Teams are being sought for the Pony Express Run half-marathon relay Oct. 21.

Teams of four to run a halfmarathon with each member running 3.275 miles and passing the "mochila" mail bag in step with Pony Express history, are welcome.

The "mochilas" will feature each team's number and timing chip.

The fee to register teams includes a finisher's medal and performance shirt, along with a pre-race meal the evening of Oct. 20.

After team leaders have registered at active.com and paid the fee, individual team members can register, using the team password set by the leader.

The committee organizing the run held the first marathon and half-marathon event last year. They created the Pony Express Run to honor the history of the Pony Express.

Last year, "Where's the Finish?" relay team won the county division in 1:51.9. The team represented **Bruning**

"We hope that every community in Thayer County would find four runners to represent their town," committee member Jeff Friesen said. "Bring in some ringers. Make it a fun day to celebrate the history and community that we have in Thayer County.'

The Pony Express operated for approximately 19 months from April 1860 to October 1861. Riders changed horses about every 10 miles and passed the mochilas every to new riders about every 75 miles. They rode day and night to deliver the mail.

Officers make two arrests

The Thayer County Sheriff's Office made two arrests in the past week, with the first solving the August burglary at Peace Lutheran Church in Deshler.

Calvin Collins, 18, of Hebron, was arrested Sept. 19 at 4:05 a.m., for burglary and theft by unlawful taking. Collins has not been formally charged and the two initial reasons for arresting him could change once he is in the court system.

He is scheduled for arraignment Oct. 23 at 10 a.m. His bond was amended to 10 percent of \$10,000.

According to a warrantless arrest affidavit filed in Thayer County Court, Collins broke into the church during the early morning hours Aug. 24.

Taken was a Gibson guitar. Collins used the cross from the church's alter to break into the church's office. The cross was later tossed in a ditch near Deshler.

The Gibson was sold to a music store in Lawrence, Kan.

Charges are also pending against Eric Donahoe, 43, of Davenport. An affidavit shows Donahoe was arrersted for strangulation, terroristic threats, third degree assault and child abuse.

Donahoe was taken into police custody Sept. 22 after Donahoe argued with a minor child and held the child on the ground with at least one hand on the child's throat, according to the affidavit.

His bond was set at 10 percent of \$7,500. He is also due in court Oct. 23 at 10 a.m.

There were 45 vehicles in line as they passed through town, and they made a good display with flags, bunting, etc...The late rise in the price of wheat and corn has caused a big rush of grain on the market. The Marsh elevator weighed in 108 loads of corn and wheat Tuesday and during the rush it takes them half of the night to clean and car what they take in during the day...The infant son of August Geertz died last Friday night of cholera infantum and peritonitis...O. W. Coughman is moving out of Bruning today and will move to Carleton where he will take charge of the Lage house. Mrs. Mall has rented the Bruning house for one year and after thoroughly renovating will move into it where she will be found in the future better fixed than ever to entertain the traveling public...Prosperity has come to stay, and in proof of this, farmers are preparing to build all around us... Mr. C. H. Kimmel, who has been living with Mr. Rufus Park east of town for several years, concluded to go to housekeeping on his own account, and has persuaded

take his name and go down

to Kansas.

B. Summers has the record for raising wheat and oats. He threshed from 16 acres of wheat 720 bushels and from five acres of oats 400 bushels.

1907 110 Years Ago

J. M. Marsh of Hebron has purchased H. L. Weimer's elevator at Carleton, which will be run by Fred Marsh.

Fire at Gilead: One third of the village of Gilead, in east Thayer County, was destroyed by fire at an early hour Tuesday morning. The fire was discovered in the roof of Mrs. Richa's millinery store at 3:30 and had gained considerable headway at that time. It spread rapidly to the adjoining building which was occupied by the Gilead State Bank, the banker, Frank Nelson, living in the rear. M. Myer's restaurant was next fired and the meat market owned by the same man was consumed. Gilead is without fire protection of any kind and it was impossible to successfully combat the flames in the building already burning. A bucket brigade was quickly organized which concentrated its efforts to saving a stone building standing about 25 feet from the meat market. This checked the flames and confined the fire to the four business houses first mentioned. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Gilead phoned for help the night of the fire and H. W. Boyes, Frank Werner and the section boss went down on the hand car, but the buildings were too far gone to be saved.

