General Election information inside

The Nov. 8 Thayer County General Election ballot is on page 11 with local and national candidates.

For Thayer County Commissioner, Rick Dageforde and incumbent Chris Frye are running for a four-year term.

The Southeast Community College \$369 million bond is also on the ballot.

Uncontested races include incumbent Congressman Adrian Smith (R); Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Michael G. Heavican and Court of Appeals Judge Everett O. Inbody.

Locally, uncontested Little Blue Natural Resources District four-year term candidates are Mason Hoffman, Charles Rainforth and Everett L. Kellogg.

Voters will have three out of four choices for Thayer Central Community Schools Board of Education, four-year terms — Rob Marsh, Michael Prellwitz, Tyler E. Tietjen and Curt A. Mumm are running.

Voters will also cast their opinion for or against the death penalty. A vote to retain eliminates the death penalty and changes the maximum penalty for first degree murder to life imprisonment.

MetalQuest started business with one machine

Most people might guess machining shops are somewhat dark and dingy. Not MetalQuest.

"Their facility is somewhat unexpected in how bright and clean it is in there," Matt Sherman, the facility's contracted marketing director, said. Sherman is the president of Three Pillars Media out of Lincoln.

"We've ended up seeing a lot of different manufacturing shops and it's just unexpected. Machining is dirty," he said.

Sherman attributes the cleanliness to the environment MetalQuest has created — from the lighting, cooling and heating to make work comfortable for employees to the use of robotics to alleviate repetitive duties for worker health and safety.

"The employees they have are the best of the best and they work differently than most other shops," Sherman said.

Chief Operating Officer Scott Harms also praised his employees while welcoming visitors to MetalQuest's open house for its 20th anniversary Saturday, which featured activities for children and refreshments.

There are maybe four other companies in the United States that do machining as well as MetalQuest, Sherman said.

"It's how they manage, their time, their coolants...there is no one regionally who does things like they do," he said. "They're very well known because of their processes."

Sherman said it seems every time he is in the building, there are visitors to see how MetalQuest operates, and the company is often invited to speak at national conferences.

Harms was 23 years old and a Southeast Community College graduate in precision machining and automation technology when he walked into Arnold Otten's office at the Nebraska Security Bank in Deshler.

"He was working for a company in Lincoln and thought he was making



them a lot of money, money he could make for himself," Otten, who lives in York, said.

Harms wanted one machine to begin his business that cost \$175,000 and Otten believed in him. He had known Harms since he was a little guy.

"He said, 'I think I can make it work.' I watched him grow up. He was always inquisitive and full of energy," Otten said. "I was friends with his parents and between his dad and him, they work in tandem very well."

Harms bought the machine and

rented a space in the former mausoleum building on Highway 136.

"When I retired in 1998, he had three machines," Otten said.

Otten said it was great to be at the anniversary open house and see Harms' 20 years of accomplishments.

"It was a very proud moment for me to be down there and see all that," he said.

"When a company starts, you never know where it all going to end up. The big picture is you have to care about what you do," Harms said.

He said the company moved into the Hebron location in January of 1999 and have continued to push forward.

"We do custom manufacturing, machining and assembly," he said. "We use computer numerical con-

trolled machining." The two largest sectors MetalQuest serves are the energy and agriculture industries, Sherman said. Additional sectors are transportation and firearms.

1886

130 Years Ago

There was quite a frost on Tuesday morning.

The enrollment in the Hebron schools has reached 296.

There was quite a hard hail storm on the county line north of Hebron on Sunday evening.

Potatoes are of an unusual price for this time of year, 60 to 70 cents per bushel, owing to scarcity and extra demand caused by so many railroad laborers.

Teamsters have put the price of apples which they haul from the eastern part of the state at 80 cts. per bushel.

E. A. Flood has purchased the delivery business formerly owned by Alonzo Iler, and is proving that he is the right man in the right place.

The B&M Railroad south from Strang leaves the east and west main line one mile east of Strang and follows the half section line to near Belvidere, from there to Hebron it follows the lay of the land to save grading.

Mrs. James Wilson, of Chester, died at her home on last Thursday morning after an illness of several months during which time she has been a great sufferer. Her disease was consumption. Mr. Wilson is a partner of J. J. Malowney of this place.

Johnny Boyle, aged about 12 years, son of Thomas Boyle, died on Monday from consumption. The funeral took place from the Christian chapel on Wednesday.

Hawes Yates, brother of ex-Governor Yates, of Illinois, has been in town for a few days. He resides at Jacksonville, Ill. He was at one time an extensive land owner in this vicinity.

Farmers are beginning to make arrangements for gathering corn. It is drying up very fast. The yield will average light, though there are some fine pieces.

Our sympathy is extended to Bro. Scott of the Strang Record, for the loss of their 18 months old daughter, who died at Tecumseh recently.

1896

120 Years Ago

The populists are planning a blowout for next Monday and expect a large crowd of populists from adjoining counties and Kansas.

Died, at Hershey, Neb., Sept. 11, of typhoid fever, Robert White, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. R. White, formerly of Belvidere.

Rev. H. G. Wilcox, the newly appointed minister of the M.E. Church of this place, will preach next Sunday morning and evening.

Deshler: Deshler experienced her first railroad wreck Tuesday. As the freight engine was switching, two cars left the track at the switch head and started for a corn field. The conductor was on one of the cars that left the track, and in jumping to save himself, he tore his hand pretty badly on a projecting nail. Dr. Boyes dressed the wound, and the section men from Hebron and Ruskin came in to help Boss Hill and his men build a track around the derailed cars, and the wrecking train came up to take a look at it. Finally about 9 o'clock the westbound passenger got through and it sounded quite metropolitan in Deshler to hear so many engines snorting around. The wreck was caused by rails spreading. In the morning the wrecking crew got the cars unloaded and back on the track not much the worse for their tumble.

