Airport to celebrate years of service

In June of 1940, Hebron business men were working "on their toes," to implement requirements they needed for an airport and ground school to train civilian pilots.

The state's aeronautics commission had approved a level location on a 160 acres belonging to the Zutters. Mrs. Zutter lived in Chicago and sent her signed, five-year lease of the land via U.S. air mail, and Hebron businessmen took on \$200 to \$300 of the expense after crop revenue was included.

Tenant E.L. Wehrbein cut the grain for three runways — one northeast to southwest; another northwest to southeast; and the third, north to south. Each runway was approximately 2,100 feet long.

Sam Stull was the flight operator and Professor Hofstad was the instructor for the ground school, which consisted of two hours on aviation history; 12 hours for civil air regulations; 15 hours each on navigation, meteorology, aircraft and the theory of flight; five for engines and instruments; two hours for radio uses and forms; and one hour for parachute training.

The airport has evolved since it was established

in 1942. In 1965, the Hebron Flying Club was incorporated by Dr. Louis Bunting, M.L. Christensen, Ray Mieth and Jack Stewart. Ted Tietjen of Byron was one of the original members. Others who joined were Harley Grone of Davenport and Dr. R.E. Penry and Dr. John Butler of Hebron.

The purpose of the club was to promote flying in Hebron, and it owned a 1965 Cessna 150 aircraft for use by its members.

Around 1970, Marlowe Huber began spending time at the airport. He refers to Mieth as "Mr. Airport."

"He pushed snow and emptied wastebaskets. He was doing everything except overhauling planes," Huber said.

Huber said he was never into golfing and after he retired from the mail route in 1993, he didn't have much else to do, but hang out at the airport.

"An 'airport bum,' they called me," he said. At age 90, Huber still flies.

Early mornings are best, he said.

"The public thinks flying on sunny days are nice, but there are air currents," he said. "The hotter the day, the worse it is."

He gained his license to fly in 1970 and has had

Debate focuses on rural issues

Incumbent, District 32 Sen. Laura Ebke, gave a glimpse into working across party lines when it comes to bills in Nebraska's Unicameral while candidate for the Dist. 32 seat, Tom Brandt, pushed for property tax reform at Hebron's Majestic Theater Sept. 19.

The debate was initiated by Ebke, who is a libertarian, and moderated by Thayer Central teacher and speech and debate coach, Justin Bomar.

"I did want to debate and push him to debate," Ebke said. "I think it's important for citizens to hear us side by side."

Ebke became the Dist. 32 senator in 2014 as a republican. She is the chairperson for the judiciary committee and is assigned to the education committee.

Brandt's plugs for property tax reform stemmed from the first of four questions posed by Bomar. Brandt is a republican.

"I really tried to focus on rural Nebraska, and I researched the candidates," Bomar said about formatting the questions on reforming school funding without the burden falling on rural land-owners and farmers; solutions for a weakening ag economy with declining valuations and low crop prices in many rural areas; encouraging economic development outside of the ag sector and keeping corporations in the state; and alternatives to college debt with the state's management.

The debate was just under 60 minutes with no questions from the public, although a meet and greet with Ebke and Brandt was held afterward.

Introductory and closing statements were timed to four minutes. The two candidates each had three minutes to answer the questions with one-minute rebuttals. A coin toss resulted in Ebke answering questions one and three first. Brandt took questions two and four.

Ebke's ideas for school funding included a base cost for the state of \$3,000 per student and work across party lines to pinpoint budget cuts without raising taxes. Brandt pointed out Thayer County schools do not receive state equalization aid, now at \$848 million. He wants to re-balance the system through sales, income and property taxes.

For the second question on the agricultural economy, Brandt returned to property tax and compared today's prices to prices in 1973.

The economy is going through a down cycle, he said.

Ebke said the revenue committee has no interest in reforming tax bills, giving an inside look at how bill banter mulls through the unicameral, but said she has sat down with other senators to discuss bills line by line.

Brandt rebutted, saying he thinks senators understand the agricultural community is suffering.

It was Ebke's turn to answer the third question on business outside the agricultural economy.

"We have let government control way too many things. We have so much red tape," she said. People come back because they love Nebraska, but we need other incentives."

Ebke was the sponsor for LB299, which the governor signed into law as The Occupational Board Reform Act. The Act requires the state to review jobs licensing laws every five years and gives people who have been



Brusseau murder will be covered in documentary

A small film crew visited Chester Sept. 22 to shoot footage for a documentary about Janet Brusseau. Her mummified body was discovered in the garage of a home on Chester's main street in 2003. Brusseau was killed in 1997 by John Mooney, who was sentenced to 20 years in prison after he pleaded no contest to first degree murder. Asphyxiation and blunt force trauma were named as contributing to her death. After a physical confrontation with Brusseau before Christmas in 1997, Mooney left her lying in the garage and subsequently married and made a life in California. Her family hired a private detective in 1999, but the detective couldn't find Brusseau. The documentary is for "Secrets of the Morgue," which airs on Discovery ID. The documentary is scheduled for an episode in December. Members of the film crew are Tara Hughes, Ross MacIntosh and Chuck Kraft. The crew was also planning to interview law enforcement officers who worked on the case.