This sentence is in addition to a former sentence of ten years formerly facing Ailene, considered the more desperate of the two criminals. The Bruning men had their first experience of testifying before a court marshal and say that the high army officers who conducted the trial dealt swift and severe punishment to the culprits.


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

County committee members are a critical component of FSA operations. Committees should be comprised of members who reflect the diversity of producers involved in production agriculture in Thayer County. This means that producers representing underserved groups or communities should be on the committee to speak on behalf of their constituency.

Underserved producers are beginning, women and other minority farmers and ranchers and land owners and/or operators who have limited resources. Other minority groups including Native American and Alaska Natives; persons under the poverty level, and persons that have disabilities are also considered underserved.

County committee election ballots will be mailed to eligible voters on Nov. 6, 2017. The last day to return completed ballots to the Thayer County USDA service center is Dec. 4, 2017.

Orthopedic Surgery

Did you know that Thayer County Health Services has two Orthopedic surgeons, Dr. Hurlbut and Dr. Bohlen, that perform knee replacement surgeries locally for patients? Knee replacement surgeries are often performed on patients with severe knee damage resulting from arthritis or an injury. The damage to the knee makes it hard to perform simple activities such as walking or climbing stairs. Patients often feel pain even when sitting or lying down.

If medications, changing your activity level, or using walking supports are no longer helpful, you might want to have your condition evaluated by your doctor. Your doctor may order xrays or an MRI to determine if you should be referred to see an orthopedic surgeon for further evaluation.

An Orthopedic surgeon may recommend one of two different types of knee replacement procedures to relieve your knee pain; partial knee replacement or total knee replacement.

When you have a total knee replacement, the surgeon removes damaged cartilage and bone from the surface of your knee joint and replaces them with a man-made surface of metal and plastic. In a partial knee replacement, the surgeon only replaces one part of your knee joint. With both procedures, the result should be a healthier knee where the bones of the leg are no longer rubbing together at the joint.

In the United States, approximately 300,000 knee replacement surgeries are performed each year. Having surgery can relieve pain, correct leg deformity and help patients resume normal activities. Improvements in surgical

materials and techniques have greatly increased the effectiveness of these procedures. The new components used are stabilized

by the patients ligaments and muscles, just like in a natural knee. In some cases, total knee replacement can be done through a smaller incision. This is called minimally invasive total knee replacement.

If X-ray and MRI (Magnetic Resonance Imaging) results tell your surgeon only one side of your knee is damaged, your surgeon may decide a partial knee replacement is right for you. Partial knee replacement surgery repairs the side of the knee joint that is damage instead of the entire joint.

Partial knee replacement surgery may not be an option for active or heavy patients, because they put too much stress on the implant. Also, if two or more compartments of your knee are damaged, your surgeon will probably recommend a total knee replacement.

A surgery's success often depends on the patient's age, weight, activity level and many other factors. There are always potential risks involved and recovery takes time. If you have conditions that limit rehabilitation, you might not be a good candidate for surgery. An orthopedic surgeon can help you decide whether knee replacement surgery is right for you.



Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

I'm writing this letter in hopes you will publish it. I have lived in Byron for nine years and own my home.

My daughter and granddaughter live with me. We have been treated like outsiders forever. I feel discriminated against here because we don't have money and don't live like everyone else here does.

They have called me poor white trash. My granddaughter can't play with other kids here because she is a little slow like her mom. So the kids tease her and leave her out. The problem has now gotten bigger than ever here where I don't understand why we are treated like this.

I like a safe place like other people do. So when trucks are driving around town tearing up the streets, people uptown are drunk and loud, I will call the sheriff. Then a couple of weeks ago I saw an article in your paper from the sheriff telling people to get nosy. Wrong answer for this town.

