constant labor to join his old regiment in Buffalo at the 31st National Encampment of the G.A.R. and to visit his childhood home in New York state.

Wednesday afternoon Mrs. Maggie Kirby received a telegram from the coroner at Osceola, Iowa, saying that her nephew, Ira Sutton, had that morning been killed by the cars. The body was taken to Carleton. His aunts, Mrs. Kirby and Mrs. J. A. Ayres and families and friends and Rev. S. Cooke, went to Carleton today where they will meet his only sister, Mrs. Stella Sutton Brown, of Janesville, Wis., when all that is mortal of Ira will be laid to rest beside his father and mother, in the Carleton cemetery. He had many friends in Hebron, where he had made his home from early boyhood with his aunt, Mrs. Kirby.

How easy it rains, one hour sunshine, the next shower.

Chester is building a school house.

The Thayer County Bank has discontinued the banking business at Deshler.

The funeral services of Clark Rudd were conducted from the house of his father, Fayette Rudd, Sunday. The body was interred in the Hebron cemetery. Clark had been west holding a homestead, was taken sick and brought home only a few weeks since, and has been failing ever since, until Friday when he died.

Mrs. A. S. Rife and Thomas Eckles, of Belvidere, were married by Rev. Hawley of Alexandria, at the residence of F. E. Matson last Sunday evening.

Wetherald Brothers are shipping wheat from the eastern part of the state for milling purposes. They shipped three cars of flour to Superior, Red Cloud and St. Louis this week.

A traveling band of gypsies, so-called, camped on Spring Creek, received much attention this week from the school children.

E. E. Brainerd of the Chester Herald has concluded to leave Chester and follow his predecessors, the McLaurie Brothers to Belleville, Kan., where he will take charge of the Telescope. McLauries are running a straight democratic paper and Brainerd will run a straight republican paper, both having edited independent papers at Chester. Mr. Brainerd's successor has not been secured by the Chester Herald company.

A footbridge will soon be constructed across the Blue near the mill to accommodate pedestrians who wish to attend the county fair.

J. M. King started for Chicago this morning to arrange for the manufacture of his pruning knives.

Obituary: Little Ada Feaster, the youngest child of Geo. W. and Laura Feaster, passed away Sept. 3, after having been sick only about 23 hours, aged 2 years. The body was interred in the cemetery at Belvidere.

White of Oak Grove, Mo., arrived Saturday and will make her home with her daughter, Mrs. Robert Hedrick.

Belvidere: The opera house was used Tuesday evening for the Vitoscope entertainment. It was said to be very laughable...Several families took wagons and camping outfit and visited the Indian doctor last Thursday setting up their tent and spending the night...W. C. Warner, of Arkansas, arrived in our city last Saturday. He will remain here for some time, and will probably locate in our midst...The free Methodist denomination are holding religious meetings at the Burruss hall.

## 1907

### 110 Years Ago

We can rejoice we have another good man at the mill, but regret the fact that we lose from our midst the good and hospitable people.

Word received by O. C. Wells, is to the effect that his brother Frank of Kenesaw is much improved and able to ride in a buggy.

## 1917

### 100 Years Ago

Henry Hughes' cafe was broken into Monday night, \$200 worth of cigars (the 5-cent brand) stolen. They also tried to gain admittance into the Red Cross Pharmacy, but failed. Bloodhounds were brought from Beatrice and the dogs succeeded in tracking the thieves into the alley back of the restaurant, and several other places in town, but would always come back to the same place, so it is presumed the thieves had a car in waiting in the alley and were driven away.

The Opera House, under the new management of Herman Bruning, Frank Bruning and R. J. Lilliedoll, have leased the opera house for the period of one year and will conduct motion pictures, plays and everything in the opera line.

Quite a number from Bruning attended the banquet for the soldiers at Hebron Saturday and report the banquet and speaking excellent.

# National Cholesterol Education Month



September is National Cholesterol Education Month. This month is a good reminder to get your blood cholesterol checked. If it is high, you need to take steps to lower it. It is also a good time to learn about lipid profiles and how food and lifestyle choices that help you reach your personal cholesterol goals.

Children, young adults and older Americans can all have high cholesterol. More than 102 million American adults (20 years or older) have total cholesterol levels at or above 200 mg/dL, which is above healthy levels. More than 35 million of these people have levels of 240 mg/dL or higher, which puts them at high risk for heart disease.

It is important to know your levels and learn how to prevent high cholesterol. High cholesterol is a major risk factor for heart disease, the leading cause of death in the United States.

Cholesterol is a waxy, fat-like substance found in your body and many foods. Your body needs cholesterol to function normally and makes all that you need. Too much cholesterol can build up in your arteries. After a while, these deposits narrow your arteries, putting you at risk for heart disease and stroke.

High cholesterol usually doesn't have any symptoms. As a result, you may not know your cholesterol levels are too high. To find out your cholesterol levels, doctors can do a simple blood test to check. High cholesterol can be controlled through lifestyle changes or if it that is not enough, through medications.

Desirable Cholesterol Levels:

Total cholesterol - Less than 170 mg/dL

Low LDL ("bad") cho-

lesterol - Less than 110 mg/dL

High HDL ("good") cholesterol - 35 mg/dL or higher

Triglycerides - Less than 150 mg/dL

High cholesterol can develop even in early childhood and adolescence, and the risk increases as weight increases. In the United States, more than 20 percent of youth aged 12-19 years have at least one abnormal lipid level. Children over two years of age should have their cholesterol checked if: they are overweight/obese, have a family history of high cholesterol, a family history of heart disease, diabetes, high blood pressure, or certain chronic condition (chronic kidney disease, chronic inflammatory diseases, congenital heart disease, and childhood cancer survivorship.)

The key to preventing diseases associated with high cholesterol is early detection and treatment. A cholesterol lab test is just one of the lab tests included at Thayer County Health Services Reduced Priced Lab event being held on Saturday, September 23, from 5 a.m. to 10 a.m., at the hospital in Hebron. No appointments are required.

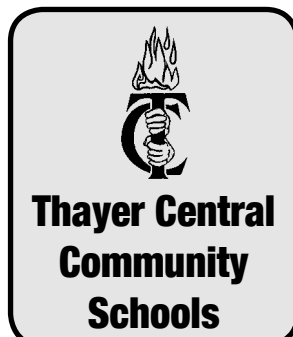

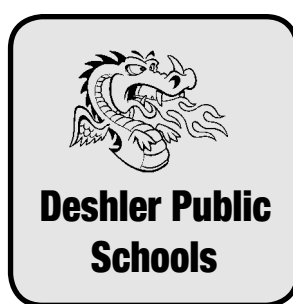