Chester: Lon Wilkes is might proud of his sugar beets. He brought to this office one that weighed 10 pounds.

Gilead: Mr. Bower, of Gladstone, will soon occupy his new residence here and open up a general store...It is rumored that Jim Decker is about to purchase S. R. Moss' outfit of blacksmith tools, and go to work. A good, steady blacksmith would be welcome to Gilead's business.

1906

110 Years Ago

The Bon Ton restaurant will open their oyster season Saturday, Sept. 15.

Marshall W. B. Hughes reports that on Tuesday they cleaned out the stand-pipe, and found one sparrow and about

a foot of silt.

W. H. Boyes and Mrs. Mary Adams hied to Hastings this week where they were united in marriage by Rev. R. A. Schell, formerly pastor of the Christian Church here, of which the bride is a member.

Shortly after 3 o'clock on Tuesday morning, fire started in Kuhlmann's implement store burning it to the ground, together with Mr. Barber's new blacksmith shop adjoining it on the north. None of Mr. Kuhlmann's goods were saved. He had \$3600 insurance. Mr. Barber's tools were saved and he had \$700 insurance on the building. Mr. Tripp's blacksmith shop on the south was several times ablaze but quickly extinguished and his tools moved to a place of safety. The horses and vehicles were taken from the adjoining livery barns, and vigilance was used to protect the Hebron Lumber Yard. Had there been any wind to blow the brands, the fire might have been most disastrous in the heart of the city.

Notice in the Quarter Century Ago column that John G. Deshler was selling Thayer County's fine land for \$7 that is now climbing rapidly towards the \$100 notch. Will the next 26 years bring corresponding improvement and increase in value?

Ninety-one foreigners took on their naturalization papers last Tuesday, and the clerk of the district court and his office-force had all they could do to attend to those anxious to be admitted to American citizenship. They will make good citizens, too!

Geo. Bell, who recently returned from Australia, made a pleasant call at this office the first of the week. He has been engaged in raising fruit in Australia since leaving here some 16 years ago. He will make his home with his nephew, Mr. Bell of Gilead precinct.

Gilead: Thomas C. Powell died at his home this morning of typhoid fever. Mr. Powell was postmaster and also bought grain for B. W. McClucas of Fairbury. He was one of Gilead's best citizens and will be greatly missed.

Davenport: Mr. and Mrs. George Campbell, who formerly lived south of Davenport, but for the past three years have lived in Moore, Mont., returned to Davenport yesterday and expect to spend the remainder of their lives at this place...School opened last Monday morning with a total enrollment of 120...There will be no graduating class in the spring of 1907, as an 11th grade has been added to the school.

100 Years Ago

Hubbell: Moses Bass' steam threshing outfit met with an accident Tuesday evening, that will put it out of business for some time. They were moving from Will Kelly's over to Tom Kelly's, when near N. C. Schlife's the crown sheet collapsed, allowing the steam to escape. Moses was slightly scalded. The engine was so badly wrecked that they think it will be impossible to get repairs. Bass and Chas. Strosnider went up to Lincoln Wednesday to see what can be done about it.

Belvidere: The board of education has decided to teach Latin in our school and Professor Stackhouse will begin the work as soon as the text books arrive...A large two-seated automobile passed thru town last week. The occupants consisted of a man and his wife and child and their chauffeur. They resided in Kansas City, Mo., and had been on a pleasure trip to Denver, Colo. Their auto was a 36 horsepower Glide and was completely covered.

Having it readily available will help save time, reduce stress, and may even help you obtain better care.

This health information can be put together to develop a "Personal Health Record (PHR)" for yourself or a loved one's health. A PHR is a record of your health or the health of someone you are caring for. It includes contact information, symptoms, medications, diagnosis, appointments, and records describing every incident or visit.

Doctors take down notes and keep vital information about you or your loved one's health at each appointment. You, too, can keep a personal health record and store it in a safe place at home or in your office. Your records may even contain more information than the doctor has, and may contain critical information about day-to-day activities relating to health.

Members of your family see many health professionals; dentist, orthodontist, eye doctor, pediatrician, etc. They may even see specialists such as an allergist, endocrinologist or dermatologist to mention a few.

The list of healthcare professionals can be significant even when you are not having a medical issue. Keeping a record of all your current healthcare professionals will help you stay organized.

Other reasons for keeping a PHR:

- Having one place for all information will help you stay informed and save time.
- You will have important contact information when needed.
- You will have an accurate record of what happens with each visit or daily symptoms.
- Better care if you write down

questions before each visit. You can also use your PHR to write down the answers to your questions.

- A great resource in case someone else takes a loved one to an appointment.

- Valuable health information is available during an emergency.

Starting a PHR may be time consuming, but it will save you time when you need it most: doctor appointments, medical emergencies, etc. There are even portable devices available to help you organize your PHR. Hardcopy items can be scanned in to make them more portable and take up less space.

Items you may consider including in a PHR: medical condition information, prescription medications, allergies and known reactions to any medications, family history, surgeries, trauma, in-patient or out-patient care, immunizations, appointments, symptom sheets for health or condition symptoms, notes surrounding doctor visits, a health incident, or anything else you think might be important, section on question or concerns, test results, doctor's letters, lab tests results, lab test data, copies of insurance claims, healthcare professional business cards, directions to healthcare professional offices, hospitals, clinics, and any other place you and your loved one may visit as part of the healthcare plan.

You can start today with important contact information for your healthcare professionals, medications and any diagnosis. You can update your information each time you have a doctor's visit. If needed, copies of your medical records can also be made available upon request.