In August a big concert was going on in town. The town didn't want the sheriff called on the noise or hell raising. So for a way of asking me not to call the sheriff, my daughter and myself was given two tickets to go.

Then on the day of Sept. 9, 2017, our lives was changed more than ever. When we finally started to believe you don't call for a sheriff here at all. My daughter and grand-daughter was in our kitchen at 9:30 at night when a man pushed our door and left a big boot print on it. Sheriff came out and took pictures, asked around town if anybody saw anything. No, is all we are told.

My daughter and granddaughter started sleeping in my room, and I started sleeping on the couch. Just to see or hear anything going on.

It got quiet until Sept. 16 when a party was going on that night uptown I didn't know was going on. We was in our front room with all doors and windows closed at 11:30 at night, when we heard a woman screaming for help, and I decided I better call a sheriff. Even

though I didn't think it would help any.

Then after calling the sheriff to get here, a truck tore through the town by our house. The sheriff came and nothing seemed to get done. Boy, was I right on that. Some way my name was spread all over as the snitch for the sheriff department.

I pulled my van into my yard to this truck wouldn't hit it. The next day, Sept. 17, I pulled by van back where I usually park it. Rolled the windows down a little for air in it. Around 11:30 that morning my grand-daughter went out to play in our yard. She came in with paint on her hands. I asked her where she got it. It was all over the passenger side of my van. My van was hit with a paint-ball gun.

The sheriff came, took a picture and told me I could wash it off. It left dents and the paint of the van is now peeling. I got a \$500 deductible before I can get it fixed. Which I don't have. Called the mayor for answers as to where my family's protection is. No call back. Why?

So now since this incident we got our house up for sale and we leave all outside lights on, and even got a mean dog. But, I know that won't help when your family is scared. And the town just says things behind your back...such as we shouldn't butt into other people's business.

I thought it was a call for help when people was in trouble or causing trouble. But, when a town has never wanted you there and you got no place to go, what do you do?

I told people here pay me what I want for my house and we will gladly leave. But, why scare all of us in the meantime and discriminate against us. It was a law once in the state that people was treated fairly, poor, rich or whatever, not drive them out of the homes, like this town is doing.

It might not be all of the town, but a good part of it is who is doing it, and believe me, they all know who I'm talking about.



Patriotic couple to be recognized as next Faces on the Barroom Floor

It wouldn't be a stretch to call Bill and Evonne Williams the most patriotic

couple in Nebraska. The Omaha couple has been the driving force behind the Honor Flights that have transported more than 3,300 Nebraska veterans back to the U.S war memorials in

Washington, D.C. The duo is now working on another project, which they unveiled in Lincoln in July and nationally, in Washington, D.C. at the foot of the Lincoln Memorial on September 7. It's called the Remembering Our Fallen memorial – a large photo display depicting more than 4,500 servicemen and women who have died in Iraq and Afghanistan and related missions since Sept.

11, 2001. When completed, the memorial will include almost 7,000 Fallen on 40-45 Tribute Towers, each one 10 feet tall and featuring three double-sided banners with military and personal photos

of each service member. For all their patriotic endeavors, the Williams will be recognized on Sept. 28 as the Omaha Press Club's 154th Face on the Barroom Floor. It shapes up to be one of the more memorable Face events in Press Club

history. "This is truly a special couple," said Allen Beermann, executive director of the Nebraska Press Association and an OPC board member. "They've given thousands of veterans the opportunity to go to our nation's capital and reflect and observe the monuments that they helped to erect because of their service.

"It's an opportunity of a lifetime for these people, and for many of them, it's probably the last time they will be able to visit. They get to kneel down in front of the monuments and pray - for the families, our nation and the world. It's a chance for them to give thanks to those whose names are on the memorials.

"The Williams made all this happen, but they would be the first to say, 'Oh, but a lot of people helped us.' That's the Nebraska way." The Williams will be