1908 110 Years Ago

Last Saturday a number of Bruning citizens were having a conflict with farmers adjacent to the town, over the question of enlarging the school district in Bruning village and taking in adjoining territory. The town faction claimed that a section of the law provides that a school district shall have three sections, and the Bruning district has but two and a half sections. The farmers don't care to be thrown into the town district on account of the heavier taxation. Attorneys Sloan & Burke of Geneva, appeared for the Bruning school board, and Richards & Haffke for the farmers. The case was continued.

Joe Walker, residing on his homestead a mile and a half south of Alexandria, died last Friday, aged 77 years. Mr. Walker came to this county in 1859 and is said to be the oldest settler in Thayer County at the time of his death. Several times he was driving off of his place by Indian raids.

The school board has hired architect Germandt of Fairbury to draw plans for the new schoolhouse, which will be of brick, two stories high, with three rooms on each floor. The first floor will be completed, but only one room on the second floor will be finished at present. There will be two playrooms in the basement, besides the heating plant.

1918 100 Years Ago

On complaint of J. M. Lamb of Rose Creek, in a hearing before the county judge, Wm. Lamb and Sam Carpenter were fined \$100

and costs for poker playing. Charges preferred against H. Bartling, B. Clark and J. F. Lowe were dismissed.

Hubbell News: Mrs. Lucy Lamb has taken a little girl to raise. She is 11 years old and from the Lincoln orphan's home...A small tornado passed thru the Liberty District last Wednesday and toppled over and carried several small buildings to draws and dropped them. Mr. Hudson's new hog house was demolished along with many other things...A large crowd attended John Zlab's sale Thursday and everything sold well. John will be on his way to the Navy before long. He will be greatly missed.

1928 90 Years Ago

Belvidere: Rev. Fowler drove from McCool, Sunday, to fill the pulpit at the M. E. Church. He moved his household goods Monday into the Wilson house where they will live until the parsonage is ready for them.

Ben Terry of Alexandria sold his 160 acre farm five miles north of Alexandria, for a cash consideration of \$22,000. Who says Thayer county land is not advancing in price, with 40 bushels of wheat and 60 bushels of oats, and with a splendid corn crop in sight?

Ruppert Kenner left last week to visit his brother at Talmadge. Next week Mr. and Mrs. Kenner and three little ones will return to Wenatchee, Wash., to arrange moving back to Hebron, where they will occupy Mrs. Kenner's home, the Wetherald residence. Mr. Kenner will resign his position with the power company at Wenatchee and will be affiliated with the Thayer County Bank.

The Howell house, corner Lincoln Avenue and Seventh Street, known as the F. J. Hendershot house, is being torn down, preparatory to erecting a residence for Ralph Hill's.

Mr. Edward Mertz of Roundhead, Ohio, and his sister, Mrs. Sarah Erwin, and family of Gilead, were entertained at the Sherman Corliss home Wednesday evening. On Mr. Mertz's last visit to Nebraska in early days, trails were the only roads. He remembers seeing several tribes of roving Indians in the Little Blue Valley.

1938 80 Years Ago

This issue of the Journal features a picture of the newly remodeled Majestic Theatre. Abe Records invites the public to attend the Grand Opening of the newly remodeled Majestic Theatre on Friday night. Besides the special picture, "Room Service," starring Marx Brothers, there will be a program, including whistling solos by H. A. Morris, vocal solo by Gordon Mittan, with accompaniment by Mr. and Mrs. Sittler of Deshler. The Majestic's modern front would be a credit to any city.

Its glittering exterior is suggestive of Hollywood with the marquee and neon light columns a blaze of scintillating color, all of which will be turned on for the first time Friday evening. Mr. Records is to be congratulated on his fine enterprise.

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

West Nile virus

Nebraska has had more deaths from West Nile virus than any other state this year. To date, six people in Nebraska have died from this illness in 2018. The total numbers of illnesses reported from West Nile have more than doubled in Nebraska. Hardest hit so far has been Douglas, Sarpy and Cass counties with 64 of the 79 illnesses reported.

The West Nile virus is an infectious disease that first appeared in the United States in 1999. It has become an important public health issue for the county and especially for Nebraska. This is due to the state having the necessary ingredients for the virus to spread: the right species of mosquitoes, standing water and birds that are carriers.

There currently is no vaccine to prevent West Nile. The best defense is to protect against getting bite by mosquitos. To protect yourself and your family, health officials recommend taking the following precautions:

- Apply mosquito repellent containing DEET;
- Wear long-sleeved shirt, pants and socks;
- Avoid going out at dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active;
- Eliminate standing water to reduce mosquito breeding sites;
- Use screens on windows to keep mosquitoes out.

Most people who are infected by a mosquito have no symptoms or only mild flu-like symptoms such as fever, headache, body aches, vom-

iting, fatigue and weakness. Less than 1 percent of people infected will develop a serious illness like encephalitis or meningitis (inflammation of the brain and surrounding tissues). People over 50 and those with weakened immune systems are especially vulnerable to the disease and are more likely to experience serious consequences.

If the West Nile virus enters the brain, it can be life-threatening. Symptoms of the more serious form of West Nile include disorientation, convulsions and paralysis. It may cause inflammation of the brain, called encephalitis, or inflammation of the tissue that surrounds the brain and spinal cord, called meningitis. A physical exam, health history and laboratory tests can diagnose it.

In more severe cases of West Nile, patients may need to be hospitalized to receive supportive treatment, such as intravenous fluids, pain medication, and nursing care. If you or a family member are experiencing symptoms that have you concerned, contact your health care provider. If necessary, there are several tests available to diagnose the West Nile virus.


